GERANIUMS FOR TEXAS GARDENS

Geraniums are an excellent spring planted annual for Texas gardens. These colorful plants are well suited for beds, borders and containers. Most varieties will reach a height of 14-18 inches and form a dense mound of dark green foliage. Although geraniums will tolerate partial shade, they perform best in full sun.

Several varieties of geraniums are available from local garden centers and other plant outlets. However, the 'Glacier' series has been recognized by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service as the best selection for 1987. These

plants have exhibited earlyflowering characteristics, good heat tolerance and a free-branching growth habit. At present, there are three varieties in this series: 'Glacier Crimson', 'Glac' 'Glacier Scarlet' 'Glacier Salmon' and

Most geraniums are grown from transplants that have been started from cuttings. Although seeded varieties are available, they have a tendency to become leggy and flowers shatter easily. If you're planning on starting your own plants, take 2-3 inch cuttings and let them sit out overnight before

sticking into containers filled with potting medium. This process allows the base of the cutting to "heal the base of the cutting to "heal over" and reduces disease problems later on. After cuttings have rooted, plant them in the garden 10-14 inches apart. Occasional pinching will stimulate branching and make plants bushy. To promost long-lasting color, compare blooms at they begin to ove blooms as they begin to



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
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Recollections

JOHN (SCANDALOUS JOHN) SELMAN

Back around the turn of the century 1900 A.D. there came into the Dickens section of the country, of family name Barnes and among them a big boy whose name was John Selman, a step-son to Barnes. John Selman was somewhere in his teens, as big as a Government mule, and just about as raw and inexperienced as they ever came. Old man Barnes was a one-horse farmer in those days, as most all other farmers were, and tilled a sandy, shinery farm to the North of Dickens. He also operated a well drilled in that section, when ever there was need for that sort of work trying to add to a scanty farm existance.

I do not recall now how John Selman became known as "Scandalous John", but am inclined Selman to think it was because of his looks more than anything attached to his conduct. John Selman was big, awkward, green and more or less a sight to see in the cattle country. He had never worked with cattle, and it is more than doubtful if he had ever ridden horses a great deal. Just a big, rough, uncouth boy, raised on a farm mostly, that became uprooted and landed in a ranch country, possibly more by chance than intent. As far as I ever knew Selman showed inclination to become a cowboy. I do not recall that he ever worked in any cow outfit, as most other youngsters did.

Shortly after the Swenson Interest bought the Espuela Land and Cattle Co. Limited of London, England, John Selman got a job there. Mostly working around the Ranch Headquarters. In fact, if he ever did work with the Spur wagon, I never knew of it. So far as I know, Scandalous John Selman married and stayed at or around the Old Spur headquarters in the main; though he soon enough became a key-man for the Swensons there. It is true that he never stayed on the Spur Ranch very long, as he was transferred to the Swenson Ranch

Time moved along rapidly for some years, and by the time the Stamford Cowboy Reunion was

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organized, Scandalous John Selman had made the grade and was the "It" as range boss for the Swensons on the Flat Top Ranch, as well as being made the "Area Director" of the cowboy's reunion

one that had known Scandalous John Selman in days of his youth, and hadn't been with or around him during his apprenticeship as a cowboy, could scarcely realize there was any hidden latent ability in Scandalous John Selman, and felt his a joke, rather than any actual development. It just sort of seemed preposterous to think that John Selman had the making of a real cowboy and cowman, or the making of anything exceptional in any other line for that matter.

I saw John Selman again, as the Arena Director in the early Nineteen Thirties in Stamford after an elapsed time of around twenty years. The change was astonishing, startling and really mysterious. Almost beyond belief! Scandalous John had settled. He was still a big man, but he had lost the awkwardness of youth. He sat and handled his horse with the ease and dexterousness of an Indian that had been reared on a horse's back. He had learned and knew his lesson

A living illustration of the fact, a man is born a cowman rather than made one. Scandalous John as manager of the Swenson's Flat-Top Ranch, naturally rode the best horses they had there; and it was pleasantly astonishing to sit in the Grand Stand and watch that once awkward boy I had known, rope cattle and otherwise work his horse as though he was and had always

been a part of him.

The old adage that the outcome of a dogie calf is unpredictable, had been verified in the development of John Selman. He had made a real cowboy beyond any doubt. One that knew when, how, and what should be done, and then did it with all the grace, rhythm and smoothness of a natural born

Scandalous John had had practice and experience aplenty But unless one is endowed also with that invisible latent talent, a gift from nature's storehouse, all experience and practice in the world doesn't mean much of anything to a fellow. He had reached his manhood in years before he had a chance to develop the hidden qualities embedded in his being at birth; and because it was planted there, cow work fell in pleasant and natural

Scandalous John, as Arena Director didn't take part in the different classes of daily roping, still he did as much, possibly more roping than any man on the grounds. Boy, he could have held his own in most any class of competition and company! He had come out of the kinks, and in a class with the best of them.

Scandalous John Selman died in the spring of 1971 at Stamford, Texas, (Mary Green Webb.)

Social Security Tips

receiving credit for Social Securitycovered employment unless his or her name and Social Security number are correctly reported by the employer. If wages are reported without the worker's correct Social Security number, he or she may never receive credit for the earnings. Eligibility for and the amount of monthly retirement, disability, and survivors benefits for a worker and his or her family are determined by the worker's lifetime earnings credited to the worker's Social Security record. Employers should ask to see each


new employee's Social Security card and should record the worker's name and number exactly as shown on the card. If the worker has never had a Social Security number, he or she should be referred to any Social Security office to apply for one. It the employee had a card but lost it, he or she should also be referred to a social security office to apply for a replacement. A new card should

worker cannot be sure of also be obtained if the employee's name has changed; in this case, the new card will show the new name but the same number.
At the close of the calendar year,

employers must submit a Wage and Statement (Form W-2) to the Social Security Administration for each employee. The W-2 forms must be sent with a Transmittal of Income and Tax Statements (Form W-3). Each employee also gets a copy of

Employers are encouraged to submit their reports to the Social Security Administration by means of magnetic media rather than on paper. Magnetic media reporting is less expensive and reduces the less expensive and reduces the possibilty of loss, damage, and human error that may occur when paper reports are processed.




