Former Resident Claimed by Death

A former Matador resident, J. W. (John Wesley) Wideman, 89, died recently in Stephenville, where he had resided since 1930. He was a brother of local residents, Mrs. M. L. Patton and Mrs. Bertha Jackson. Another sister, Mrs. Ellen Couch of Houston, and a brother, Press Wideman of Alma, Okla., also survive. Mr. Wideman died May 5 in the Stephenville Hospital.

He was born in Missouri and came to Texas in 1881 with his parents, who settled first in Waco then moved to Erath County. He was married in Stephenville, Dec. 10, 1893 to Ettie May Mitchell and in 1915 they moved with their family to Matador. They returned to Stephenville about 1917, then came back to Matador in 1927, but again returned to Stephenville in 1930. Mrs. Wideman died in 1960.

Survivors include two sons, two daughters, 8 grandchildren and 13 great-grandchildren in addition to his brother and sisters.

School Transfer Deadline is Near

Applications for transfer of pupils from one school district to another in Motley County will be accepted through June 1 at the office of County Judge and Ex-Officio County Superintendent Elbert Reeves.

Parents or guardians desiring student transfers must fill out a form in Judge Reeves' office, giving the name of the district out of which the student is transferred and the name of the district to which transfer is requested.
Names, ages, sex, and grades of all pupils in the transfer and the reason for the request must be included in the application.
The County School Board will consider applications at the regular meeting in June. Transfers must be requested in May so that state funds can be allocated properly in shifting from one district to another.
Forms are now available at Judge Reeves' office and will be mailed to those requesting them. These applications must be from one district to another only, Judge Reeves said.

Criswell to be president of the Baptist Missionary Society. After Mrs. Criswell's death, it was in our home that he (our pastor) asked Mrs. J. L. Burleson, ("Mother Burleson") to

take charge as president. "Mother Burleson", being a very timid woman said, "I can't do that" and burst into tears. I shall never forget that."

"Mother" Burleson became one of the most revered women in the church and a cook book published by the Missionary Society in 1935 was dedicated to her. Also named in her honor was one of the W.M.U. circles.

A number of meetings were held in the C. L. Glenn home after Mrs. Glenn fell in 1935 and was confined to a wheel chair. It was at one of these meetings, held to celebrate Mother Burleson's birthday, that the Sunshine Circle was renamed the Burleson Circle, Miss Glenn related.
