Old House Played Dramatic Role in County's History

OLD HOUSE that was numbered among this county's sparse pioneer homes, is soon to be razed. The old Keith home on Hollow, about two miles south of Matador. The old structure on the homestead of Mr. and Mrs. Cribbs, Motley County pioneers, has sheltered five generations of the Keith family. Mr. Cribbs were the parents of Mrs. D. C. Keith. The south room of the old house was originally built by J. Moore, and it is believed the house was hauled from Quanah. Mr. Cribbs moved the one and a half to sideroom to homestead about 1900. Presently he had lived in the half out since filing on the land in the early 90's. An east room added about 1906. In addition to the house was a two long ground floor porch, two long porches and a set upstairs room were connected. Contractors were Evans Spiegel, assisted by T. F. E. This was the D. C. Keith and later the home of Mr. Mrs. Chas. Keith. After the house was built, the narrow room upstairs was scene of dances where tall boys danced in the narrow lines of the sloping roof. The old house which was the home of pioneers and had a role in the county's dramatic early history, must be razed by July 1. Modern home will be erected on the site through Farm Home Administration financing. Current Mr. and Mrs. Chas. Keith living in Matador with his wife, Miss Mary Keith, and the new house is completed.

Cotton Acreage Measure Started

Measuring of Motley County cotton allotment acreage started Monday under the direction of Duane Markham, it was announced this week by Tommy Moore, ASC office manager. A group of eight "crop reporters" have been in training for the past week. In addition to measuring the cotton land the crew will also measure the soil bank base crop acreage. Mr. Moore said. Mr. Moore said that because of the short period of time in which the measuring must be completed (July 1) it will be necessary to measure fields as the crews reach them. Only cotton that is up can be measured. Excess authorized planting must be destroyed within 15 days after the farmer has received his overplanting notice. Ranchers Fighting Back at Mesquite

Ranchers in Motley and adjoining counties are fighting back at the mesquite infestation which has put thousands of acres of fine grazing lands out of production. Four aerial spraying "rigs" were in operation last week and more than 15,000 acres were sprayed with 245-T, the most successful agent known to combat the mesquite. Conditions have been ideal for spraying, according to Tommy Moore, office manager of the Motley County ASC office. Abundant rains and late planting of cotton have provided the best "spraying period" on record he said. Winds will carry the powerful spray as far as 15 miles under certain conditions and destroy crops. With crop seed still in the ground, ranchers have taken advantage of the position nature has afforded them. It is reported that E. E. Moss & Sons are spraying their large ranch acreage in Dickens County to destroy shinnery (scrub oak) and mesquite. The land was formerly in the Red Lake pasture of the old Matador Ranch.

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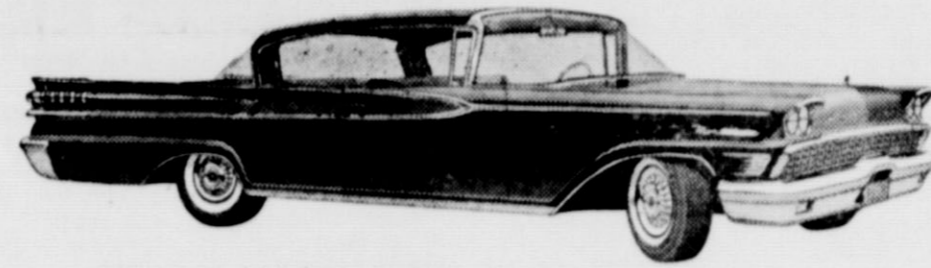

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
