Three young people from Motley County are in Austin this week learning first hand about government.

Attending Boys State are Roger Vinson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Furman Vinson of Matador, and Don Carl Tardy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Tardy of Roaring Springs. The delegates are sponsored by Fleming Post American Legion, and the Lions clubs of the respective communities.

Boys State is held on the University of Texas campus. The boys joined a chartered bus from Amarillo, in Paducah to make the trip.

Miss Mary Margaret Irwin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Irwin was the selected delegate to Girls State, held at Texas School for the Blind, Miss Irwin was accompanied by her parents to Amarillo Saturday where she joined her chartered bus of other delegates to make the trip. American Legion Auxiliary is sponsoring the delegate to Girls State, with El Progresso Study Club and Matador Garden Club contributing to the expense of the trip.

Girls State operates on the same principles as Boys State, the purpose being to educate youth in the duties, privileges, rights and responsibilities of American citizenship. They organize their own city, county and state governments which they operate on the same basis as the original agencies.

The girls are housed in brick dormitories on the campus of Texas School for the blind, and boys live in dormitories on the University campus.

### Rain Gauge in New Location

The United States rain gauge and thermometers which have been located at the city wells for many years, have been moved to the Odie Killingsworth home. The change was made last week by a representative of the United States Weather Bureau.

Mr. Killingsworth had previously done weather reporting for the weather bureau when he lived at Wellington.

### Benefit Checks Top \$19,000 Each Month

Monthly old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits in Motley County now top \$19,340.00. John G. Hutton, District Manager of social security in Lubbock, has declared in his annual county benefit data report.

The new monthly figure represents an increase of 22 percent over the corresponding period of last year.

"This increase can be attributed to the changes in the law in recent years, as well as to the growth of our aged population," Mr. Hutton said. "This money stimulates county business, as most of it is spent for food, clothing and shelter."

"There is no longer any doubt Social Security benefits are helping to stabilize the income and spending power of many residents in Motley County."

Monthly benefits first became payable in January, 1940, and they have continued without interruption for 23 years, accompanied by a steady growth in the number of beneficiaries. Mr. Hutton noted that as of December 31, 1962, some 365 Counties were collecting about \$232,000.00 annually from social security, an increase of 22 percent over 1961.

More people in Motley County, he said, could draw social security benefits if they knew more about the law, and for that reason they are urged to visit or call the local social security office whenever they have a question concerning their benefits or responsibilities.

As of January, 1963, in the nation at large more than 18 million beneficiaries were receiving payments at the rate of over \$1 billion per month.

The average monthly old-age retirement benefit in January was \$76.19 for all States, while in the State of Texas the average was \$68.49, Mr. Hutton said.

### Roaring Springs Minister to go As Missionary to Guatemala City

A popular Roaring Springs High School faculty member, and Church of Christ minister, together with his wife will leave this month for Guatemala City, Guatemala to enter the mission work of the denomination in July.

Dan and Elise Coker, who have lived in Roaring Springs the past two years will join four other American missionaries and their families in Guatemala for a three year tenure.

Mr. Coker has been teaching English, history and Spanish in the Roaring Springs school, and serving the community's Church of Christ as minister. He has also taught adult Spanish classes at night, the past two years. He received his B. A. degree from Abilene Christian College in 1960, and came to Motley County to serve the church at Northfield as minister, while continuing work on an M. A. degree which he received from A. C. C. in 1962.

He is married to the former Elise D. Hicks, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. V. Hicks of Pittsburg, Texas. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sid Coker, are residents of Wilcox, Arizona.

The Cokers will be joining the Jerry Hill, Carl James, Nash Huertas and Oles Pinson families, the first three of whom have been in Guatemala for four years.

Mr. Coker spent last summer in Guatemala City in evangelistic work sponsored by the College Church of Christ, Abilene, who will also support him in the work during his coming stay there, and in other areas of Guatemala.

Mr. Coker preached in a gospel meeting at the Church of Christ last week, and Monday he and Mrs. Coker left for a visit in Wilcox, Arizona with his relatives.

## Storm Alert Leaves City Streets Empty

IN A MATTER OF MINUTES Matador's business streets were emptied of vehicles late Saturday afternoon after the sounding of a pre-arranged cyclone warning signal. Boiling, threatening clouds and an approaching wall of dust placed further emphasis on the signal. Matador Volunteer Fire Department's storm warning trucks produced an eerie and alarming sound as they canvassed all sections of the town.

Within the matter of a few minutes the usual Saturday evening crowds had cleared the streets, and stores were closed. Cause of the alarm was a message by short-wave radio from the State Highway Department that a cyclone had been sighted west of Matador.

Storm cellars were well-filled in various parts of town while many families traveled the streets and highways with lights burning, watching the erratic storm clouds.

Shortly following the alert a rain cloud from the northwest swept across Matador with a change in the direction of the wind. The temperature dropped sharply with the arrival of the northwest cloud and rain began falling. No hail was reported in town.

"By voting, you can help establish and maintain the type of government in which you are interested," he assured them.

The commencement ceremonies were for the combined graduates of high school and grade school.

At the present time, 312 boys from all over the nation are making their home at the Ranch. Their ages are 2 to 18, and they leave the Ranch when they graduate from High School or are

presented a vocational training certificate. "We are proud of all of these boys for the accomplishments they have made since they have been with us, and for earning these diplomas that they will be receiving." Cal Farley, Founder and President of Boys Ranch, said, "Our Seniors will be leaving the Ranch the kind of citizens that our nation and their communities can be proud of."
