residents of this area. Sale of this block of the famous ranch was made by John Stevens, D. I. W. Birnie and associates. The Hornica division had in the neighborhood of 36,000 acres. Sale was started about the first of April.

News fences are being built, wells drilled and tanks contracted, according to reports. So far as is known, no construction of buildings has been started. However, several of the new owners building homes in Matador for are contemplating buying or employees who will operate the various ranches.

Largest factor in equipping the new ranches will be the purchase of cattle to stock them. It was pointed out yesterday. No livestock has been on the ranch land since early this year and none was included in the sale.

One man associated in the transaction said he had been advised that some of the new owners would clear the mesquite and place part of the tillable acreage in cultivation.

FARMERS, DON'T FORGET FEDERAL GAS TAX REFUND

Matador, Motley County, Texas, Thursday, August 6, 1959

County farmers are urged to send in their claim for the 3c gal refund of federal tax paid on gasoline used on farm or ranch. Those who submitted claims in the past have been mailed cards to get for the refund, but those who have not submitted a claim should get a card and copy form from County Agent's office. All claims should be submitted to Director of Internal Revenue, Dallas, Texas in the Form 7090. You should keep your receipts for proof in case the refund is questioned. The copy is for your use in determining what gasoline is eligible, and how the amount of your refund is determined. Gasoline purchased between July 1, 1958 and June 30, 1959, is to be included on the card. Claims must be submitted by Sept. 30, 1959, so let the date slip up on you. You only use 100 gallons of gasoline, that is \$3.00 you are entitled to.

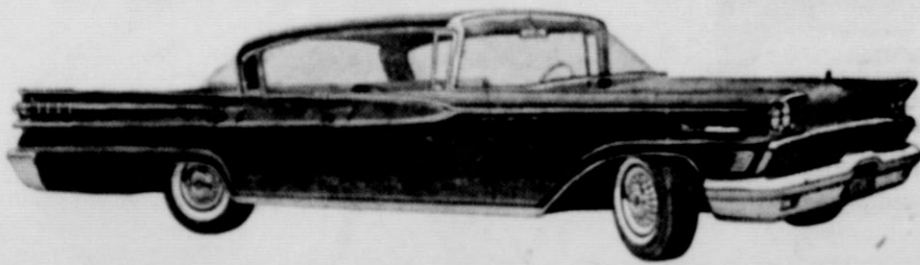
