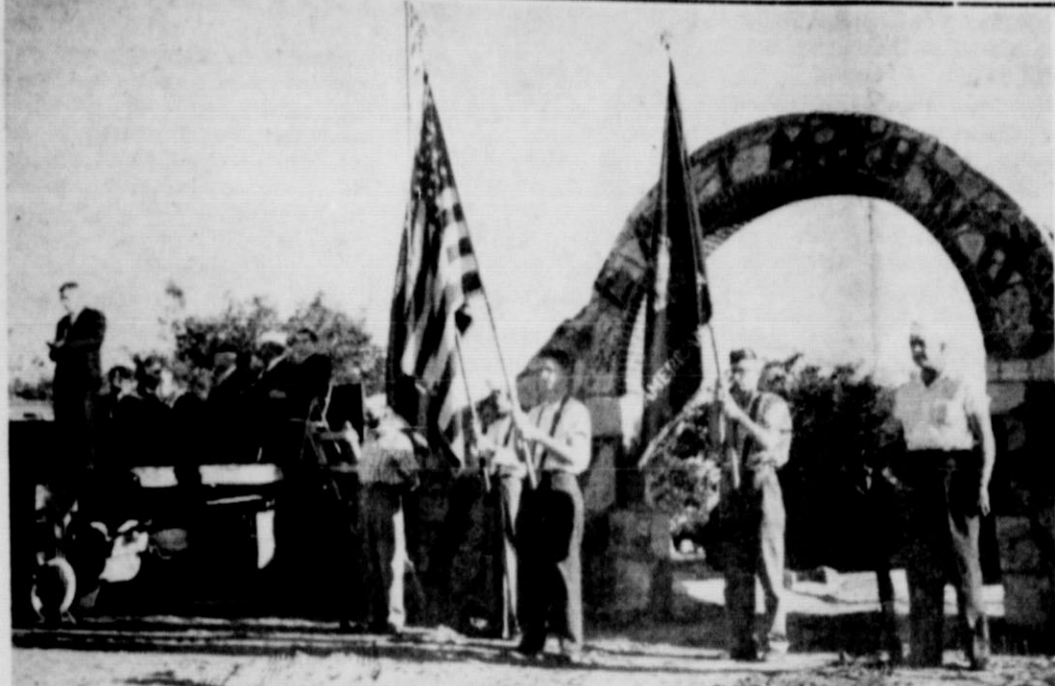

## VO-AG SUMMER PROGRAM HERE VALUED AT \$4,618

Matador Vo-ag students have supervised farming programs valued at \$4,618.50, it was revealed this week by Bill Moss, local vo-ag teacher. These programs consist of 53 head of livestock and 325 acres of crops, Moss said.

The duties of the local vo-ag teacher do not stop at the end of the school year. Farming programs of agriculture students are conducted on a year around basis, and summer activities of the vo-ag teacher are as demanding as his classroom duties during the regular school term.

Because many of the students engage in crop production projects, which are primarily summer-time projects, much of Mr. Moss's time is devoted to giving educational instruction to students on their farms. It is here that students put into practice the methods and techniques they have learned in the classroom.

In addition to his daily supervisory chores, there is work to be done inside the agriculture building. Mr. Moss depends upon current scientific and experimental data for his teaching materials. Such materials must continuously be revised, reorganized and made current if it is to be of value to the people he serves.

Important Meetings

There are also important meetings he will attend. During the first week in June Mr. Moss attended a Farm Electrification Shortcourse at Texas Technological College.

Delegates from the local FFA chapter will be taken to the State FFA convention which will be held in Austin July 15-17. Approximately five FFA members will attend from the local chapter. They along with delegates from the other 1100 FFA chapters will conduct business for the 45,000 Texas Future Farmers of America.

## Jan Barton Named To Meet President

AUSTIN (Special) — Miss Jan Barton of Matador is one of the 14 young people named by Governor Price Daniel to serve on his Committee for the 1960 White House Conference on Children and Youth.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Barton, Jr., of Matador.

Miss Barton is state vice-chairman of the 4-H Clubs and represents the 111,000 4-H Club members in Texas on the Governor's Committee. She is also Area 1 President of the Future Homemakers of America and has received the state degree in F.H.A. Talented in public speaking, Miss Barton won first place in the state and fourth place in the National Public Speaking 4-H Club Contest and placed second in the state's Interscholastic League's Senior Girls Declamation Contest.

Every ten years since Theodore Roosevelt called the first White House Conference on Children and Youth in 1909, each President has called such a meeting. President Eisenhower has scheduled this one for March 27-April 2 in Washington. Governor Daniel has named more than 100 prominent Texans to make up the State Committee.

Dr. Guy D. Newman, President of Howard Payne College, is State Chairman. He expressed his enthusiasm today for including young people on the Committee. "We need the young people's own ideas of their problems and what they think can be done. It also gives them their rightful responsibility of citizenship," he said.

These young people represent only youth organizations operating within the public and private school systems, yet their groups have a total membership of 380,000 in Texas.

These young Committee Members are working with the Youth Participation Committee headed by Dr. J. W. Edgar, Commissioner of Education. They are determining the ways the junior and senior high school students in Texas will participate in the White House Conference.

Two 2 a. m. Rains Sweep County Area

All members will select two work groups with the list being as follows: 4-H Records, Safety, Plant Life, Entomology, Wild Life, Family Life, Soil & Water, and Recreation Leadership.

The group from Motley County will also assist with the planning of vespers and ceremonials, and groups from other counties will assist with Citizenship training. All will have a chance to go swimming and take part in the evening parties. Free choice periods are also scheduled so that 4-H members can take part in training of groups other than their selections.

4-H members who are interested in attending the camp and have not written their Extension Agent stating their reasons for attending should do so immediately, said County Agent Bill Palmeyer.

A Spur schoolboy whose home is Flomot, is teaching a Sunday school class for the deaf.

He is Bobby Joe Smith, 16, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Smith of Flomot, both of whom are deaf. The boy and his sister, Enlala, 11, attend school at Spur where they live with an aunt, Miss Eula Whitaker, a teacher in the Spur school.

Bobby recently surrendered to be a missionary to the deaf and upon his conversion started the Sunday school class. He has an attendance of around eight, according to Rev. Ryle Fugitt, pastor of the Spur First Baptist Church. He interprets the pastor's sermons at the preaching hour and deaf people attend from Flomot, Dickens, Tulia and Spur.

The Smiths have two children at home, Jimmie, 6, who will attend Flomot school this fall, and Judy, 3.

None of the Smith children is deaf, but all learn to "speak" by sign language in communicating with their parents, before they learn to speak orally.

# Old Matador Jail Is Scene Of Play

DELAYED FAME is coming to Motley County's oldest public building, the native stone jail house, built about 60 years ago on the bank of Hackberry Creek.

Several years ago William Saroyan, eminent playwright (Pulitzer Prize Award winner) used the scene of the Matador jail in a one-act play, "Hello Out There." The play was in a group of unrelated plays by Saroyan entitled "Floydada to Matador."

The famous playwright never visited the Matador-Floydada area, but he was a close personal friend of the late Stanley Rose, native son of Matador. Rose, who operated a book store on Hollywood Boulevard for many years, provided the idea which his friend, Saroyan, used as a nucleus for the play.

"A clownish friend of mine named Stanley Rose, (explained Saroyan) one night on a street corner in Fresno began calling out as if he were in the wilderness — Hello out there! I liked the sound and enjoyed the absurdity of it."

Production rights to the play are for sale by a New York publishing house and may be obtained for \$10.

Little Theatre Group Here

A marillion Little Theatre's Adult Workshop is going to produce "Hello Out There," Sunday evening, June 21. Two officials of the Workshop, Mrs. Bill Shea and Mrs. Jim Parks have made two trips to Matador to obtain information on the early history of the jail, Matador, and the Matador Ranch.

They announced Monday that the entire cast will be brought here Saturday to obtain "Matador atmosphere" and become familiar with the scene which they will portray in the Wolfen Village Little Theatre.

The Little Theatre seats only 160. There is no box office. Seats are available only on invitation, at admission prices of 75c for adults and 50c for children. The Tribune has been assured sufficient gratis tickets for Matador residents, who will be honored guests of the Workshop.

Matador will receive publicity through the production of the play. Pictures of the jail were made Monday and will be used in news stories and in the printed programs. An artist has been engaged to do a sketch of Matador's Main Street and business area with relation to the location of the jail. The sketch of Matador will be used on the programs.

A COWBOY STOPPED to water his horse at a windmill on the bank of Hackberry Creek here in 1900. A school girl in the yard adjoining saw the cowboy. Nine years later they were married.

Sunday Mr. and Mrs. L. E. Cooper of Roaring Springs celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. He was the cowboy and Mrs. Cooper was the school girl.

The windmill was located near the present site of the Tribune building and was used as a public watering place. A young attorney, G. E. Hamilton and his two sisters were living in two rooms attached to the one-room pioneer newspaper printing shop. The two girls kept house for their brother. The older girl, Ella, later Mrs. A. Freeman, now of Grand Prairie, was teaching school and Maggie, then 17, was attending school.

Lige E. Cooper, then a cowboy, had come to Motley County three years before from Oklahoma, where his father had participated in a "land run" in 1889. Mr. Cooper was born at Pilot Point, Texas, March 23, 1882. His parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Cooper settled on Dutchman Creek in 1897.

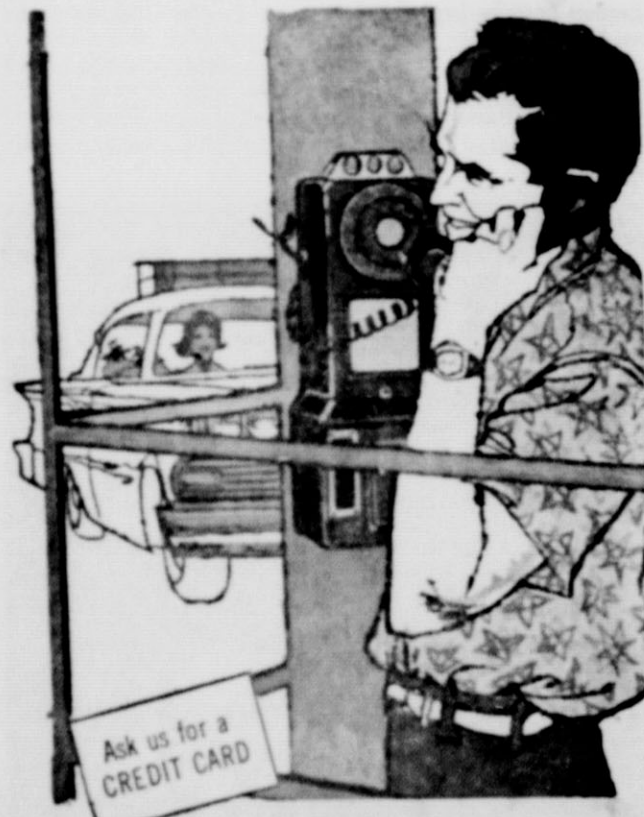
