Motley County agriculture agent W. C. Falmeyer will preside at the afternoon session beginning at 1 p.m. Wayne Keese, irrigation specialist of A&M Extension Service will discuss "Sprinkler System Design" starting at 1 p.m.

Gunter, Extension Service area agronomist of Lubbock will discuss "Benefits of Cotton Burs and other Crop Residue" at 2 p.m. Bob Gordon, SCS of Memphis will discuss "Midland Bermuda for Livestock Grazing," at 2:45 p.m. A panel of agricultural specialists will start at 3:30 and John Shanklin of Albuquerque, N. FATE of Matador Community Chest 1964 fund campaign appeared certain late yesterday with only slightly over 60% of the \$3000 quota collected.

County Judge Elbert Reeves said a total of \$1,818.75 had been reported to his Community Chest treasurer's office. He said, however, that a number of committees had not made their reports.

"Draft Healty" Move Launched

A "draft Healty for re-election" move was started at Vernon Friday night during an appreciation dinner for the 82nd Dist. Representative.

Bill Healty, Paducah lawyer, who has served two terms as chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, and his wife, Jonnie, accepted the tribute "from 500 diners with a simple "thank you and God Bless you."

Healty, however, did not announce his decision to seek re-election. He has served the old 88th district of four counties since 1950, and became the representative of the new 82nd when the 88th and 82nd were merged before the 1962 election.

Speaker of the House Byron Tunnell of Tyler was one of the speakers for the appreciation dinner. He praised Healty as "the only man in state government today with the lengthy experience on the Legislature's most powerful committee (appropriations)."

It was broad indication that Tunnell, slated for re-election as the Speaker for the 59th Legislature after its election this fall, will once again name Healty as chairman of the House Appropriations Committee.

Master of ceremonies Warren Pruitt presented Healty with a hat as "a gentle hint that you throw the hat into the race right away."

"Bill can say 'no' emphatically when it comes to looking after the taxpayers' money and make you like it," said Jerry Sadler, Texas land commissioner.

The dinner, held in Vernon's Municipal Auditorium, was attended by delegations from all counties in the district — Willbarger, Foard, Hardeman, Cottle, Childress, Donley, Hall and Motley.

HEATLY TO ANNOUNCE

The Tribune was advised by telephone Tuesday afternoon that W. S. (Bill) Healty of Paducah has announced for re-election as State Representative of the 82nd District, composed of Childress, Cottle, Donley, Foard, Hall, Hardeman, Motley and Willbarger counties.

The fund campaign was \$2,156.50 which was \$337.75 more than has been reported to date.

Freddie Welling, chairman of the 1964 drive, said that he felt little hope remained to achieve the 1964 quota.

"It is regrettable that such a wonderful organization should fall short of the amount of money it needs to carry on for another year," Welling declared.

"There is no place in the entire scope of charity when money is applied more directly to absolute needs, than in the Community Chest."

"No money is lost in administration" and the members of the Community Chest committee serve without a penny of payment.

Meador to Seek Sheriff's Office

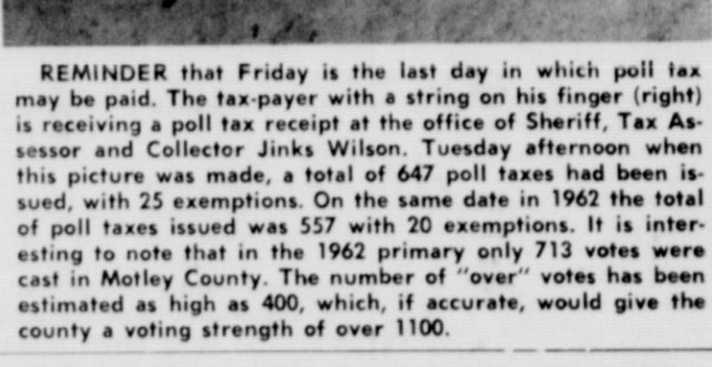

Tuesday afternoon when this picture was made, a total of 647 poll taxes had been issued, with 25 exemptions. On the same date in 1962 the total of poll taxes issued was 557 with 20 exemptions. It is interesting to note that in the 1962 primary only 713 votes were cast in Motley County. The number of "over" votes has been estimated as high as 400, which, if accurate, would give the county a voting strength of over 1100.

The courtesy preceded Mrs. Bird's marriage to Mr. Clay Jameson on Friday evening.

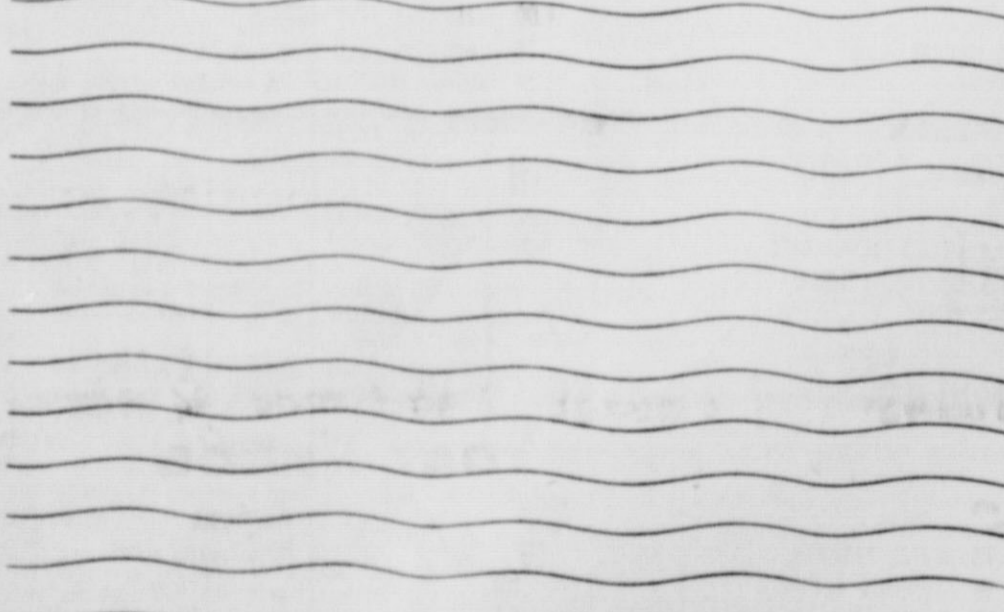
