## Deer Received for New Game Area

FIRST CONSIGNMENT of mule deer arrived Tuesday night in the foothill country for the newly-created Caprock Mule Deer Restoration Area in Motley and Floyd Counties. It is the beginning of stocking the 131,771-acre preserve. At least 50 doe deer and as many buck deer are caught in the traps will be released in the area. The deer will be protected under strict supervision for a five year period.

The plan of restoring deer to a land once the choice hunting grounds of the Indians, is the work of Jerry Noles, resident warden for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

About two years ago Noles began talking to ranchers and landowners regarding the plan, explaining that strict protection would be required for five years. He found that the interest was favorable and that there was no opposition. A public meeting was held and the work was started. It required getting each land owner in the release area to sign an agreement with the Parks and Wildlife Department. This accomplished, the plans were advanced by the department in trapping the deer on the West Pyle Cattle Company Ranch in Sanders County, with the first truck load being delivered Tuesday night to a point on the Rock Island Ranch west of Roaring Springs.

Noles explained that the five year protection plan will give the deer an opportunity to establish themselves and their offspring to become native of the country.

The preserve will be designated on all boundaries by appropriate signs in protecting the deer. Stiff fines will be imposed, ranging from \$50 to \$200, for killing a deer on the preserve. "We hope the public will be interested in the preserve," Noles said, "and that everyone will help in protecting the deer to the extent that it will not be necessary to file a single violation case during the five year period."

## Wreck of Truck Kills 24 Calves

Wrecking of a big double-deck cattle truck on US Highway 70 late Saturday night killed 24 of the 101 head of animals in the transport. The cattle were en route from Calot, Arkansas. The accident happened about 13 miles west of Matador just inside of the Motley-Floyd Counties line.

The truck was operated by W. L. Shantz & Co. of Calot. Bill Morris, 56, of Calot, was arrested after sale had been allowed by an insurance company and the truck owners. Individual purchases of carcasses followed after skinning of the animals had been completed by Walter Jones of Matador.

Extremely cold and disagreeable weather prevailed at the time of the accident, but did not present any road hazards to cause the big truck to turn over.

## Dry Norther Claws Texas Panhandle

A DRY Norther clawed its way into the Texas Panhandle late Saturday and knocked the props from under the mercury all the way to the Rio Grande. Cutting winds Sunday left the vast area shivering despite the bright sunshine.

Odie Killingsworth who maintains the US Weather Bureau instruments here said the mercury dropped to 6 degrees sometime Sunday night or early Monday. Amarillo reported 1 degree.

The cold arctic air has been reluctant to release its grip with low 20's reading Tuesday night. There was some relief yesterday but stronger winds which made the cold more uncomfortable.

The cold weather here resulted in little reported damage except the usual frozen pipes and car radiators. Most livestock, in good condition withstood the cold without apparent ill effects.

While this area was feeling the bite of cold dry air, the north-east part of the nation was buried under a blanket of snow that brought business and traffic to a standstill in many sections.

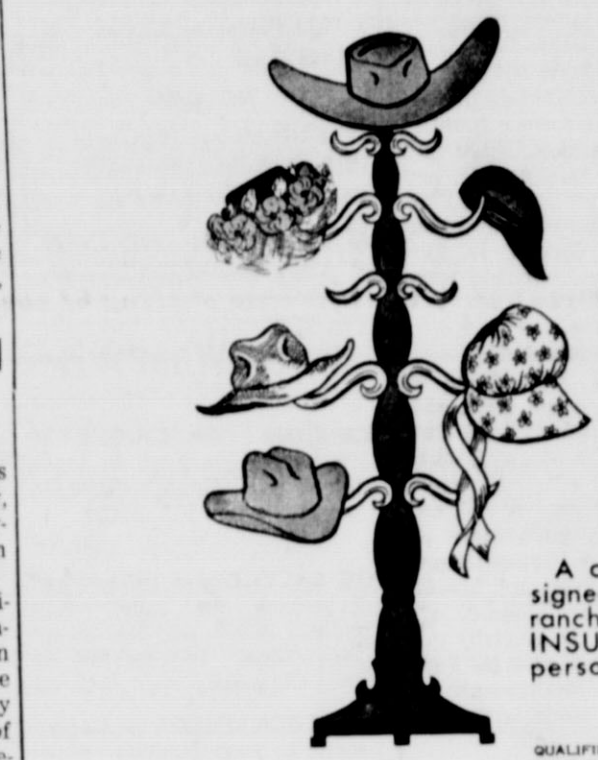
