## Bus Driver is Awarded Honor

During a brief ceremony in the Tribune office Saturday morning, a Flomot school bus driver, Wendell Morris, received a signal honor. He was presented with a certificate attesting to his 11 years of service in driving a school bus without an accident.

In a rough estimation Mr. Morris has driven more than 4,500,000 school student passenger miles without an accident. He drives approximately 12,000 miles per year on the school bus run.

Presentation of the certificate was made by Safety Officer C. A. Dempsey of the Texas Department of Public Safety, Lubbock office.

A 22 member committee composed of superintendents of schools, county superintendents and transportation supervisors, with representatives of the Texas Motor Transportation Association, Texas Department of Public Safety, Texas Council of Public Safety Supervisors and the Texas Education Agency, have set the plans for naming the Public School Bus driver of the Year, 1962-1963.

One nominee is selected from each county and from these, six regional nominees are to be selected. The winner will be announced sometime during the month of June and will receive \$100 in cash (possibly more) from funds provided by the Texas Motor Transportation Association.

Basic points of judging a driver are as follows: Cooperation with administration, attitude and appearance, community citizenship, supervision of passengers, schedule promptness, years and total miles driven (11 x 12,000), outstanding acts, personal driving record, care and maintenance of equipment and participation in training knowledge.

## Ghosts of Vietnam Spread Fear, Death

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Tribune is perhaps one of the few weekly newspapers in the country with a correspondent in Vietnam. He is Chief Warrant Officer Myron (Bud) Bethard, who carries a letter of commission to write his impressions of "the war that is not a war." He is, of course, paid by the United States government and not the Tribune. His wife (the former Eugenia Tilson) and family are now at the Tilson farm north of Matador. Information for the following feature was received June 12.

"This is a soldier's impression of this Vietnamese Ghost. The sun is gone and darkness spreads over Vietnam. The crickets begin their incessant chirping and in the distant jungle an artillery piece rumbles and is answered by occasional automatic weapons.

## FLOMOT MAN DIES OF HEART ATTACK

A heart attack at 1:30 p.m. Thursday, June 13, at his home in Flomot claimed the life of Raldo Newman Martin, 57, resident of Motley County his entire life. He was born January 11, 1906 in the Whiteflat community and was 14 days old when his parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. Wade A. Martin, moved to the neighboring community of Flomot.

Following the heart attack, he was brought to Matador in a Eudy-Seale ambulance from Turkey, and was pronounced dead on arrival at Stanley Hospital.

Funeral services were held at 3:00 p.m. Friday at the Flomot Methodist Church, with Rev. Edd Spivey of Letors, former pastor of Flomot Baptist Church, officiating. He was assisted by a former Methodist pastor, Rev. L.W. Baker, pastor of the Spenburg Church near Lamesa.

Burial was in Memorial Park Cemetery, Flomot, with Eudy-Seale (Continued on back page)

"Suddenly it is quiet again and there is a feeling that perhaps it was a dream, for the only thing uncomfortable is the clammy heat and the sting of a hungry mosquito.

"This is war in Vietnam. Your enemy may be a friendly-looking farmer leaning on his hoe, or a peasant girl carrying a basket of vegetables on her head. In an instant the farmer's hoe handle becomes a rifle, and the vegetables in the peasant girl's basket are probably hand grenades.

"These are the VC's (Vietnamese communists) of Vietnam, but I prefer to call them ghosts. They are the unseen enemy that strike out of nowhere and conquer without warning. This is the communists' way; infiltrate and conquer without revealing their number or strength.

"Many people may wonder why we are sending men to a place like Vietnam to fight a war that is not supposed to be a war.

"We are not fighting people but a communist philosophy with designs to conquer from within. I shudder to think of the consequences if this pattern of warfare should come to our country. The system is of such strength here that even brothers do not really know or trust each other. I cannot imagine a farmer in Motley County being fearful of his neighbor, but the communists' strategy could make even this possible.

"I prefer to fight this system over here and keep our brotherly love and trust at home.

## More Rainfall Sweeps County

Rains again swept across Motley County during the past week. This time farmers were anxious for delayed crops to gain a root system and growth before any quantity of moisture fell.

Sunday night and early Monday Bob Stanley registered 52-inch and again Tuesday night a squall line starting in New Mexico brought an additional 70-inch. The latest rains came without violence except for electrical displays. It is not believed any serious crop damage resulted.

Other sections of the Panhandle and South Plains have not fared so well. Thousands of acres of rich irrigated Plains farm lands have been flooded and crops lost. The storm which brought moderate moisture here Sunday night, washed out crops south of Dickens and other areas both north and south, according to reports.

## Code Numbers To Speed Mail

Three Motley County post offices, Flomot, Roaring Springs and Matador have reported their new ZIP code numbers. It is the Post Office Department's new plan to speed up mail delivery and goes into effect nationally July 1.

Mrs. Bernice Bond, postmaster at Flomot, said that community had been assigned the code No. 79234. H. L. Smith, postmaster at Roaring Springs said that community had been assigned the ZIP code number 79256.

Yesterday Matador received the ZIP code No. 79244, according to Postmaster Charlie Scaff.

Purpose of the ZIP code is to short-cut repeated address reading by post office employees and is claimed as "literally the last word in mail addressing."

The PO Department says the clerk needs only to glance at the code to know immediately to what national area, state and post office the letter is destined, and to speed it on its way, cutting up to 24 hours off the time between deposit and delivery.

The ZIP code number should follow the name of the state to which the letter is addressed. Customers of the mail service are requested to take the ZIP code number from mail which they receive and use it on future replies.

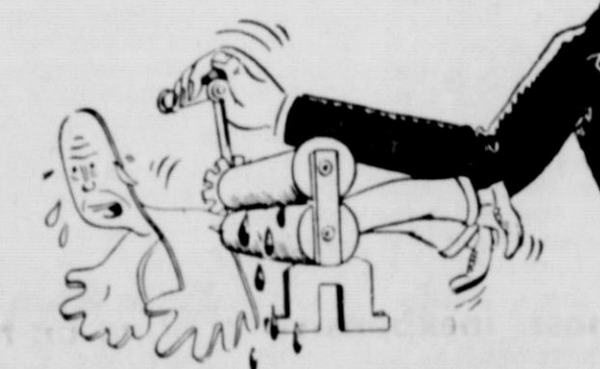

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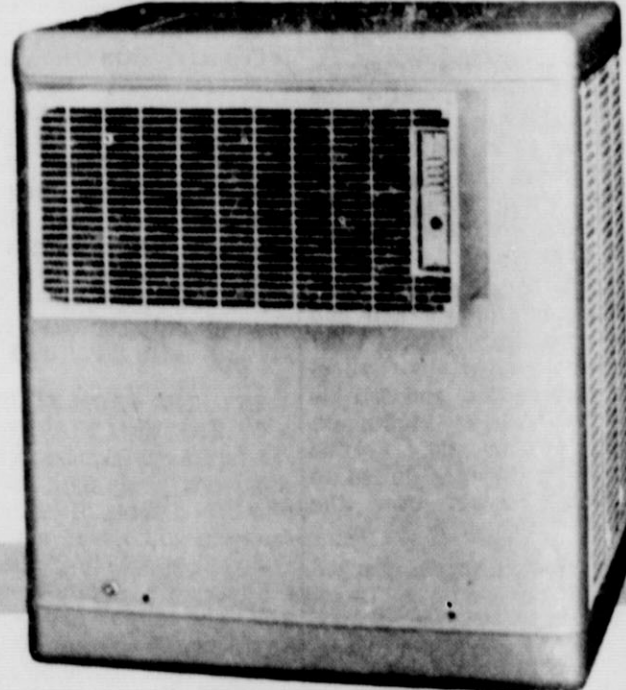
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# Final Rites Held for Pioneer Matador Newspaperwoman

This article is courtesy of Mrs. J. M. Jackson of Matador, who received the clipping from her daughter, Mrs. Bert Hunter of Freeport, Texas. The Tribune, in an effort to identify Mr. and Mrs. Kendall with an early Matador newspaper, obtained this information from Mrs. L. E. Cooper of Roaring Springs.

C. P. Kendall came to Matador from Tennessee about 1900. He purchased the newspaper, which was probably the Motley County News at that time. It had previously started as the Matador Maverick. He was unmarried at the time.

After two or three years, Mr. Kendall went back to Tennessee on a visit and returned with his bride, a former sweetheart. They operated the newspaper here until about 1909, Mrs. Cooper said. She recalls that she was a school girl in Matador in 1901 and that the newspaper was located just south of the present Tribune building.

Mrs. Susie T. Kendall, member of a husband-and-wife team who published Brazoria County history for half a century, died Tuesday.

She entered Brazosport Memorial Hospital eight days ago following a heart attack and stroke. Death came at 2:30 p.m. Tuesday.

Mrs. Kendall had been in failing health since her retirement from the newspaper business 11 years ago.

Services were held at 2:30 p.m. Thursday from the First Christian Church in Freeport, with the Rev. Paul E. Russell, pastor, officiating. Interment was in the Angleton Cemetery, under the direction of the Freeport Funeral Home.

Mrs. Kendall lived with her husband, C. P. Kendall Sr., and son Kermit K. Kendall, at 202 W. Eighth Street in Freeport.

She served in numerous capacities in newspaper work, including editor and society editor, in more than half a dozen newspapers, including one in the Indian Territory of Oklahoma at Madill.

Mrs. Kendall was very active in women's clubs, church and other organizations while connected with the Freeport Facts. She was one of the leaders in the First Christian Church of Freeport, of which she was a charter member. She served as district director of the Y.W.C.A.

With her husband, Mrs. Kendall operated the Freeport Facts for 18 years from 1913 until 1931, when they purchased the Aransas Pass Progress and moved to Aransas Pass.

They left The Facts in charge of their three sons, Manis T. Kendall, Kermit Kendall and C. P. Kendall Jr.

Her oldest son, Manis, was killed in an automobile accident in 1933.

Mr. and Mrs. Kendall later acquired the Sealy News and The Angleton Times. They sold out all of their newspaper holdings in 1952 and retired from the field. Besides her husband, Mrs. Kendall is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Mary Pearce of 715 W. Seventh, Freeport; two sons, Kermit K. Kendall, 202 W. Eighth, C. P. Kendall Jr. 802 W. Eighth, and daughter-in-law, Mrs. Sallie Kendall, 802 W. Eighth.

## Farm Ponds

Released by Upper Pease Soil Conservation District

Farm ponds are of interest to all farmers and ranchers mainly as a source of livestock water supply. However, a farm pond has many supplemental benefits such as a form of recreation, improvement of wildlife habitat, and a water supply for fire fighting. During the past quarter century farmers and ranchers have built nearly a million ponds as part of their soil and water conservation plans.

You may be planning to build a farm pond. If you are, the site should be selected with care. Some of the soils in this area are not suitable for reservoir areas and some of the soils suitable for reservoir areas are not suitable for embankments. The topography and soils of the site should permit storage of water at a depth and volume which will insure a dependable supply, considering beneficial use, sedimentation, season of use and evaporation and seepage losses.

Ponds, like any body of water, attract people. Your farm or ranch pond can be a source of joy as well as profit, but only if it is safe. You should find out what your community or state laws say about your liability in case of accident or death. You may need to protect yourself with insurance. If you are not sure about the site and soils and the safety of the proposed pond,

you should secure assistance from an engineer who can help you determine these factors. Then, have your pond built by a reliable contractor who will follow the engineering specifications.

Engineering assistance can be obtained from the local Soil Conservation Service technicians assisting your local Soil Conservation District. Remember - make your farm pond safe.

Officiating at the funeral was the Rev. Pete Rutledge and Rev. I. D. Walker.

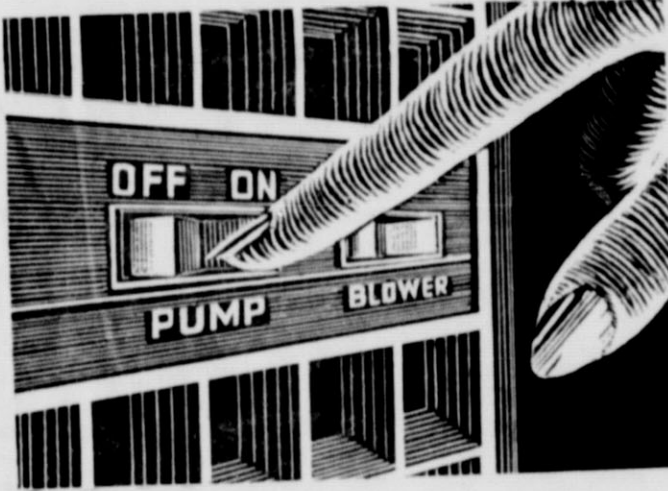
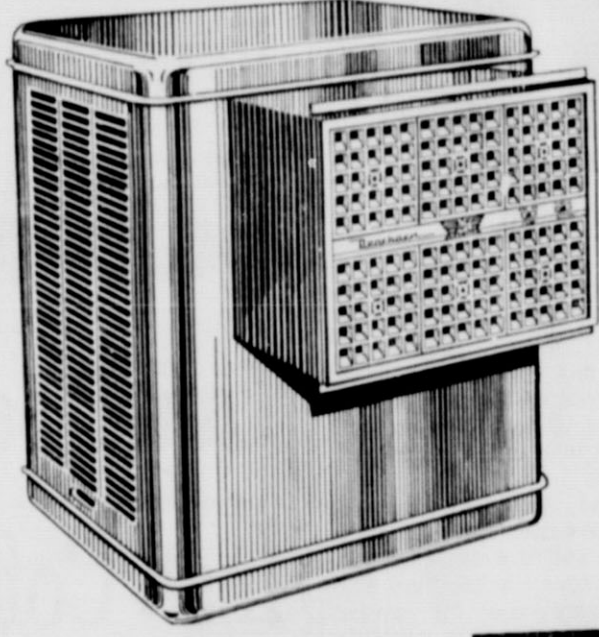

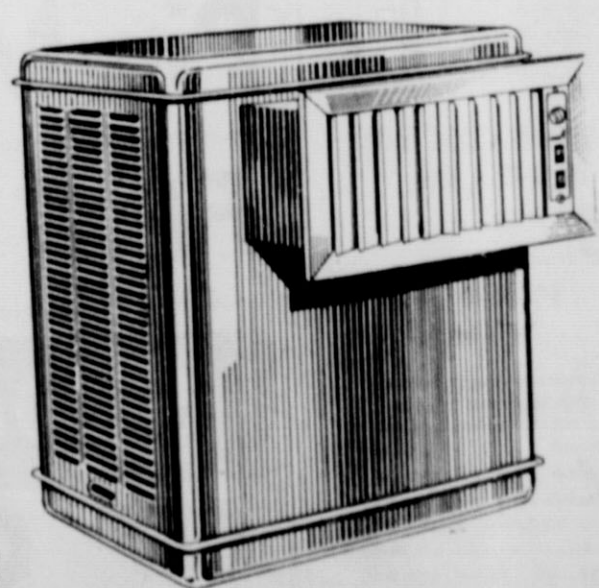

### COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

Motley County is due to be re-tested for certification in the Brucellosis Program, starting in the fall of 1963, with 20% of the owners to submit animals for re-test this year. Included in the 20% will be those who had animals who were reactors or suspects in the past test. Each 3 years, 1/5th of the herds in the county are to be re-tested to keep the program in effect, with those to submit animals for test selected at random.

Livestock owners can have the county recertified without collecting animals for the test as was done during the initial test. This can be done by "back tagging" culled cows or bulls that are sent to market. When animals are "back tagged," a blood sample is drawn at the slaughter house, a test run, and the results credited to the herd of origin. Of the 32 counties to be re-tested within the next year, 111 herds that have been taking part in the program may be exempt, as only 15% of the breeding animals in a county must be tested in a 3 year period.

If you are interested in this program, kits, including tags, glue and report cards may be obtained at my office. The owners receive a report on all animals that are tested through this program.

Even though there are not many egg producers in the county, the following tips should be valuable to those who have eggs for sale or home use. Eggs have their highest quality when first laid and from this point on, every quality factor begins to decline.

How fast or slow egg quality declines depends to a large extent on handling and storage practices, with the most important factor being holding temperature less than 55 degrees with relative humidity of about 80%. If these conditions are maintained, egg quality will remain high for two to two and a half weeks.

Motley County 4-H members will be interested in the 4-H Fire Prevention Awards Program. Records will be due August 15, and in addition to all items that belong in a regular 4-H Record, the member must inspect at least 3 complete sets of farm buildings or urban buildings, to compete for state honors, and 10 sets of farm buildings or 15 urban dwellings to compete for national honors.

The 1st place state winning boy and girl receive a \$25 bond, and an expense paid trip to the annual conference of the Texas

Association of Mutual Insurance Companies. First place boy and girl in the National contest receive \$100 and an expense paid trip to the National Meeting of the National Association of Mutual Insurance Companies.

Fires caused approximately \$42,000,000 property damage in Texas in 1962, and more than 500 lost their lives in fires. Many of these could have been prevented by inspections, and by correction of faults found during the inspections. 4-H members interested in this work or contest are urged to stop by my office for Inspection Report Forms.

Most of the livestock owners in the county know that this fall 1/5 of the herds in the county must be re-tested to recertify the county in the Brucellosis Program. In addition to the herds where reactors and suspects were found during the initial test, 58 other herds are due to be tested. I have been requested to ask if there are any livestock owners who would like their animals tested this year, as in some counties those who do not want this work done annually. Owners who may be interested in this test are urged to see Doc Burselson and me, and give the time of year testing would be the most convenient.

If the test is not completed by March 10th, the county will lose its certification, and before the county will be in the program again, all herds will have to be tested as in the initial test. If 58 herds are not offered for test, names will be drawn to determine herds to be tested this fall.
