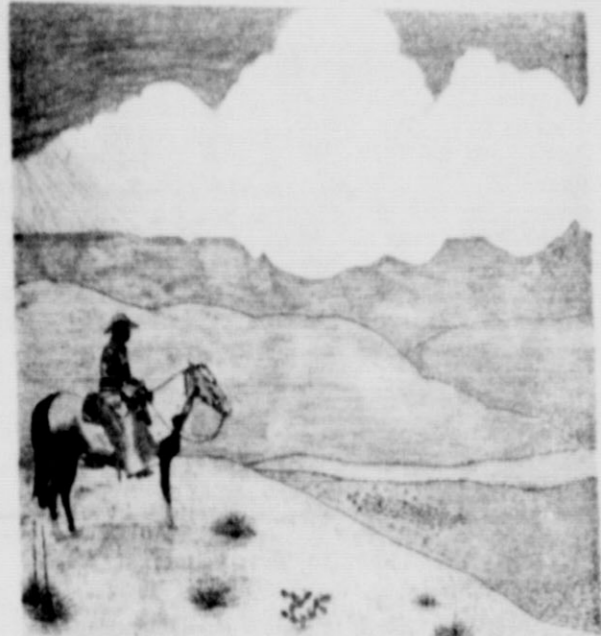

Barbara Bird To Be Honored At Dedication

Miss Barbara Bird, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gus Bird, and a Matador High School senior will be among 40 students from the Texas Panhandle, who will receive special recognition Sunday, April 21.

The event will be the dedication ceremonies for the first section of the Southwest's first Symphonic Drama Theatre in historic Palo Duro State Park.

Miss Bird drew the winning Motley County historical sketch which is to be duplicated in stone and placed at the entrance of the amphitheater. Clint Formby of Hereford will serve as master of ceremonies, and principal speaker will be R. B. Johnston, an Amarillo educator and noted Panhandle historian.

Each student winner from 40 counties will receive an Award of Honor, and his or her original sketch is to be placed on display in the school he attends.

All sketches will be on display at the theatre prior to the ceremonies, which will begin at 4:00 p.m.

VOLUNTEER WORKERS will start late tomorrow afternoon to build concrete bleachers at the southwest corner of the new baseball diamond south of Matador grade school building. Approximately 60 boys in Matador are looking forward to starting practice during the first week in May. The season opens during the first week in June.

Money needed for the bleachers (estimated at about \$400) is expected to come from the sale of a barbecue chicken supper, April 30, sponsored by the VFW.

The VFW is going to provide the supper (barbecued chicken, potato salad, beans, tea or coffee) and boys who will play baseball this summer, are going to sell the tickets. Three prizes are offered for the three highest sales. First prize is a glove, second is a bat and third is a baseball.

San Jacinto Day Is Bank Holiday

On the afternoon of April 21, 1836, Sam Houston's ragtag but spirited army of 782 Texans charged up the sloping plains of San Jacinto (near what is now Houston) where General Santa Anna's veteran troops were bivouacked.

In less than an hour they had routed the Mexicans and forever ended serious Mexican claims on the Texas territory. Here was Texas's glorious revenge for the Alamo defeat and the Goliad massacre, and her final declaration of independence.

Among the heroes of the Battle of San Jacinto was Dr. Junius William Mottley, 24-year-old aide to Secretary of War Tom Rusk, (for whom Motley County is named.)

Monday, April 22, will be observed as a holiday by First State Bank, and other banking institutions in the State, since San Jacinto Day falls on Sunday this year.

County Pioneer is Claimed by Death

ANOTHER PIONEER of Motley County, A. D. (Dud) Beauchamp, has gone to a new frontier. He died in Stanley Hospital late Thursday and final rites were held Saturday afternoon at 3 p.m. in the First Methodist Church. Mr. Beauchamp was 91. Perhaps few men could claim a wider friendship

than "Dud" Beauchamp. His good nature extended throughout his life and into his final days.

Memorial services were conducted by Rev. Roy Patterson, pastor, assisted by Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired Methodist minister.

Burial was in East Mound Cemetery under direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home, with Masonic graveside rites. Members of Matador Masonic orders were pallbearers. They were Billy Wason, Raby Webb, Glen Brotherton, Algie Groves, Bill Moss and Douglas Pitts Jr.

Mr. Beauchamp was a 32nd Degree Mason and Shriner.

Born In Mississippi

Adolphus Dudley Beauchamp was born in Booneville, Miss., January 2, 1872 and died April 11, 1963 at the age of 91 years, 3 months and 9 days. He came to Texas with his parents when he was 10 months old. The family settled in Wise County and later moved to Jack County.

Mr. Beauchamp first came to Motley County in 1890 on a cattle drive with the late A. B. Echols.

He returned to Jack County to marry the former Miss Victoria Lavada Kennedy, August 18,

1892. The couple moved to Motley County in 1899 and filed on a section of land near Teepee Creek, where their first home was a dug out until lumber could be hauled from Quanah, with which to build a frame ranch home.

From 1918 until 1929, Mr. and Mrs. Beauchamp lived in Quanah and during that time were active in the advancement of that community. Mr. Beauchamp's name is among those on the stone plaque of the city hall building.

Digressing from his ranching interests during this period, Mr. Beauchamp experienced success in several oil transactions in and around Wichita Falls and Vernon.

Mr. Beauchamp was a member of the Methodist Church.

He was preceded in death by his wife, who passed away in October, 1956, and by two sons, Price and Vernie.

Survivors include: two daughters, Mrs. Nellie Lawrence, Matador, and Mrs. J. H. McNabb (Lucille) of Clovis, N. M.; a son, Seth Beauchamp, Odessa; two sisters, Mrs. G. W. Foster, Lubbock, and Mrs. Melvin Anthony, Amarillo; four grandchildren, and seven great-grandchildren.

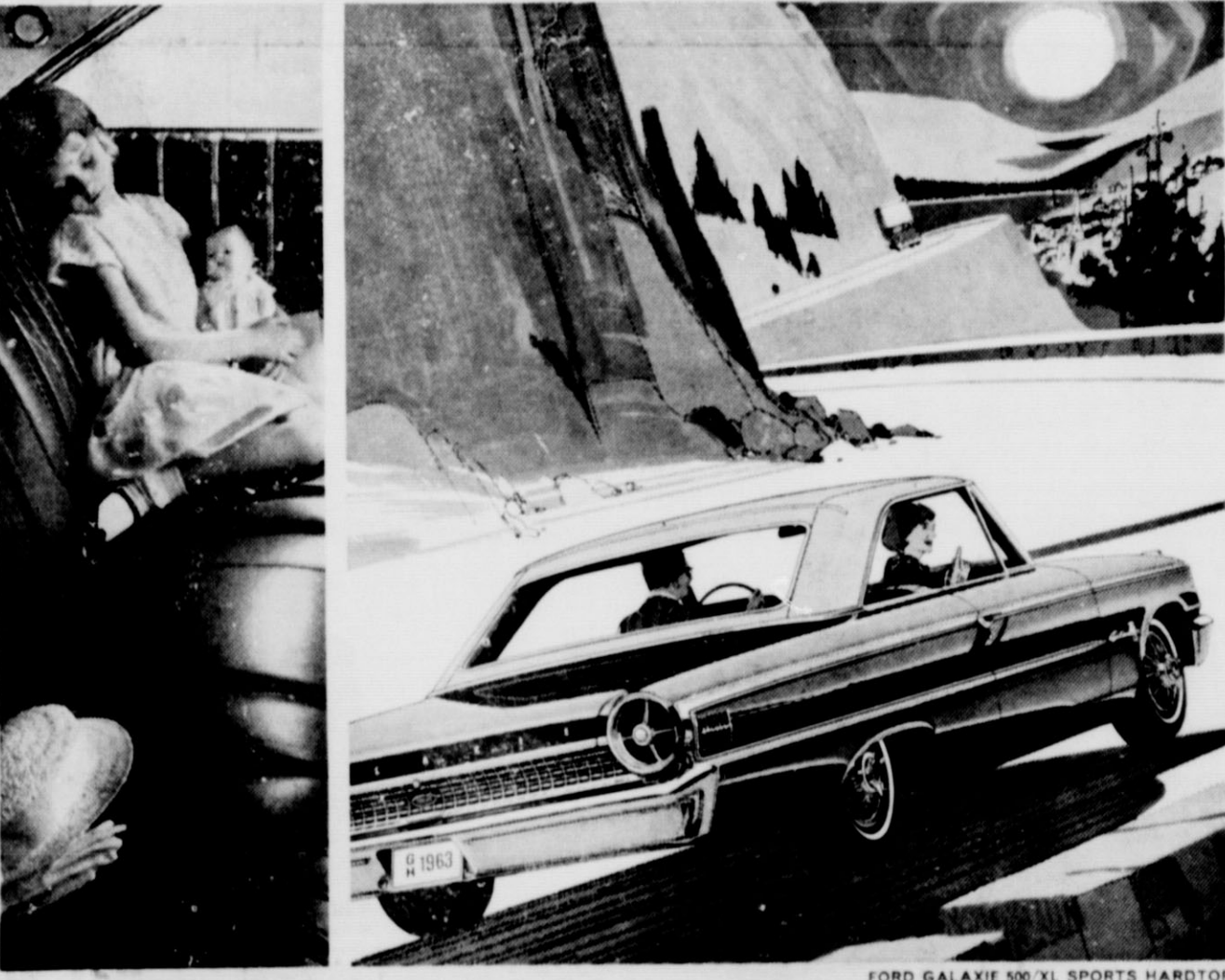

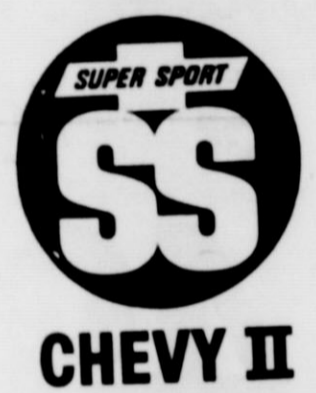
