# Rains Break Many Records

MANY RANCHERS are repairing watergaps, an experience that has not been one of their problems recently. One rancher told the Tribune that he had 17 watergaps to replace.

According to Bob Stanley's rain gauges, 6.28 inches of rainfall has been recorded during the first three days of June, 1974. It brought the total for the year of 1974 to 13.07. The total at the same date in 1973 was 13.44 (including the month of June).

It has been a long time (17 years) since as much as 3.40 inches were recorded within 24 hours. Mr. Stanley said that actually 5.70 inches fell within 24 hours (June 2nd and 3rd).

The rains, are of course, a blessing to the thirsting country. On the other side of the ledger many farmers have lost seed, time and fertilizer. It is almost impossible to estimate the loss.

Again back to the rancher, there is no way to estimate his benefit. Water holes and earthen tanks are brimming full in most instances, grass is growing like mad and cattle are "doing well."

## Buildings Flooded

Many buildings were flooded in Matador during the storms, but no serious damage has been reported. The Tribune was flooded both nights. The flooding however, resulted from a clogged passage near the back door. Basement of the First Baptist Church was flooded, including rest rooms. Several homes with water blowing through doors and windows, were reported and lightning struck the Charlie Meador home, knocking a hole in the roof.

Some places of business received water damage from flooding but damage was reported to be light. The basement of the First United Methodist Church flooded, with but slight damage.

Christ is the Son of God in a special way because He pre-existed His fleshly sojourn on the earth. While on earth Christ was divine as well as human. And He proved to you and me that the Spirit can overcome the ways of the flesh.
