Marketing Strategy Intrigues Producers

Texas Dept. of Agriculture held a marketing strategy meeting on Feb. 5, in the Roaring Springs Depot.

Sal Valdez, Director of Agriculture Development in Austin and Johnny Turpin, Marketing Specialist from the TDA office in Lubbock explained that the function of the Agriculture Development Program is to promote Texas products. TDA wants to assist local farmers and ranchers in producing good quality products and then the markets to sell these products.

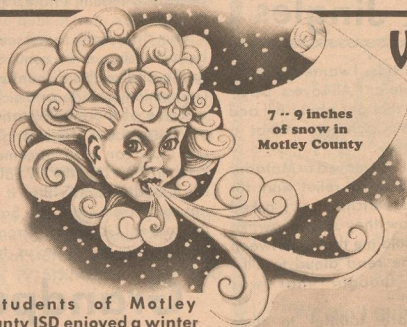
TDA's chief goal is to stir the interest in the producer to use his imagination to produce a crop that is in demand and take his product straight to the buyer.

Individuals or groups are encouraged to contact TDA for any help or information the producer might need. Some of the projects TDA has helped with in other communities is Pandhandle grown pinto beans,

the Littlefield Denim Plant, Seminole's Farmers Market and Lubbock's Farmers Market which is currently expanding to Plainview and Amarillo this year. Childress is in the process of building a beef packing plant, as are several other communities in Texas.

For this area, some of the diversification crops and products discussed between the TDA representations and local producers were to process cotton seed oil and market it throughout the state, sell mesquite wood chips, peaches, pecans, all of which have wide range marketing possibilities.

The main objective is to use our imagination and gain as much information that is available to get started on a small scale and get to producing. The market is not going to do to each individual, the producer is going to have to go to the market. TDA is there to help anyone who is interested in expanding their field of production.

Motley County Hospital Board Holds Monthly Meeting

The Motley County Hospital Board met Friday, Feb. 7, 1986, at Billie Dean's for their regular monthly meeting. Those in attendance were Larry Hoyle, Pres., Kenny Barton, Sec., and Joe M. Thacker. Board members, Darrell Cruse and Caldwell Smith were not present. First order of business discussed was that the insurance on the ambulance is due. A motion was made and passed to use Pipkin Insurance Agency for this coverage.

The board was then informed that a letter had been received from South Plains EMS requesting each participating county to contribute \$2000 for a yearly fee. A lengthy discussion followed and the board voiced that Motley County shouldn't have to pay the same amount as

Lubbock County. Motley County paid \$500.00 last year and it was voted to pay that amount again this year. SPEMS is a 14 county organization that Joyce Campell is a board member of. Special educational services, workshops and radio network are some of the services provided by the SPEMS organization.

Following this discussion the monthly bills were presented and paid.

President Larry Hoyle reminded board members that there are three places on the hospital board that expires this year. March 15th is the last day to file for re-election.

It was noted that Tuesday, Feb. 4th, when Dr. Garcia was working in Matador at South Plains Health Providers Clinic, 38 patients were seen.

Commissioners Vote to Construct Pioneer Memorial Gazebo

The Motley County Commissioners Court met Monday Feb. 10 for their regular monthly meeting. Present were Judge Billy Joe Whitaker, Commissioners John M. Russell, Bill D. Washington, Joseph (Gid) Simpson and Frazier Watson.

Invocation was given by Bill Washington. Judge Whitaker gave the new Tribune owner a special welcome and congratulations.

Under discussion were plans to build a permanent Gazebo on the southwest corner of the courthouse lawn. The gazebo will be 14x14 ft. and cost approximately \$1800. This Gazebo will be dedicated to Motley County Pioneers as a Sesquicentennial project.

During the reading of the minutes it was brought to the County Clerk's attention by John M. (Sonny) Russell that the newly adopted resolution was not mentioned and should be added to the minutes.

Motley County Commissioners passed a resolution authorizing fines for the misuse of county roads. Persons who damage county road surfaces with farm implements or other machinery will be held responsible for the cost of repairing the roads and may be charged with the offense of criminal mischief in county or district court. The resolution was drawn pursuant to Article 28.03, V.T.C.S., which states that the offense may be a class C misdemeanor if the damage is less than \$5; class B misdemeanor if damage is between \$5 and \$20; or a class A misdemeanor if damage is more than \$20 but less than \$200; and a third degree felony if the damage is between \$200 and \$10,000.

The first order of business was introduced by Mrs. L.B. Campbell and Mrs. Roy Hobbs,

who came to give an update on the Sesquicentennial Folk Life Festival plans and to ask the Commissioners Court's help and approval on painting new parking stripes around the Courthouse for booth spaces, and also building a stage for afternoon entertainment. The Festival Committee Chairmen also stated that they would need about 10 barricades to block traffic around the square and help with clean up. Mrs. Campbell announced that "Miss Texas" will be in Matador May 26.

The Festival events will take place regardless whether the Wagon Train gets to Matador or not. (Rumor has it that the Wagon Train may not last until May 26.) The ladies also announced that the funds left after paying festival expenses will be donated to the Motley County Library.

Fireman Rodney Williams and James Gillispie met with Commissioners to present to the Court a check of \$1450 from the Texas Forrest Service for cost-sharing on a 1979 fire truck purchased recently. They also reported that the Fire Dept. is overhauling one of the water trucks themselves and are still waiting on a final plan for the new radio system for the county. Commissioner Russell expressed appreciation for the cost-sharing money and the report on the trucks.

Bills for the month of Jan. were read and approved. Precinct I - \$1729.95, Precinct II - \$2982.24, Precinct III - \$2510.72, Precinct IV \$1411.56.

Justice of the Peace reported \$5922 intake in fines. The Commissioners voted and approved building the Gazebo and building a stage for the Sesquicentennial Folk Life Festival.

Roaring Springs City Council Meets

On the City Council agenda this month were suggestions by the Roaring Springs Fire Department, such as a request for an ordinance to increase the fee levied by the City from 25¢ to \$1.00 per month per resident in order to finance some much needed new equipment. The Fire Department request an ordinance for mandatory screens over barrels for fire prevention. The Fire Department will present a budget to the City Council next month. The Council made no move on these issues at this time.

The City of Matador presented a bill of \$150.00 to the City of Roaring Springs for trash disposal. The Council voted to pay only \$25.00 of this bill and \$25.00 per month.

The Council has consulted Sherman Gray of the Texas Department of Health regarding water system. Mr. Sherman has determined that the currently used hypochlorinator is

ultimately safer and more cost effective than the gas chlorinator which had been proposed.

The City Council approved a plan to purchase a Computer and Computer Software, preparatory to making the city more efficient and increase the accountability of the City business office.

The City of Roaring Springs has recently become a member of Texas Municipal League. The League offers legal research, insurance and serves as a strong lobbying entity in Austin.

Complaints regarding residential keeping of Honey Bees was brought to the City Council by a resident. The City Council has determined to not act on this issue at this time.

City Manager, Alvarado, has pledged that the city will be running in the black by June 30, 1986. In that intermittent time Public Hearings will be held on the budget in the near future.

Hard Landing For Roofer

Kenneth Baker suffered numerous fractures in the bones of both feet and also a back injury on Feb. 6th., while roofing the First Baptist Church in Matador. The safety rope snapped, plunging Kenneth 24 feet to the ground on the north side of the building.

Gerald Pipkin had been with Greer Willis, pastor of the church, arranging tables for a banquet in the church. When exiting out of the church basement door he found Kenneth lying on the ground.

Pipkin said Kenneth looked up at him and calmly said, "I fell off

the roof and I think I've broken my feet and maybe my back."

Pipkin noted that Kenneth's shoes were off, which Kenneth stated that Virginia Rains had taken them off and then went to call the ambulance. Kenneth remained very calm until the ambulance arrived to convey him to a hospital in Plainview.

According to Kenneth's mother Mrs. D.C. Baker, Kenneth is improving and will probably have to have corrective surgery on his feet in the future.

overcome with fear. Fear is the opposite of Faith. Faith is believing the promises of God to be true regardless of what our natural eyes see and our natural ears hear.

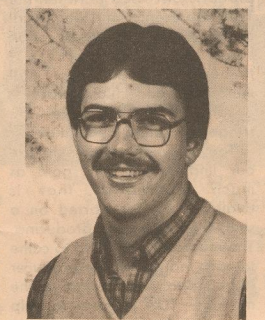
God has written us a prescription for the unwelcome malady, fear - it is called a 'Gospel' and is to be taken every hour of everyday. It is:

Are We Really Hungry

By Jo Ann Dickson

According to a report issued by the Harvard University School of Public Health and the Physicians Task Force on Hunger in America, Texas had the most "hunger counties" and Motley County was 47th in the nation

and 2nd in the state with Brazos County being number one.

"Hunger counties" are defined as having 20% of residents living below the federally defined poverty level - \$10,609 for a family of four. Also the study stated that fewer than one - third of eligible residents are receiving food stamps.

It was surprising to find that

Mississippi, which is one of the poorest states has no "hunger counties" because of wide distribution of food stamps.

State Agriculture Commissioner, Jim Hightower, said, "Many families are on the precipice of poverty. It's not a very pretty picture we have here in Texas. For the first time you've got families who never thought they would need food stamps, who frankly had no interest in the food stamp program but now find they have a personal need for it."

Officials in Briscoe and Brazos Counties who were quoted in the Plainview Daily Herald do not feel their counties are as distressed as this report indicates. One official in Swisher County, who declined to be identified said, "I haven't seen a hungry person in a long time."

A well-known T.V. commentator recently stated that the research was based on statistics in government reports and that on-site surveys had not been made.

Spokepersons for the Motley County Community Chest and Red Cross report few requests for local help.

On a national level 55% of eligible people draw food stamps but in Texas the figure drops to 40 to 45 percent. Perhaps based on this statistic, Motley County received its standing as the 2nd "hunger county."

Farm Bureau Insurance Benefits Accidental Death

Group accidental death insurance is one of the many benefits Motley County Farm Bureau members receive with their membership dues. There is no exclusions with this insurance, provided the accident occurs while membership is in effect, and the death occurs within 90 days after the accident. Thus, it is important to pay membership dues before the first of the month following expiration date.

Under the accidental death program, benefits are \$1,000 for member, \$1,000 for member's spouse, and \$500 for each unmarried child under 25 living at home, attending school, or in the armed forces.

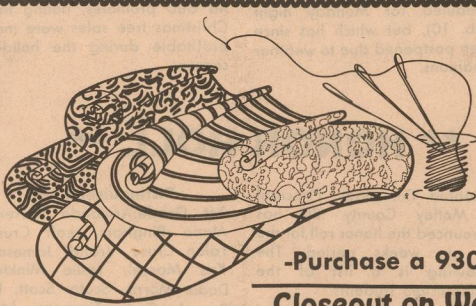


