## Voters Reject Poll Tax Idea

TEXAS voters like the present \$1.75 poll tax, and do not want to do away with it. That was clear in Saturday's special amendment election. Motley County voters rejected the idea more than 4 to 1—47 for change, 284 against.

In the state, according to the Texas Election Bureau, the vote was 237,324 for change as compared to 882,763 against change. Motley County polled a total of 234 votes (unofficial) about 35% of its voting strength.

The county reflected the voting in the state except with the Veteran's 1956 amendment which was killed in the state but favored here 132 for and 142 against.

Old age assistance amendment carried in the state and in the county 170 for and 341 against. The Jefferson County proposal was defeated in the state and in the county 67 for and 143 against.

Voting was approximately even across the county's five boxes. Out at Elmore (which polled 36 votes) the voting on the Veteran's land was 27 for and 27 against.

Voting in the county (and in the state) was higher than early estimates.

## Hawk and Prey Crash Window

The Roering Springs Yellowjackets, weakened by flu and facing one of the top 8-man teams in the state, turned in their best performance of the season Friday night when they held the unbeaten Jaybird Jaybirds to a score of 28-6.

Early in the opening period Jaybird, William Smith, went 25 yards on an end sweep for the first score of the ball game. The extra point try was no good.

The Yellowjackets' look the kick and marched down field to the 5 yard line, but they were unable to penetrate the strong wall of Jaybirds and the ball went over on downs. The only opportunity for a Yellowjacket score seemed lost until Rogent Swain, senior Yellowjacket linebacker, intercepted a Jaybird pass and scampered the 19 yards to tie the score 6-6.

Jaybird bounced back with a 45-yard run by fullback Billy Stannard to go ahead 12-6 as the quarter ended. He made it 29-6 in the second period with a 12 yard run that was followed by a pass from Kenny Judy to Eddie Morales for the extra point.

In the third quarter, Smith went 21 yards around end for the final touchdown. Stannard passed to Judy for the points.

The Yellowjackets play their final game of the season on their home field tomorrow night. They meet Paton Springs for this conference contest at 7:30.

## Stapleton Says: Liberty is A Gift of God

"Liberty is a gift of God," District Attorney John Stapleton of Florida said here Sunday night in a joint Veterans' Day observance at the First Methodist Church sponsored by the VFW and American Legion.

A veteran of World War II, the District Attorney covered a wide scope of problems troubling the world today from Russian Premier Khrushchev to the John Birch Society in the United States.

At the beginning of the dynamic address District Attorney Stapleton said: "It is time for democracy to declare what we are for and not what we are against. The comparison of the two ideologies, communism and democracy is important... we are in a war for the minds of the peoples of the world."

"The future is rushing upon us," he said, "we are living in a new age since the explosion of the atomic bomb in 1945." He cited the population explosion throughout the world and said it is a threat.

He compared communism and Christianity as primal religions and cited instances in which they are similar. In conclusion he declared: "We need more devotion in family life. We need the heartbreakers back instead of TV."

Introduction of the speaker was by R. C. Giesecke, Commander of the American Legion; Roy Grundy, Commander of the VFW, was master of ceremonies. The program opened with the assembly singing "America," followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Invocation was by Rev. Roy Patterson and benediction was by Rev. W. H. Vaughn.

Special music was a solo by Don Ford, who sang "God Bless America." A prelude of organ and piano music by Mrs. Robert Jamison and Mrs. G. E. Hamilton preceded the program. "Taps" was played by Jack McCallie after the benediction. Members of Matador Boy Scout Troop 60 served as ushers.

## Nocturnal Thieves Enter Salem Store

BURGLARS ENTERED Salem Dry Goods store here sometime Monday night or early Tuesday morning and escaped with an estimated \$600 in cash and merchandise. The robbery was discovered about 8 a.m. Tuesday when Manager Ronnie Christian opened the store.

Entry was gained by prying open the back door (probably with a crowbar) and lifting a heavy wooden bar (which was locked in position) and opening a door. The wood bar was replaced.

Cash taken from the cash register was \$195. The register was not damaged and it is believed the burglar was familiar with its operation. Tom Salem, of Turkey, owner of the store here and stores at Turkey and Silverton, arrived after being notified of the burglary.

He and manager Christian estimated the loss at \$600, including the cash and four new Samsonite cases. It is believed the merchandise was placed in the cases. Men's clothing, including underwear and possibly shirts were missing. The store's entire stock of eight Times wrist watches was taken. Some bill-folds were also missing.

One pair of men's shoes is known to have been taken, with the empty box left on the floor. So far as could be determined, no merchandise was taken from the women's department of the store.

The Sheriff's Department was notified and an investigation was made. Until press time yesterday no arrests had been made. Manager Christian said Nightwatchman A. L. Calk did not see any suspicious persons near the store during the night. The nightwatchman, however, is required to punch a time clock regularly at a certain post, and it is probable the burglars had timed the break-in to avoid his possible detection.

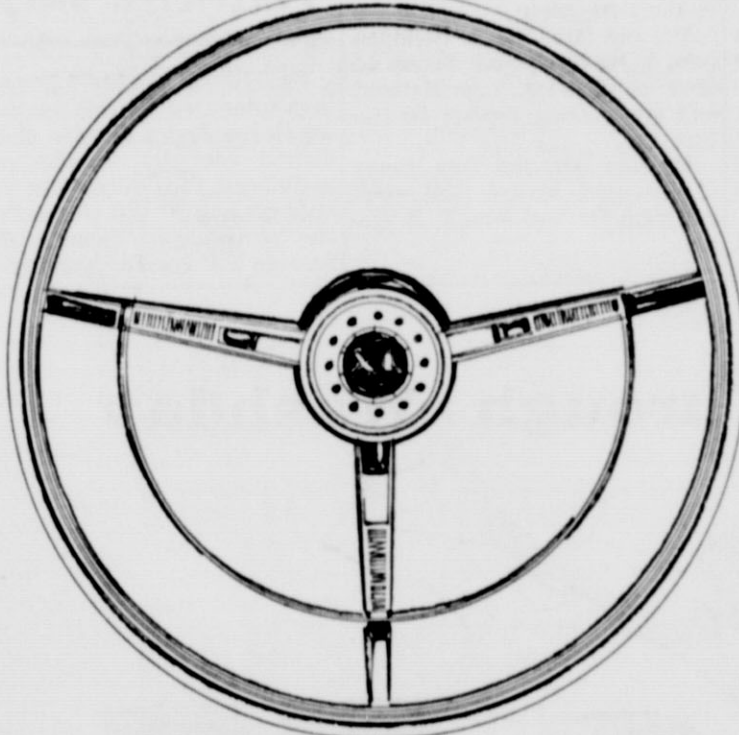

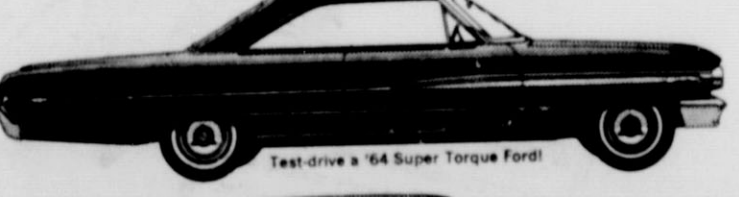

Purpose of the grading is to assist junior members with record preparation by indicating items that need to be corrected, where additional work is required and indicating what material the member needs to keep and submit for grading.

The public Health Association is sponsoring a Scholarship Contest for high school students in the 10th, 11th and 12th grades. An essay of 500 words is to be written on "Careers in Public Health." Many careers are open in public health. Physicians, nurses, dentists, engineers, sanitarians, chemists, biologists, secretaries, health educators, medical social workers, psychologists, statisticians, veterinarians, and others. You may write on public health careers in general, or on several specific health careers or only one career. Additional information is also available at my office.

Worms are damaging some of the small grain fields in the county. One specific worm that bores into the plant at ground line, and is generally found in a web attached to the roots has been identified as the lesser corn-stalk borer. This insect is very difficult to control, with best results obtained from the following sprays: 3 qts. of 25% DDT in 5 or more gallons water per acre. Two nozzles per row have been used, with bands 6 to 8 inches wide on each side of the row treated. A second application at 3 to 4 weeks may be required.

If cutworms or armyworms are the problem, DDT or Toxaphene dusts or sprays may be used. Dusts should be applied at the rate of 10 to 15 lbs. per acre; and 2 lb. DDT at the rate of 1/2 to 1 gal. per acre and 6

lb. Toxaphene or Toxaphene-DDT mixture at the rate of 1 1/2 to 2 qts. per acre. Do not graze fields for 15 days after application.

Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Corn, Sorghum, Small Grains or Grasses MP-339 is available at my office.

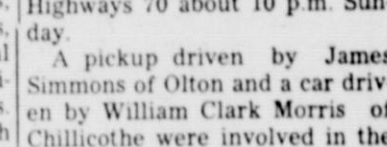

**New Scott and White Hospital**

Cost Over \$9 million; Open Dec. 6

TEMPLE, TEXAS Nov. 11 — Three of the top men in American medicine stood on a windswept hill here two years ago and thrust spades into the rocky ground. They will return to the same hilltop December 6 to dedicate a revolutionary new medical center started by their symbolic spadework.

Formally opening the new \$9.2 million home of Scott and White Memorial Hospital will be Dr. Luther L. Terry, United States Surgeon General, Dr. Leonard W. Larson, immediate past-president of the American Medical Association, and Dr. Charles W. Mayo, professor of surgery and head of Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minn.

The three distinguished physicians will be joined in the ceremonies by Texas Gov. John Connally, who will lead a public inspection of the unique building which houses interlocking functions of hospital, diagnostic center, research, education, and similar facilities for a total attack on human suffering.

Non-profit Scott and White is largely self-supporting but relies also on tax-deductible contributions from the public. Governed by an unpaid board of trustees, the hospital and its integral diagnostic center, research laboratories, educational facilities, etc., are staffed by a team of 56 medical specialists who receive fixed salaries from the hospital rather than fees from the patient.

The new building is revolutionary in that the nursing floors are in a cloverleaf pattern, rising in three 7-story towers. In each "leaf" the nurses' station is in the center, surrounded by patient rooms — each only a half-dozen steps away and all 315 beds visible.

Memorial contributions have made many exceptional features of the hospital possible. The Olin Culbersan Medical Research



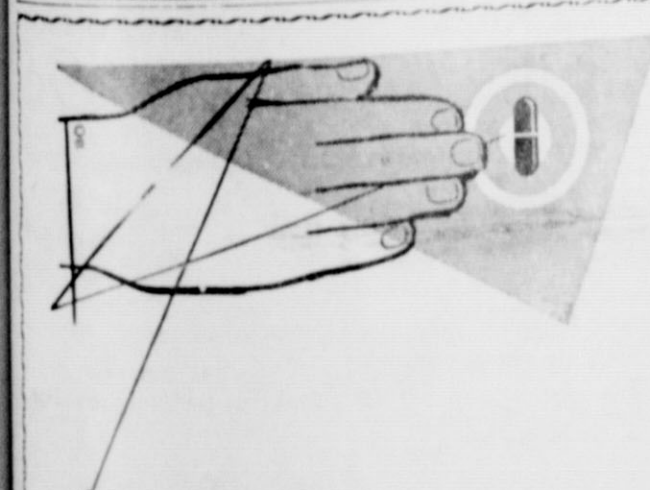
