Masons Challenged For Church Apathy

MASONS WHO NEGLECT church activities in their communities were challenged here Friday night by John McKee, Dallas, Deputy to Sovereign Grand Inspector of Texas. McKee was principal speaker following a banquet where the Scottish Rite membership committee and the Matador Scottish Rite Association were hosts to approximately 190 Masons, their wives and visitors from a seven-county area. The banquet was served in the basement of the First Methodist Church by the WSCS.

McKee, a 33rd degree Mason, employed in the public relations department of Ford Motor Company, Dallas branch, and heading 16 leading Texas organizations, is an outstanding speaker.

Speaking gently, the dynamic and religious leader said: "I want to talk to you about responsibility, and the political climate in which you live as business and professional men. There has been a definite change in the home in the past ten years and that change is a lack of Christian principles.

"On the political side there is equal danger because a minority is in control. If we are to preserve our free enterprise system, you must take an active part in a political party, beginning at the precinct convention.

"What this country needs," Mr. McKee said, "is a great revival in Christian principles and it must start in the small communities. It will not start in the metropolitan areas.

"Business has discovered that we must move back to the principles of Christianity if the nation is to be preserved. We are

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

CROP ROTATION TEST

In accordance to plans made by the Field Crops sub-committee, W. H. Marshall of Roaring Springs carried out a crop rotation test, and indications are that legumes will increase cotton production. In 1961, Marshall planted guar, cotton and grain sorghum on plots in addition to leaving a plot fallow. In 1962, all of this land except the summer fallow was planted in cotton (summer fallow land was too wet to plant), and the following results were obtained.

Plot 1, Guar, 5 ac., 361 lbs. ac. lint, gross \$108.37.

Plot 2, Cotton, 6 ac., 271 lbs. ac. lint, gross \$81.30.

Plot 3, Grain Sorghum, 11.6 ac., 306 lbs. ac. lint, gross \$91.80 (\$89.47).

Marshall planned to fertilize all of the plots, and side-dressed the feed-land cotton with 60 lbs. of 16-20-0, at a cost of \$2.33 ac., which would reduce the gross of plot 3 to \$89.47. Wet weather prevented side-dressing of the other plots.

Average turn-out was 22.5%, and average price of cotton, 30.02c lb. Gregg cotton was planted on June 19-20, and harvested Dec. 10-11, mechanically. Four applications of insecticides were made on all but part of Plot 2, which was too wet at the time of application.

If you do not plan to plant the cotton acreage allotted to your farm in 1963, you can release this acreage to the ASCS committee for reapportionment and still preserve the allotment history of your farm. Cotton acres are a valuable part of your farm's inherent value and you should protect your title to them. Release and requests for cotton must be made before March 4th. Your ASCS office can give you the details.

The livestock producer who does not figure depreciation on the livestock that he purchases is missing a good means of conserving capital. Since much of the large capital investment required in the business of farming can be recovered by the taxpayer through depreciation, attention should be given to the present tax provisions.

The 1962 income tax law contains important changes affecting farmers and ranchers. New suggested useful lives for some classes of property are among them. A three-year period will be allowed for shifting to the new guidelines, with the biggest change being that for farm building life, which has been changed from 40 to 25 years. The useful life of cattle has been changed from 8 to 7 years on purchased animals. Claims for depreciation should be made annually because it cannot be taken for years passed up. The taxpayer can increase his potential capital gains from livestock sales by properly handling depreciation and the new tax law did not change capital gains on livestock. The first requirement is setting a reasonable salvage value on animals purchased. The remainder may be "written off" as depreciation which then is regained when the old animals are sold. Depreciation is 100% deductible, while capital gains are taxed to 50% of the earnings, which results in a tax saving.

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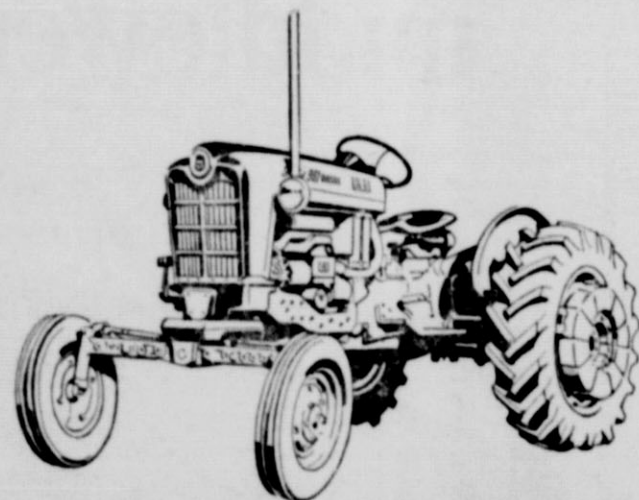

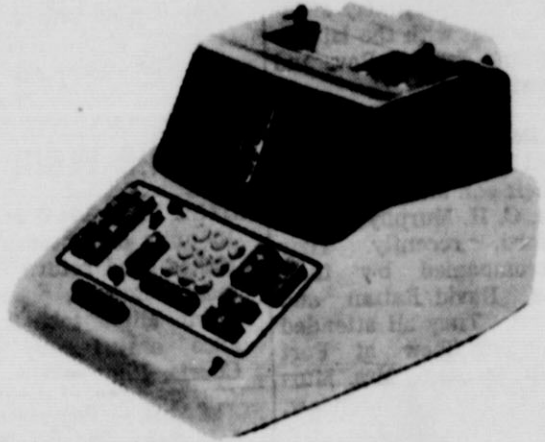
