

Spray, Gilbert and Timmons Win County Nominations

CRATS went to the Matador County election on Tuesday in Motley County. Of 1,060 votes were polled in five boxes, which is to be near the maximum strength of the populated, cattle-raising area. More than half (593) were polled in the Matador County precincts.

Spray had an easy victory over the sheriff nominee with 613 votes to 335 for Meador and 88 for Buddy

Bryan Cammack (296 to 284). Out at Northfield J. R. (Reece) Timmons was elected by a write-in over W. L. (Bill) Cook for the office of County Commissioner, precinct 3 (Timmons 33 to 22 for Cook). Timmons had neglected to get his name on the ballot.

Largest vote received by any candidate in Motley County went to State Treasurer Jesse James who received 1052 out of a possible 1060.

Healty Is Favorite

State Representative Bill Healty of Paducah received 709 votes to his opponent's (James Thompson of Wilbarger County) 216. He

was re-elected by the 82nd District.

Senator Ralph Yarborough carried the county by 24 votes over his opponent Gordon McLendon of Dallas (481 to 457). In the state Yarborough was re-elected by about 4-to-3 margin. McLendon polled over 600,000 votes.

Biggest vote-getter in Texas, Governor John Connally, received 735 votes in this county to 232 for Don Yarborough.

Freston Smith of Lubbock received 857 votes to 81 for Albert Fuentes for Lt. Governor. Joe Pool received 427 to Dan Sullivan's 230 for US Representative at large. Unopposed Attorney

General Waggoner Carr received 1044 votes.

John White rolled up 725 votes for Commissioner of Agriculture to Shivers' 173. Jerry Sadler took 733 to Williams' 151 for Comish of Land Office.

Unopposed Bob Calvert received 1052 votes for Comptroller and Ben Ramsey took 1039 for Railroad commissioner. In the unexpired place Langdon 385, Owens 465. For Assoc. Supreme Court Justice, McGee 364, Pope 439.

Court of Civil Appeals: Northcutt 436, Martin 403. Congressmen: Walter Rogers received 1040 votes. District Attorney

John Stapleton received 1043. County Attorney Howard Traweck received 1020.

Furman Vinson was re-elected County Democratic Chairman with 1024 votes. Sam Ross was named Committeeman of Precinct 2 with 162 votes. Keith Patton was named to Precinct 1 with 56 votes. Incumbent Jody Graham received 16 and there were 15 other write-ins. W. H. Marshall was elected at Roaring Springs with 18 votes (9 write-in candidates were listed).

Here is the way the county voted by boxes in the sheriff's race: Flomot: Meador 17, Spray 75, Owens 1; Roaring Springs:

Meador 31, Spray 119, Owens 55; Matador: Meador 241, Spray 315, Owens 25; Northfield: Meador 17, Spray 28, Owens 1. Absentee: Meador 13, Spray 32, Owens 0; Whiteflat: Meador 15, Spray 45 and Owens 6.

Six George Bush received six votes for US Senator. Most of the other GOP candidates received 4 votes each since two voters had not paid poll taxes and could not vote in state offices.

Luther B. Green was re-elected County Republican Chairman with 6 votes. He was also named precinct chairman. The election was held at his home.

He said at least 25 Democrats called and inquired about the election and indicated they would support GOP candidates in the general election.

Weevil Problem Is Explained to Lions

A SMALL INSECT, the boll weevil, may destroy the present economy of the great Plains irrigated district and the rolling plains area immediately east. Grim testimony of the might of the weevil is the rich black soil of east Texas, once in the lap of wealth, now reduced to ghost towns, grass, tomato patches and orchards. Shadow of the dreaded weevil was brought here Tuesday at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club.

Explanation of the weevil and the fight to curb it was by Don Anderson, Crosbyton cotton grower. He was introduced by Lion Bundy Campbell.

Anderson said the weevil has been found west of Lubbock and that 2 million acres of irrigated farm land is being placed in jeopardy. He cited advances made by the Dispause Control plan of eradicating weevils, proven 90 to 95% effective. He said the plan as worked out by Plains farmers would be about 750 cents per bale (including government aid).

There is but one fault with the program to destroy the weevil in late fall months. Every cotton grower must cooperate. Permission must be given to spray fields at crucial times. Cattle and people must be kept out of the fields for approximately 24 hours. Permission will not be mandatory, but the success of the program may be stymied by a few "hold-outs" who refuse to join their neighbor in a fight for the survival of our present economy.

Mr. Anderson said the first year cost will be the highest cost as the weevils are brought under control.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Elm leaf beetles are starting to appear, and unless owners wish to allow severe damage to elm trees, treatment should be started as soon as beetles or feeding is detected. The insect

overwinters in sheltered places, and fly to elm trees with unfolding leaves. Spray the entire tree and trunk. One spray that will do the job is DDT, mixed as follows (1 pt. of 25% emulsifiable DDT in 50 gallons of water). Other materials that will control the insects are found in L-199, Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Ornamental Plants, which is available in my office.

Motley County ranchers may be closer to screwworm cases than they suspect. Number of cases in the valley continue to slowly increase, and movement is towards the north, with Seguin the extent of the movement. So far, 7 cases have been reported in the state.

Fly blows have been reported in Motley County, so all livestock owners are urged to keep a close watch on their animals for the next 60 days. If a case of worms is found, contact some worms, fill out the information sheet, and mail them to the Mission station. If you do not have a mailing kit, let me know, as I will see that you get one, as I have about 40 in my office.

Early detection and treatment are necessary to prevent an outbreak. One unreported and unconfirmed case could cause a serious outbreak of screwworms in the county, as no flies will be released unless a specimen is submitted to the Mission Lab.

Control of overwintered boll weevils is more effective and less expensive when control measures are used on a community or county basis. Two essential steps in reducing the weevil are: 1. People in each community reaching an agreement a short planting period, with the 2 to 3

week period that has produced the highest yield the best guide in most years. 2. Apply insecticides to kill off overwintered weevils before they have a chance to reproduce.

Application should be made before the first squares are one-third grown. Recommendations are given in L-218, Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects, which is available in my office.

In recent tests, use of the systemic insecticide, ronnel, proved more effective in the control of cattle grubs than did the use of other systemics which were applied to the backs of animals. A salt and mineral mixture containing 5.5% ronnel was fed to range cattle on a free choice basis in either block or granular form. A 92% control was obtained, and for the best results, the mixture should be fed at least 75 consecutive days between May 1 and Sept. 1. By feeding the systemic, better fly control was also noted.

Meat packers pay 1 to 2 cents a pound less for cattle infested with grubs. Heel flies appear during the first warm days of spring, and begin laying eggs along the hairs on the lower parts of the leg. In three or four days, the eggs hatch and the larvae burrow into the skin. During the next five months the larvae burrow through the soft connective tissue between muscles in their journey to the gutlet. Once in the gutlet, the grubs remain there about three months before beginning their migration to just beneath the skin on the back. Here they cut breathing holes and remain for 6 weeks, dropping to the ground in December and January to pupate.

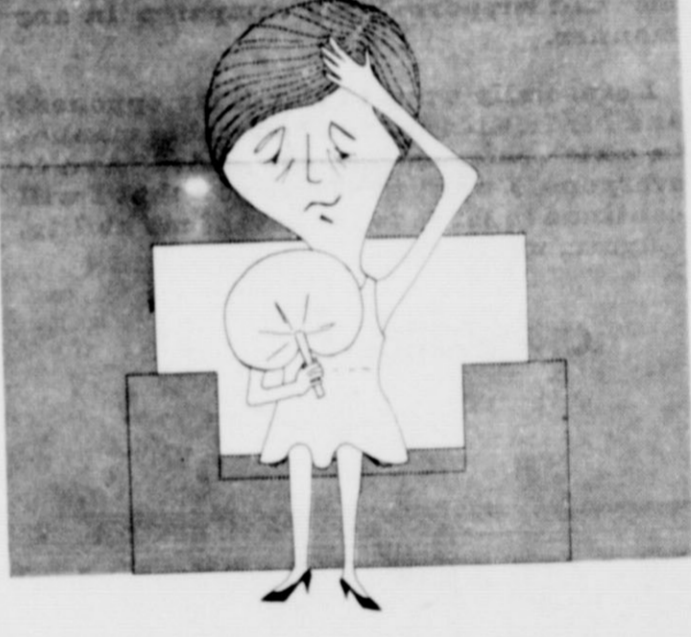

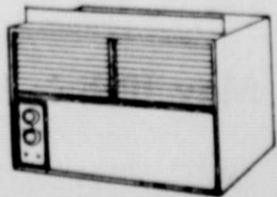
