## WIVES ARE HELD FOR MRS. HINES

Funeral services for Mrs. Minnie E. Hines, 75, were held at 2 p.m. Saturday at the First Baptist Church. The pioneer of Matador County died early Thursday in West Texas Hospital, Lubbock. She had been a resident of the county for 70 years.

Rev. Miller Robinson, pastor of the church was in charge, assisted by Rev. J. E. Lee of Plainfield and Rev. Roy Patterson, Matador Methodist pastor. Rev. Lee preached the Memorial service.

Following the service here, the body was taken to Flomot for burial in Memorial Park Cemetery under the direction of Seale Funeral Home. Pallbearers were grandsons: John Hines and Everett Coburn of Matador, N. M.; Ted Hines, Dallas; John David Hines, Keene, Texas; Hal Hines, Floydada, and Dick Carpenter, Roaring Springs.

Minnie E. Hines was born March 2, 1887 in Hill County, Texas. She was just four years old when her late parents, Mr. and Mrs. I. E. Martin came to Matador County in a covered wagon and settled in the Flomot Community.

She was married June 18, 1905 to Henry Hines, at Matador and they continued to make their home at Flomot. Following the death of her husband in 1949, Mrs. Hines moved to Matador.

At the time of her death on February 21, she was 75 years, 11 months and 19 days old. She was a member of the Baptist Church.

Survivors include five sons: Bill Hines, Eagle Nest, N. M.; Ted Hines, Carlsbad, N. M.; Hines, Clayton N. M.; Howie Hines, Floydada and Otis Hines, Matador; 12 grandchildren and 12 great-grandchildren; four sisters, Mrs. George Shear, Mrs. J. C. Burleson, Mrs. Katie James all of Matador and Mrs. J. B. Barton, Whiteflat; and two brothers, Bill Martin, Whiteflat and Curly Martin, Matador.

## Highway Patrol Seeks Recruits

An unusual opportunity is offered men between the ages of 21 and 35 by the Texas Department of Public Safety which is currently seeking to recruit more men as highway patrolmen.

Safety Officer C. A. Dempsey of Lubbock was here Monday and told the Tribune that the department is short 153 men. Standards are high and the rewards are high.

Salaries start at \$395 to \$412 per month. Patrolmen receive 2 weeks annual vacation, 12 or more holidays, 12 days per year sick leave, \$10 per month added salary each five years, benefits of a modern liberal retirement system, traveling expenses, furnished uniforms and necessary equipment to perform duties.

Complete information may be obtained by writing or visiting the Lubbock district office at 41st and R streets. High school education or equivalent is required.

## QUICKIE BLIZZARD HITS WEST TEXAS

A "quickie" blizzard hit west Texas last week before readers received the Tribune Thursday morning. The storm, which arrived following weather forecasters warnings, dropped the mercury to 27 degrees here.

Highest mercury reading Thursday was 30 degrees as intermittent snow fell most of the day, bringing highway traffic to a standstill and closing US Highway 70 between Matador and Floydada. The snow produced 1.5-inch moisture, bringing the month's total to .85-inch.

Thursday night the mercury dropped to 15, but rose quickly Friday morning, reaching 51 degrees during the day and melting off the snow. Saturday the mercury was up to 70 degrees.

A GUARANTEED FORMULA for success was the high point of an address here Thursday night at the 26th annual Father-Son Banquet, sponsored by the Matador Lions Club. The speaker was James Jeffery, Ft. ### Interesting Display of Antiques Includes Many Unusual Articles

Family treasures, many more than one hundred years old were displayed by members of El Progresso Study Club Thursday, Feb. 14, at the home of Mrs. A. C. Traweek Jr.

A nursing (rocking) chair brought in an ox cart from Georgia in 1864 by her grandparents was exhibited by Mrs. Traweek, who said that she still uses the chair, which is in excellent condition. Among other things Mrs. Traweek also had on display was an English iron stone platter 95 years old which had belonged to her mother, and also a glass platter fashioned from some of the first glass made in America, and bearing the likeness of George Washington.

A similar glass platter which had belonged to her great-aunt, was displayed by Mrs. J. R. Whitworth, and was stamped with the patented date, Dec. 7, 1875. She also had a silver syrup pitcher which had belonged to her grandmother.

Mrs. W. N. Pipkin brought a flower-garden silk quilt, circa 1852 which had belonged to her grandfather, and a white English iron-stone platter which her grandmother had used.

Mrs. W. F. Jacobs contributed to the display, a child's 100-year-old dress which was worn by the grandfather of the late W. F. Jacobs, and a pair of hand-made baby shoes which the latter had owned.

A picture of Ralph Stapleton's family, made when he was a child, was shown by Mrs. Stapleton, together with a gold-banded china glove box, which was over 50 years old.

**80-Year-Old Crazy Jug**  
A "Crazy" jug made in 1883 by the late Mrs. Carrie Walton McKenzie was shown by her daughter, Mrs. U. L. Willie (Virginia Walton). The jug was decorated with numerous objects including buttons from soldiers' uniforms, small china doll heads, shells, colorful rocks and many other keepsakes.

Miss Mary Keith brought a quaint writing pen which had belonged to her mother, the late Mrs. D. C. Keith during the early 1880's.

A moustache cup belonging to Judge Elbert Reeves, bought by his father, the late W. E. Reeves in 1892, was shown by Mrs. Reeves, and a 90-year-old glass cake stand which had belonged to her mother, the late Mrs. William Wason, was displayed by Mrs. Fred Simpson. An antique toothpick holder fashioned of pressed glass together with family pictures were shown by Mrs. J. L. Woodruff.

Among family treasures contributed by Mrs. W. D. Lapscomb were a powder horn carried by her grandfather in the Civil War and a 100-year-old

school bell used by W. M. Lee in Georgia, a relative of Robert E. Lee.

Mrs. Forrest Campbell brought a Valentine card mailed in 1922 to her mother, the late Mrs. Annie Tudor, and a 70-year-old spoon holder which had also belonged to Mrs. Tudor. A hand-painted plate 50 years old and an antique lapis stone pin were treasures shown by Miss Sue Glenn, and Mrs. A. J. Daffern brought a glass spoon holder and dessert dish, which had belonged to her mother, the late Mrs. William Wason.

**Jewelry From England**  
Antique jewelry made of coal, in a black finish was brought from England and displayed by Mrs. Eldred Seigler. It was 150 years old and had belonged to her great-grandmother. Also in her collection was a 90-year-old tating shuttle.

Oneida flatware which she had used over 30 years, and a platter over 60 years old were

displayed by Mrs. Ben Keltz, and Mrs. G. E. Hamilton brought a mesh handbag, about 65 years old which had belonged to her late sister, Mrs. B. M. Carter. A red and gold glass cake plate about 75 years old was contributed to the display by Mrs. Freeman Thacker, while Mrs. W. F. McCaghren brought a large metal, hand-painted tray about 60 years old, belonging to her mother, Mrs. H. S. Watson.

A 70-year-old china jewelry case was shown by Mrs. D. E. Pitts, and also shown was a 70-year-old silver spoon belonging to Mrs. Mary Ford, grandmother of Mrs. Vance Gilbreath. Mrs. R. W. Overstreet brought a pair of her baby shoes, which were among her home treasures, and Mrs. Roy Patterson's contribution included a jelly glass between 80 and 90 years old which belonged to her great-grandmother, and a picture of her mother, Mrs. J. S. Pinckley in 1898. A musical album belonging to her mother, Mrs. A. A. 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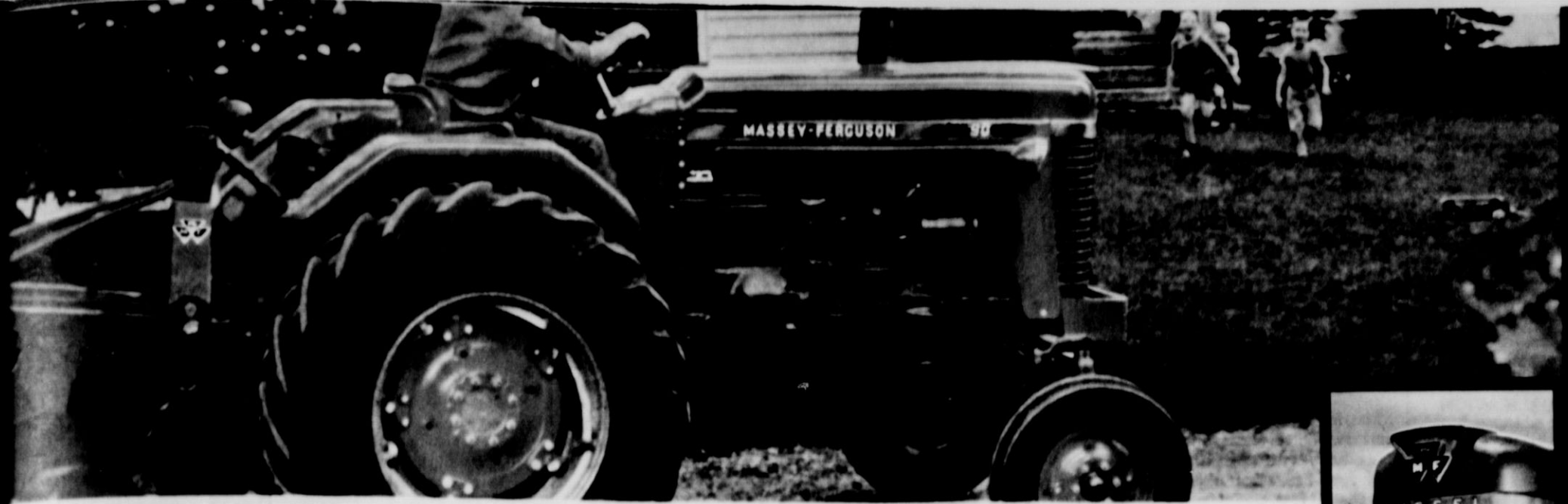
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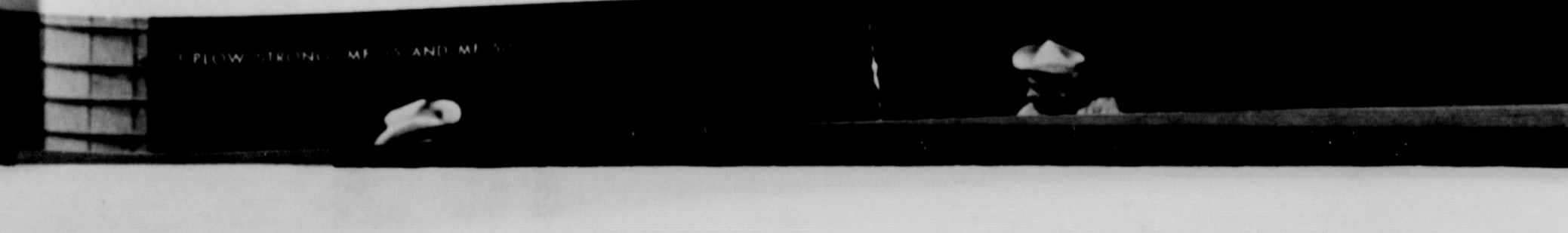

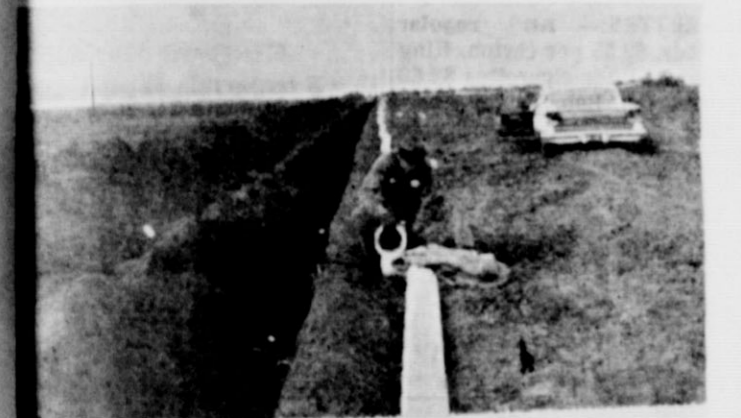
