Rites Held For Pioneer

Funeral services were held Monday at 3 p. m. at the First Baptist Church, for Mrs. George W. Seigler, 86, pioneer resident of the county. She had lived in Motley County since 1900 and died about 3:30 a. m. Sunday, at the home of a son, Eldred Seigler and his family, with whom she resided.

Rev. Ray Manning, pastor of the church, officiated and was assisted by Rev. W. B. Vaughn, of Matador, retired Methodist minister. Interment was in East Mount Cemetery with Eudy Seigler Funeral Home in charge.

Pallbearers were J. D. Spray, Bill McGahren, Pat Sheridan, Ward Rattan, Willie Watten and Ralph Bennett.

Mrs. Seigler joined the Methodist church at the age of 13. A few years later she changed her membership to the Baptist church, and was a member of the Matador Baptist Church at the time of her passing.

Mrs. Seigler was born Jo Ida Kerby, at Brownsville, Tenn., August 24, 1870, and died at Matador, Texas, September 23, 1956, at the age of 86 years and 29 days. Her mother died when she was ten years old and two years later her father was killed in an accident. After living for a time with an older brother in Tennessee, she came to Texas to make her home with the family of another brother, Ed Kerby, of Farmersville. Here she met and later married George Washington Seigler, on Sept. 1, 1887.

Town Turns Out To Watch New Victory

MATADOR LEFT only an emergency fire-fighting crew at home Friday night as most of the community's population swished up on the fabulous Plains to watch the Matador Matadors pursue their winning streak against the Petersburg Buffaloes.

The Matadors moved enough fans 50 miles to fill more grandstand seats than were occupied by home residents of the "high cotton" country. It was worth the trip.

The salty Matadors herded the Buffaloes into an arena of defeat that finally registered 39-0 on the Buffs new electric scoreboard.

The Matadors were content to give up first downs and yardage in midfield but were able to tighten up and hold each time Petersburg threatened to score. In the fourth quarter the Matadors held the Buffs for downs on their own one yard line. On the first play after taking over, Ellithorp raced 99 yards for a touchdown behind sparkling downfield blocking, only to have the play nullified by a rule infraction.

Graham led the Matadors scoring with three touchdowns and a fine display of broken field running. He passed to Green for a fourth touchdown. Green scored on a pass and run that covered 60 yards, and on a pass interception. Ellithorp scored the other Matador touchdown.

Crowell Here Friday The Matadors will meet the Crowell Class A Wildcats here Friday night on Burleson Field in which promises to be an exciting game. The Wildcats, in three games this season, have lost to Seymour and Quanah and won over Memphis. The Matadors have tied Class AA Spur and defeated Vernon B and Class A Petersburg.

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Matador Records in Tech Archives

LUBBOCK—The American Tech Archives records of the legendary Matador Land Cattle Co. have been turned over to Texas Tech.

The acquisition gives Tech the thought to be the greatest collection of records from a ranching venture ever gathered in one place said Dr. Connor V. Connor, Tech archivist.

Approximately 60 feet, the new addition completes the Tech Archives, begun 27 years ago by Dr. H. Bailey Carroll.

Permission to bring records to Tech from the old Matador ranch near Matador in Big Bend County, the work was completed in 1932 by Dr. W. H. Holden.

The American headquarters have been in Denver since 1919. They include correspondence, ledgers, cash books, managers' reports, and other invaluable information.

Eight thousand Jinglebob cattle were the next addition to the growing concern. Seeing the unlimited possibilities, S. W. Lamm soon joined Britton in financing the enterprise, which later reorganized as the Matador Cattle Co. with a capitol stock estimated at \$50,000.

One year later the brand was replaced by the Matador V, however. In December 1922, the Matador Cattle Co. sold out to the newly created Matador Land and Cattle Co., Ltd. of Dundee, Scotland.

The transaction involved approximately three million acres of land and 60,000 head of cattle. The area was spread over Motley, Dickens, Cottle and Floyd counties.

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In 1904, the Alamocitas division of 200,000 acres of XT ranchland was purchased from the Capitol Syndicate. This included tracts on both sides of the Canadian River in Oldham county.

The original ranch was enlarged again, and by 1910, the company owned 861,000 acres in Texas, and had under lease an additional 650,000 acres in two northern pastures, for a total of 1,511,000 acres.

Acquire Denver Records
"Through the cooperation and help of Fulton and Joe Kirk Fulton, present owners of the Queen Sabe Ranch, former Alamocitas headquarters of the Matador, we were able to secure the shipment of the Denver records," Dr. Connor said.

The files lack only records from Dundee, Scotland, to complete the collection of historical documents from the largest foreign-owned cattle empire in America.

The Matador empire began in 1878, when A. M. Britton entered into a partnership with H. H. (Hank) Campbell. Campbell had purchased a small herd of cattle and made his headquarters in an abandoned dugout at Ballard Springs in Motley County, according to a report written by Dr. Holden for The Handbook of Texas.

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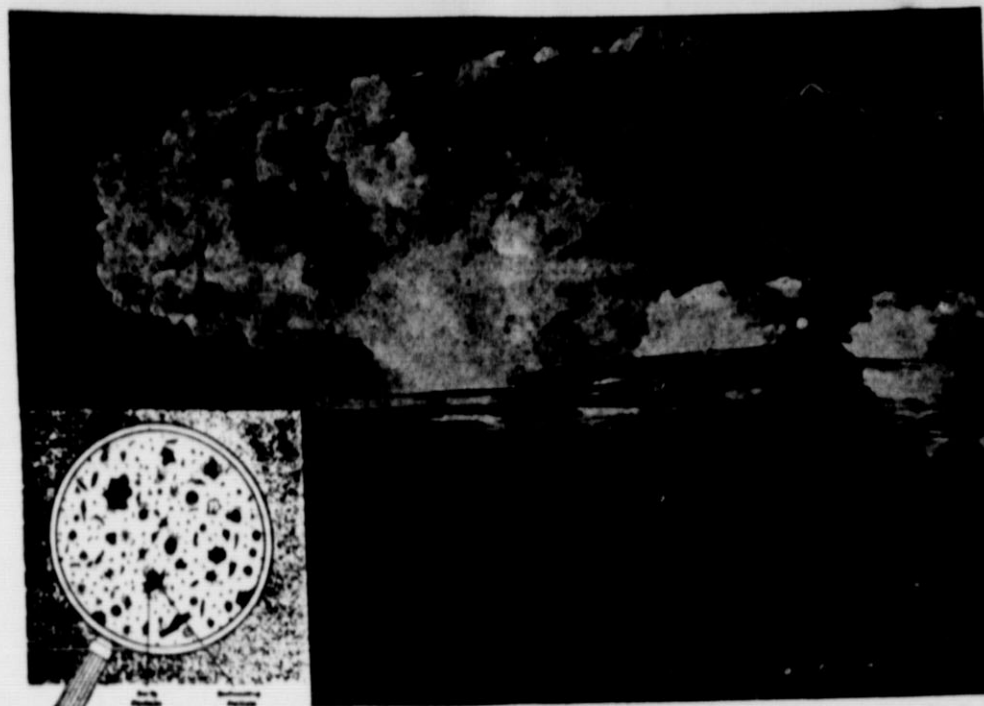

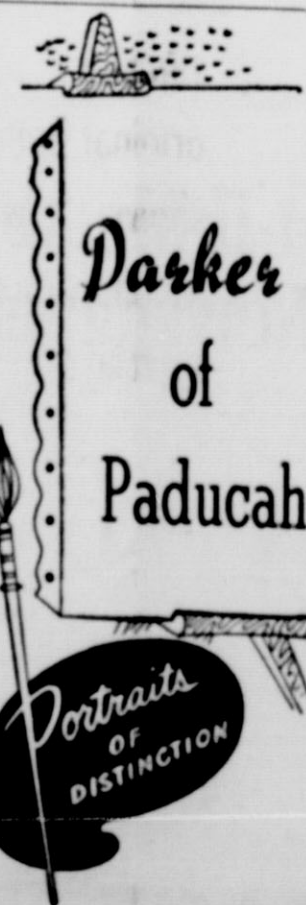
