The following Emergency Order was filed with the Office of the Motley County Clerk on Tuesday.

EMERGENCY ORDER March 13, 2000 PROHIBITION OF **OUTDOOR BURNING**

WHEREAS, in accordance with provision of the Texas Disaster Act of 1975, a state of disaster has been declared based on the imminent

WHEREAS, declaration of such disaster authorized the imposition of increase the likelihood of such fires;

(1) Actions Prohibited: A person violates this order if he burns any combustible material outrated areas of Motley County for the side of an enclosure which serves to contain all flames and/or sparks, or orders such burning by others.

(2) Enforcement:

(a) Upon notification of suspected outdoor burning, the fire department assigned to the location of the fire shall respond to the scene and take immediate measures to contain and/or extinguish the fire.

(b) As soon as possible, a duly commissioned peace officer shall be sent to the scene to investigate the nature of the fire.

Local firefighters respond to Floydada fire

Historical Church heavily damaged

County firefighters were called to in front of the courthouse, two blocks assist the Floydada Volunteer Fire Department on Sunday, March 12,

when flames and smoke engulfed the Floydada First Baptist Church.
Reportedly the fire broke out about 4:30. Flames leaped as high as 50 or 60 feet said Mayor Bobby Gilliland. A crowd of about 500 people watched helplessly as the 1928 landmark burned. Smoke was visible from as far as 15 miles from Floydada Floydada.


An automobile dealership nearby was forced to remove about 75 cars as the flaming debris from a possible explosion ignited two cars and the roof of Oden's Chevrolet. Debris fell

north of the fire. Several Floydada firefighters were treated for smoke inhalation and one for a heart ail-

Although Motley County volun-teer firemen in full gear rushed equipment and help to their fellow firefighters, an estimated two-thirds of the block-long, three-story church was a total loss, with only the brick walls left standing. The newer santuary portion was saved, all be it smoke and water damaged.

The ruins were still smoldering Monday evening, and investigators were unable to pinpoint the exact







In accordance with Article IV, Section 4.06 of the Bylaws of Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, Inc., the Board of Directors has appointed a Committee on Nominations to prepare a list of nominations for Directors to be elected at the annual membership meeting of the Cooperative on April 27, 2000. Three (3) Directors, one each from District 2, District 5, and District 8, will be elected in 2000. Although Directors are nominated from the District which they represent, all members in attendance at the annual meeting vote on all candidates who may be properly nominated.

SECTION 4.02 QUALIFICATIONS:

No person shall be eligible to become or remain a director of the Cooperative who is a close relative of an incumbent director or an employee of the Cooperative, or is not a member in good standing of the Cooperative and receiving service within the District he represents; PROVIDED, that the operating or chief executive of any member which is not a natural person, such as a corporation, church, etc., or his designee, shall be eligible to become a director, from the Directorate District in which such member is located, if he or such designee (1) is in substantial permanent occupancy, direction or use of the premises served by the Cooperative, and (2) is a permanent and year-round resident within or in close proximity to an area served by the Cooperative; BUT PROVIDED FURTHER, that no more than one (1) such person may serve on the Board of Directors at the same time. No person shall be eligible to become or remain a director of, or to hold any other position of trust in, the Cooperative who dies not have the legal capacity to enter into a binding contract or is in any way employed by or financially interested in a competing enter-prise, or a business selling electric energy or supplies to the Cooperative, or a business primarily engaged in selling electrical or plumbing appliances, fixtures or supplies to, among others, the members of the Coop-erative. No person shall take or hold office as a Director who is the incumbent of or candidate for an elective public office in connection with which a salary is paid.

SECTION 4.05 DIRECTORATE DISTRICTS

The territory served by the Cooperative shall be divided into nine (9) Directorate Districts. Each District shall be represented by one director and the Districts are described upon the map on the territory served by the District attached to the Bylaws and made a part hereof.

SECTION 4.06 NOMINATIONS

It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to appoint, not less than thirty (30) days nor more than one hundred eighty (180) days prior to the date of the meeting of the members at which directors are to be elected, a Committee on Nominations, consisting of not less than five (5) nor more than eleven (11) members. The Committee shall prepare and post at the principal office of the Cooperative at least twenty (20) days prior to the meeting a list of nominations for directors to be elected, listing separately the nominee(s) for each Directorate District from or with respect to which director must, pursuant to this Article, be elected at the meeting. The Committee may include as many nominees for any director to be elected from or with respect to a Directorate District as it deems desirable. Any fifteen (15) or more members of the Cooperative, acting together, may make additional nominations in writing over their signatures, listing their nominee(s) in like manner, not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting, and the Secretary shall post such nominations at the same place where the list of nominations made by the Committee is posted. The Secretary shall mail to the members with the notice of the meeting, or separately, but at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the meeting, a statement of the names and addresses of all nominee(s) for each Directorate District from or with respect to which a director must be elected, showing clearly those nominated by the Committee and those nominated by petition, if any. The chairman at such meeting, after all nominations so made have been duly announced, shall call for additional nominations from the floor and shall ascertain and announce, after any nominations made from the floor, the particular Directorate District from or with respect to which any additional candidates have been nominated.













The House panel assured producers their views would be weighed carefully when Congress sits down to patch or revise current farm legislation — a process that could begin sometime during the next year, Combest said. The congressional panel will host its next public hearing on farm policy March 17 in Memphis, Tenn.

Economic studies using representative farms as 'models' indicate U.S. farmers could remain in dire economic straits through 2004, according to Texas A&M's Agriculture and Food Policy Center.

"Many crop farms simply won't survive. Our economic outlook for crop farms is the worst it has ever been - not just for small farms, but across the board," said Ed Smith, Texas Agricultural Extension Service economist in marketing and policy. "Our models show relatively low crop prices through 2004, higher prices for beef cattle and hogs, and stable conditions for the dairy sector due to cheap feed grains.

"The past success of our policy of cheap, abundant food keyed on moving surplus commodities and food to other countries through the export market. Under current conditions, ag production subsidies and export enhancement efforts are necessary if we are to maintain a successful, dispersed agriculture."

Smith said acreage set-asides or expanded conservation programs are two options farmers and policymakers should consider when reviewing their options to curtail

price-depressing surplus production.
"Our current situation won't change much in 2000-2001 without some immediate adjustments in farm policy. At the same time, ad-hoc emergency assistance programs will likely continue, and we may see a revised crop insurance program," Smith added. "Policymakers will write another farm program after the current farm bill expires - government is never going to get totally 'out' of agriculture. It's simply too important to our national security."
