Man Dies when Car Leaps Off Highway



LEAP INTO ETERNITY—Above automobile leaped from an embankment on US Highway 70 late Saturday and resulted in the death of the driver, Jimmy Mack Dunlap, 24, of Lubbock.

A CAR HURLING 220 feet from U S Highway 70 about 5:45 p.m. Saturday claimed the life of a Lubbock man, Jimmy Mack Dunlap, 24, R. A. (Dick) Morrison, 26, also of Lubbock, opened the right hand door of the crumpled 1962 Ford Fairlane, and stepped out with extremely minor injuries. Dunlap had been thrown from his car and lay bleeding near the left hand rear fender. He was brought to Stanley Hospital by Eudy-Seale ambulance and pronounced dead upon arrival.

The car, reportedly driven at a high rate of speed in a 40-mile per hour restricted zone, left the broad dirt highway about 1 1/2 miles east of the Floyd County line. US Highway 70 is under construction in the area. Leaping from a high embankment, the automobile turned over several times before landing on its wheels.

The two men were enroute to Quanah to see Dunlap's wife, Carolyn, who had been visiting with his parents. Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Dunlap of Quanah, about a week.

Dunlap, a native of Quanah, had lived in Lubbock about five years and was foreman for Metal Products Co. Motley County Deputy Sheriff Bobby Williams was first on the scene following the accident. He summoned Highway patrolman F. E. (Buck) Johnson and John Whitfield from Paducah for the investigation.

Dunlap also is survived by a son, Johnny Mack Jr.; a brother, Jack, Albuquerque; a sister, Mrs. Jesse Harmon, Copperas Cove and a grandmother, Mrs. C. R. Spears, Dallas.

Yellowjackets Ground Eagles

Roaring Springs washup Yellowjackets Friday night swarmed on the Southland Eagles and grounded their visitors 23-14. It was the Jackets 2nd home game of the season, with a record of 4 wins and 1 loss.

Scoring first, the Eagles started goalward with a pass interception. Don Altman made the final 3 yds on an end run. The scoring attempt was futile. The Eagles soared but briefly.

Don Tardy went up the middle for the final 3 yds. to paydirt and the first Jacket score. A pass from Joey Thacker to Tardy placed the host team in the lead 8-6. John Ho-Gland soon scored again on an 8-yd. end run but the extra points try failed.

Only score in the 2nd quarter was a safety for two additional Jackets points. John Castillo and Ronnie Clifton tackled an Eagle behind the goal line.

In the 3rd quarter Castillo recovered a fumble on the Roaring Springs 16 yd. line. March down field was aided when Thacker passed to Gordon McGee who ran for 20 additional yards. Tardy took the ball over but the play was called back because of a Jacket infraction.

In the 4th quarter the pigskin was tossed like a basketball when McGee came out with the ball on a pass interception play in which several players from both teams attempted to snag the aerial fumble. Tardy then took the ball for a 27-yd. end run and the 3rd Jacket TD. Castillo kicked the extra point and gave the Jackets a total of 23 points. Duke Altman made the last Eagle score and Don Altman ran the ball over for 2 extra points.

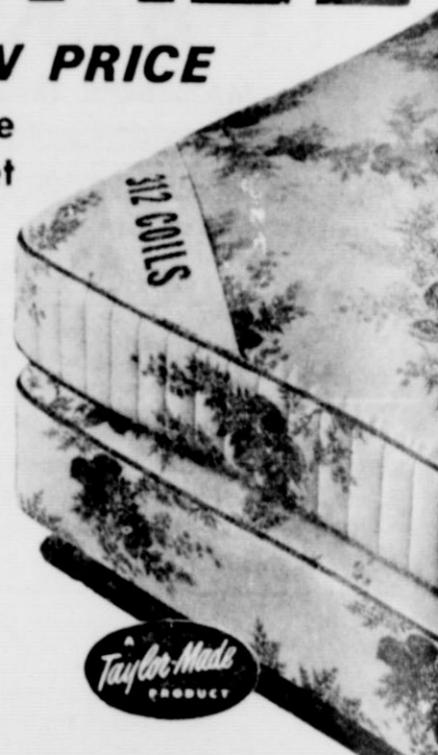

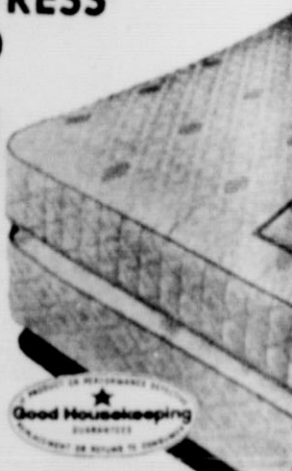
