Humble To Test

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 5-D Matador Land & Cattle Company is scheduled as a 5,000-foot Motley County wildcat, seven miles east of Roaring Springs. The drillsite is 1,980 feet from north and 2,310 feet from west lines of section 19, block H, IRR survey. The announcement, which had appeared in other papers, was published in the oil section of the Sunday Amarillo News-Globe.

Dirt work on the location has been completed and opinion was that the rig would be moved in during the next week.

PAST YEAR RAIN NEAR 1961 TOTAL

Rainfall, most vital factor in the economy of the Foothill country, hit almost the same total in 1962 as was recorded in 1961. In Bob Stanley's accurate records.

In fact, 1962 needed less than one-fourth inch to equal the previous year's total here in Matador. The total for 1961 was 22.82 inches as compared with 22.58 inches for 1962. Both years were above the annual rainfall average of approximately 21 inches.

Rainfall in 1961 by months was: Jan. with 80 inch; Feb. with 2.07 inches; Mar. with 1.18 inch; April with 17 inch; May with 1.55 inches; June with 4.03 inches; July with 5.49 inches; Aug. with 1.38 inches; Sept. with 1.23 inches; Oct. with 1.14 inches; Nov. with 3.27 inches and Dec. with .51 inch.

The 1962 rainfall was: Jan. with 72 inch; Feb. none; Mar. with .03 inch; April with 1.39 inches; May with 27 inch; June with 5.33 inches; July with 4.72 inches; Aug. with 1.22; Sept. with 4.58 inches; Oct. with 1.44 inches; Nov. with .98 inch and Dec. with 1.90 inches.

Lions Teams Active On Chest Campaign

CHRISTMAS decorations had barely started to wane when two-man Lions Club teams resumed the campaign for a \$3000 goal for the Matador Community Chest. Several teams have already completed their lists of assignment cards.

"The outlook that we will achieve our goal is not hopeful," declared Douglas Meador, chairman of the campaign, "as compared by the first returns. Our present hope rests in late returns of the cotton crop when farmers and others whose income is derived at least in part from agriculture make their contributions. Some of the teams feel that a better response will result in the delay until the crop is harvested.

"Lions working in the campaign have been instructed not to make a suggestion as to the amount of individual contributions," Meador said. "We feel that everyone knows the purpose and the plan of the Community Chest.

"We believe the people understand that they are giving for an entire year and that every dime will be used for the purposes designated. Half a cup of coffee per day amounts to 5c, yet when multiplied by 365, it amounts to more than \$16, and seems, indeed, to be a small amount to pay for the responsibility of citizenship in a community.

Higher Postage In Effect Next Week

Intending to write some letters? Better do it this week and save one cent each because Uncle Sam is raising the price of postage one cent come Monday, January 7.

The sentence to the public reads like this: First class letters, present rate 4c, effective January 7, 5c; drop letters, present rate 3c, effective January 7, 4c; cards, present rate 3c, effective January 7, 4c; air mail (per ounce) 7c, effective January 7, 8c; air mail cards, present rate 5c, effective January 7, 6c.

Newspapers, which have for half a century been allowed in-county free mailing, will pay 1c per pound after January 7. In many parts of the country where weekly newspapers operate on the line between profit and loss, subscription rates have already been advanced in order to stay in business.

Also affected by new postal regulations is the size of envelopes. The small (baby announcement size) envelope will not be accepted. The regulation says envelopes must be 3x4½ or larger.

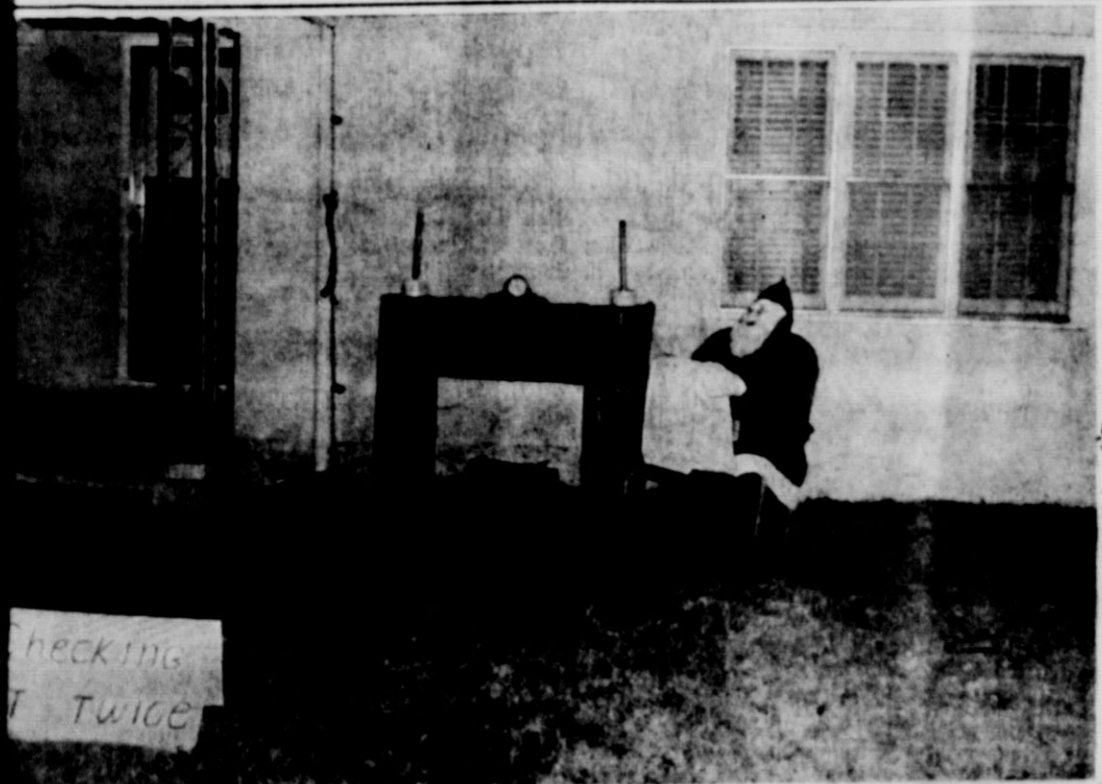
Mrs. Swim had been a member of the Methodist Church most of her life.
