

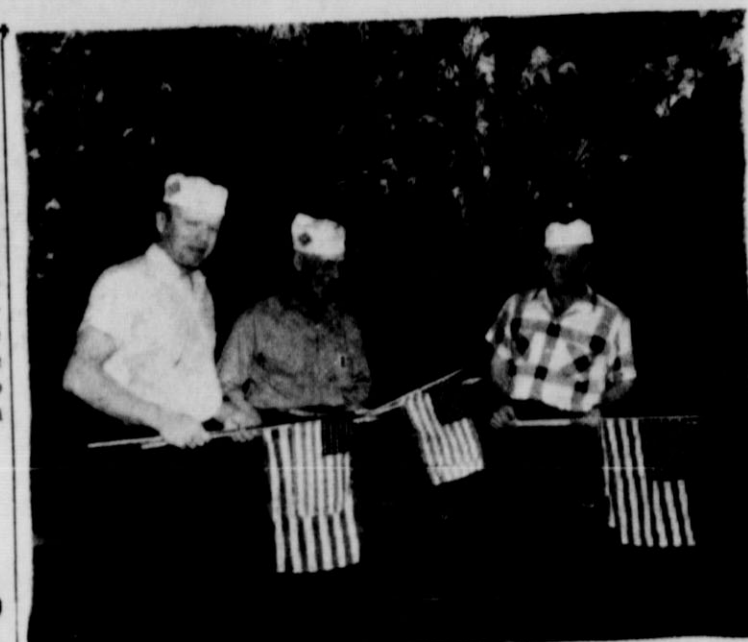
Over 2 Inches Rainfall Registered Here

RAINFALL went into the thirsty soil of Motley County during the week end to relieve the alarming drought situation that had reached the critical point. Friday afternoon and night Matador received 1.80 inches, with an additional .24-inch being registered here early Monday.

Reports from other areas of the county appear to be similar to the rainfall here, also much heavier rains fell in the White-flats and Flomot areas. Tribune reporter, Mrs. Malcolm Morris reported 1.70 in. in Whiteflats, and Claude Matney reported that he lost 100 acres of irrigated cotton.

Despite repeated cyclone high winds and hail alerts, the rains fell with comparatively small damage. No hail was reported in the immediate area. However, a report of some irrigated crop damage from hail has been received from White-

flat. Farmers declare the moisture ideal for planting as soon as fields are dry enough. Ranchers, on the other hand, say the rains have greatly benefited range conditions, but that the runoff has not been sufficient to provide tank and waterhole water. While most of Motley County was still comparatively dry, a large area of the Plains country from Brownfield to Amarillo was combating flood conditions, with as much as ten inches reported in some areas. Lubbock "went under water" for two consecutive afternoons to the tune of thousands of dollars damage to property. In some areas crop damage was also extensive from both hail and flood water.

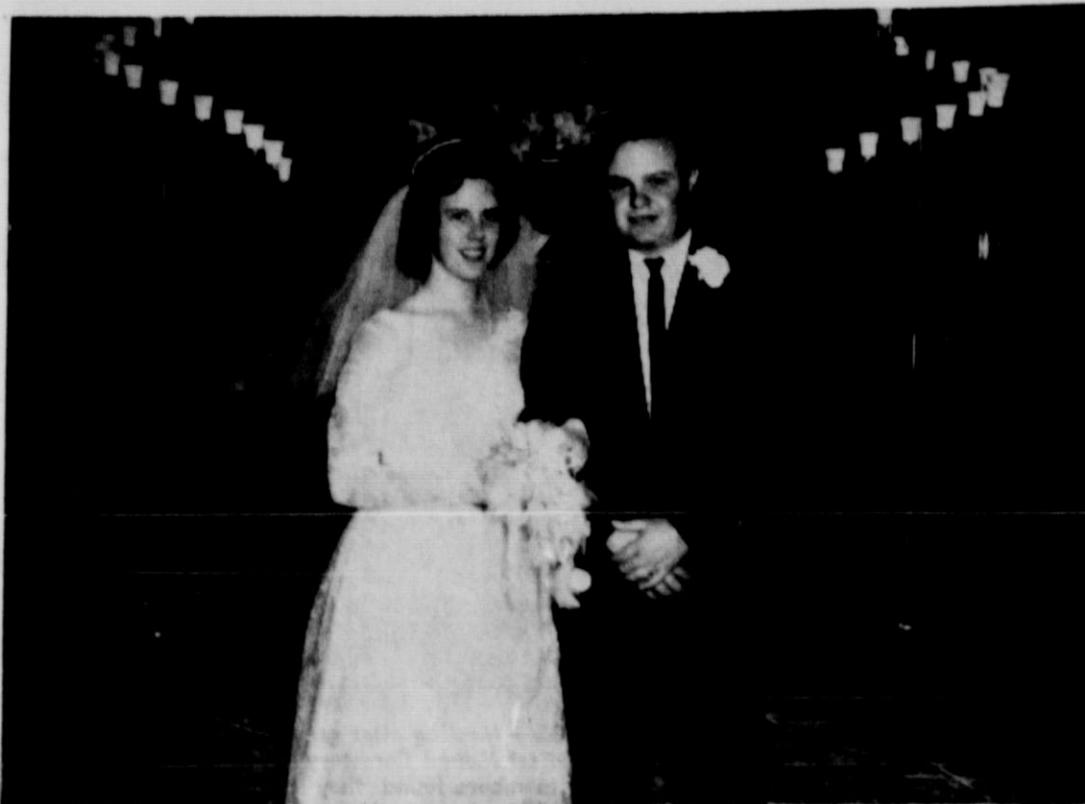

BILL HEATLY IS GROUPED WITH LEADING LEGISLATORS

(Editor's Note: The 58th Legislature's regular session is history. Its major issues during the 137-day regular session produced a number of standouts among legislators, from which United Press International has chosen eight from an informal poll of capitol employees, lobbyists and newsmen. This is the last of a two-part series, and deals with those in the House.)

AUSTIN — The 58th Legislature left many historical impressions and had quite a number of impressive lawmakers in the 150-member House of Representatives. A few stand out for their overall effectiveness.

Ruling out Speaker Byron Tunnell of Tyler, who was praised by friend and foe for his leadership and fair play, probably the four House members whose hands were felt heaviest were Reps. W. S. (Bill) Heatly of Paducah, James Cotten of Weatherford, Bill Hollowell of Grand Saline and Ben Barnes of De Leon.

Heatly was named head of the Appropriations Committee, and as such served as Tunnell's right-hand man and the person through whom the most influence and most pressure could be exerted.

The West Texan, serving his fifth session in the House, used his power when it was needed. None would question that Heatly, as the appropriations chief, had the toughest job outside the speaker's, and a job requiring long hours of work and worry.

Heatly told fellow lawmakers quite bluntly when he brought them the record \$3 billion-plus state budget bill that any proposal likely would affect those wanting the changes most directly.

But the West Texas lawmaker and his committee set a number of desirable records on the big spending bill. They reported it to the House floor and got it passed without amendments in record time.

Heatly and his hard-working committee also received solid support from fellow lawmakers when a squabble developed between them and Gov. John Connally toward the end of the session over how much money should be spent on higher education.

The budget conferees held a series of frenzied meetings with Connally and his staff and agreed to give a little on the spending funds Connally wanted. When they failed to reach a compromise, the House backed conferees by overwhelmingly approving the budget bill as it originally was written.

Cotten and Hollowell, both solid conservatives when it comes

to government spending, might be called a two-man watch-dog committee of the 58th session.

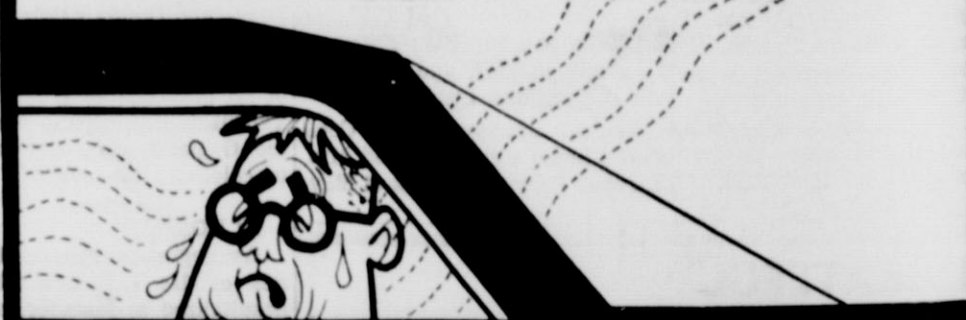

Screwworm Control Needs Quick Action

Ground control (immediate treatment of all wounds regardless of cause) is of major importance in the screwworm eradication program at this time. County Agent Bill Pallmeyer said today that it's that time of year when screwworm cases normally begin a rapid increase and cautioned all livestock producers to be even more alert in their checking for possible worm cases.

The screwworm will be eradicated by your constant vigilance, Pallmeyer said. He advised livestock producers to treat every wound regardless of cause, including those from castration, sheep and goat shearing, docking, dehorning, wire cuts, or others with approved materials. These include EQ-335 or 5% Korlan as smears or 5 percent Co-Ral as a dust. These are recommended for use on all surgical cases, Pallmeyer said.

He listed the use of 25 percent (twenty-five hundredths) Co-Ral or 5 percent (five-tenths) Korlan as sprays for control of livestock pests.

Pallmeyer further suggested that all livestock be checked at least once each week and more often if practical for screwworm signs.

He emphasized the need for even better reporting of all worm cases and the importance of taking worm samples from every infested wound. Be extra observant of all new livestock brought onto the farm or ranch, Pallmeyer said.
