Returning Air Force Colonel Says Japan is Buffer to Communism in Asia

A NATION ONCE THE ARCHENEMY of the United States is possibly one of the nation's best friends, and certainly a shining example of the free world at the very gates of communism. Japan is a mighty buffer to totalitarian Russia in the opinion of Lt. Col. Haynes Baumgardner who has recently returned with his family from three years of duty in Tokyo, Mrs. Baumgardner is the former Myrnae Barkley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Barkley of Matador.

The Colonel, who has been in the service more than 20 years, will enter Air War College (professional school) in Montgomery, Alabama on July 28. Eleven months of training is required for graduation. Col. Baumgardner was reared at Wellington.

There is no unemployment in Japan, tight little island of 90 million population. Everyone works with pride and dignity although the work may be carrying rocks in a basket to build a modern freeway.

Col. Baumgardner was impressed by the seemingly endless industry of the Japanese people, their hospitality and their great sincerity.

Mrs. Baumgardner was impressed by the culture of the Japanese, their extreme cleanliness and their rapid adoption of western ways. While in Tokyo she received a teacher's degree in flower arranging from the Sopsutsu School. She also taught in the elementary school on the base, during their three years residence there.

Preparing For Olympics Japan is preparing for the Olympic Games in 1964 and building great modern freeways in congested cities where streets were designed more for the rick-

shas rather than modern conveyances. Japan is building one of the most advanced rail systems and trains in the world (with speeds of over 200 kph) to transport Olympic visitors.

Already the rail system is excellent and the most accepted means of transportation. Trains run on absolute schedule.

Japan has made great industry expansion that places it in one of the world's foremost positions. On the other hand Japanese agriculture has kept pace with the increasing population. Every foot of tillable land is under cultivation, frequently with two or three crops growing at the same time. The ingenuity of the Japanese has brought irrigation water to the mountain tops to serve the terraced farm plots. The Japanese family eats rice at every meal.

Mrs. Baumgardner was impressed with the wonderful vegetables offered in the markets. "They were beautiful," she declared.

Anxious to Learn English The Japanese are anxious to learn the English language and many speak it fluently. The children are taught English in school but rarely have a chance to use it.

M.; and Effie Cobb Maroney, Lovington, N. M. Jaughter of one of the early pastors, the Rev. S. A. Cobb, who was killed in 1897.

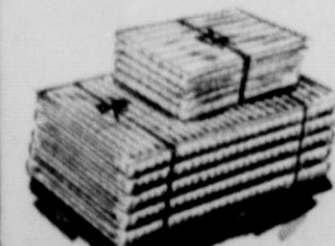

to practice it. The Baumgardners had hardly been located before Japanese children asked to meet the Baumgardner boys so they could practice use of English. Col. Baumgardner's interpreter was highly efficient and had been taught English by a missionary.

The Japanese people are honest. Col. Baumgardner said. It is their nature. "As an example," he declared, "if a peach tree bore fruit on the street in front of our house, the fruit would ripen and none would be taken. If you lost your watch, it was merely necessary to tell someone and by an almost super natural intelligence system, word would spread quickly and the watch would be returned. Japan, of course has crooks and outlaws, like any nation, but the people are gentle and honest. They are hard-working and ingenious."

The Japanese have high moral standards, which in some ways conflict with those acceptable to the west. Men and women attend public bath houses (they scrub themselves two or three times before entering the pools) without clothing. There is no disease and high blood pressure is the greatest cause of death.

Japan is one of the great foreign users of American cotton. One of the most popular garments is the ukata, similar to a dressing robe. A guest, after entering a hotel, removes his clothing and puts on his ukata. It is for ease and comfort. He is properly dressed for dining on the street if he desires.

The Japanese is devoted to his family, especially the oldest boy who will carry the family name. Family size is about the same as in the United States.

Communism has lost ground in Japan as the nation turns more to western ways. Communist influence is present as is socialism, but it is an extreme minority. The ambitious and progressive Japanese is pro-western and rapidly turning more to western ways.
