occurred in the early days of the automobile, when he gave a hiker near Roaring Springs a ride. The man never had ridden in a car.

"I was going along at a pretty good clip," he once recalled, "when the fellow said, 'well, here is where I'm going,' opened the door and jumped out. I had to stop and treat him. It liked to have killed him."

One of the incidents in his life which has been recalled by friends was the time he rode a bicycle from Floydada to Childress — in the days when roads were mere wagon ruts across the prairie — a feat which few people would attempt today over paved highways.

It is ironical that Dr. Traweek's death was attributed to pneumonia, yet for almost half a century he was known as the "pneumonia doctor" in this area because of his ability to bring pneumonia patients through the feared disease.
