Native of Flomot Dies in Accident

A native of Flomot, John Bourland, 49, was the victim of an accident last week resulting from the snow storm which swept the Panhandle of Texas.

He was the brother of Mrs. Luther Green and the nephew of Mrs. Richard Seay, both of Matador.

Mr. Bourland, a Randall County ranch hand was killed when the pickup truck he was backing out of a snowbank across the road tracks near Amarillo, was struck by a Santa Fe freight at 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 5. The accident occurred at a crossing on the road which joins U.S. 60 at St. Francis, some two miles east of Amarillo Air Force Base.

Bourland had gotten stuck in the snowdrift early Tuesday night, while taking feed to cattle farther down the road, according to friends who went with him Wednesday and had just helped him pull his truck out of the bank. The friends watched helplessly as he backed the truck across the tracks into the path of the freight, which hit him from the left as he was looking over his right shoulder.

Funeral services were held at 3 p.m. Friday in the First Baptist Church of Canyon with the Rev. Strauss Atkinson, pastor, officiating. Burial was in Dreamland Cemetery there.

John Bourland was born May 15, 1914, at Flomot, and was reared there. He had lived in the Bushland and Canyon area for the past 20 years. He and his wife, Genevieve, with their children, Ronald and Marilyn, lived on a farm about five miles south of Amarillo.

Other survivors include another daughter, Mrs. Judy Burkett of Canyon; his mother, Mrs. F.S. Beef Production Meetings Slated

A series of livestock meetings has been arranged for the producers of Motley County the week of Feb. 17th, with all meetings to be held in the District Courtroom in Matador. Livestock owners, of one, one hundred and one thousand head of cattle are urged to attend, and see if they can pick up some ideas that will assist in making beef cattle production more profitable.

The meeting on Monday night Feb. 17th will start at 7:30 p.m. Paul Marion, Superintendent of the Spur Experiment Station at Spur Station, and how it relates to the problems of the people. Tom Hunter, Area Farm Management Specialist from Vernon will discuss factors affecting cattle prices and other management tips.

The meeting on Tuesday night Feb. 18th will start at 7:30 p.m. L. A. Maddox Jr., Extension Beef Cattle Specialist from College Station will discuss feeding of livestock, with stress placed on maintenance feeding of herd stock.

The meeting on Wednesday Feb. 19th will start at 7:30 p.m. Dr. C. M. Patterson, Extension Veterinarian of College Station will discuss livestock diseases and animal health problems. This series of programs have been arranged through work of the Motley County Planning Commission, with all agricultural agencies assisting. Meetings will not last over two hours, and questions are invited at all sessions.

Rites are Held for Earl Osborn; Body is Found at Grave of Wife

SPECTRE OF TRAGEDY was spread across this area Friday when the frozen body of Earl Wilson Osborn, 49, was found in Roaring Springs cemetery near the grave of his wife who died suddenly of pneumonia October 30.

Still clutched in his hand was the 25 calibre pistol from which a shot had been fired into his mouth. Sheriff Jinks Wilson who investigated the scene said pictures of Mr. Osborn's wife were found in the seat of his car. His mechanic tools were also found in the vehicle.

The body was found by Osborn's brother-in-law, Clyde Clifton, who had become alarmed at his absence. Osborn was reported to have been depressed for some time. The death of his wife further darkened his life, and a week before his death he quit his mechanic's position at Braselton Implement Co. where he had been employed many years.

It is believed that the body may have been in the cemetery as long as 24 hours before it was found. The cemetery is near State Highway 70 and several residents of both Matador and Roaring Springs had seen the parked automobile Thursday afternoon and evening, Feb. 6.

The front will be the latest in design with gray glass in the windows which will prevent any damage to merchandise by sunlight. The windows will be at an angle, with the new door at the northside recessed in a small lobby. A new aluminum awning will be installed across the front and the brick of the front will be plastered to the second floor.

South side glass in the front will be removed and the opening bricked in, as well as high windows on the south of the building.

During the remodeling the store is open for business as usual, according to Mrs. W. F. Jacobs, manager. Construction is under the direction of Higginbotham-Bartlett Co. which has a store here.

Cornerstone of the building bears the inscription: "F. M. Eir, W. M.; H. L. Cook, S. W.; W. T. Patton Jr., J. W.; R. F. Thornton, Sec., 1926 A. D."

The late Joe Shaded of Paducah opened the Fair Store in the building immediately after construction. Later it was vacant for a time, and then opened as Speer's Variety store. The late W. F. Jacobs opened Matador Variety Store in the building, Jan. 2, 1933. Mrs. Jacobs has operated the store since her husband's death in November, 1960.

Maximum conservation goals and plans were reached by five Motley County land owners. Five Great Plains Conservation plans expired as of December 1963, with maximum benefits obtained through organized plans.

Mrs. Hope Fish, Johnny Musselman, Pete Timmons, J. R. A. Stead and Francis Trust completed their plans with assistance through the Great Plains Conservation Program and local Soil Conservation Service personnel.

Conservation practices such as brush control, cross fencing, wells, ponds, deferred grazing, proper range use, underground

irrigation pipeline and several practices related to cropland were utilized in carrying out their plans.

The land owners will continue their conservation programs cooperating with the Upper Pease Soil Conservation District. Their land, with continued maximum conservation applied to each acre, will maintain or increase production in years to come.

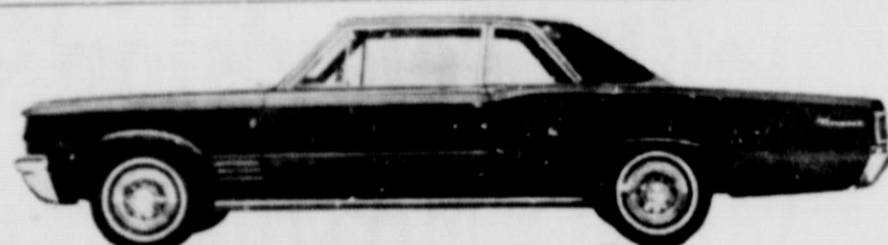

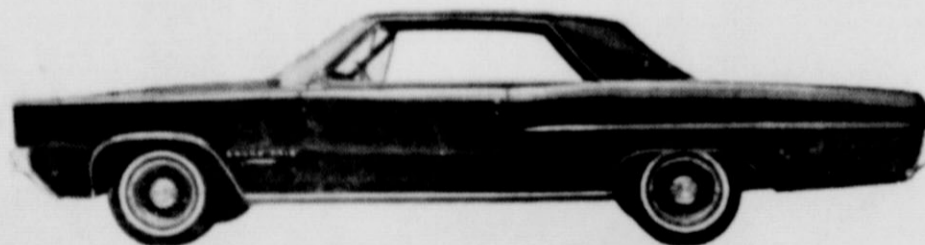
