## Volunteers Check Night Grass Fire

**PIONEER SPIRIT** of the Old West supported by modern facilities checked a raging prairie fire southwest of Matador Thursday night, when wind-fanned flames threaten-

ed the western area of Motley county's grass. Volunteers from half a dozen communities literally overpowered the fire which started about 9:30 in Vance Campbell's grass at a point about where the Q.A.P. railroad climbs the Cap Rock. An estimated 1 and one-third sections of grass burned before the fire was brought under control. Part of the loss was on the Rock Island division of the former Matador Ranch. More than 200 volunteers were estimated to have aided in bringing the fire under control with fire trucks from Crosbyton, Matador and Floydada. Fighters used brooms and tow sacks to beat out the blaze in many places.

#### About Your Health

A weekly public service feature from the Texas State Department of Health.

An active division of the State Department of Health for 11 years, the Division of Mental Health has from the beginning

keynoted its activities towards the prevention of mental illness through cooperation ranging from private citizens to state government.

It has coordinated its efforts on matters of common concern with such other state agencies as the Department of Public Welfare, Texas Commission on Alcoholism, Texas Education Agency, and Board of Texas State Hospitals and Special Schools.

With the growth of the State's population, its increased urbanization and industrialization, and the pyramiding tensions of everyday living, communities must become the first line of defense against nervous and emotional disorders.

The need for improved treatment of the mentally ill is ur-

gent, but the race will be lost if community preventive services are not developed. The two needs, while related, are quite different.

Prevention must take place in the home towns of the State. Prevention must take place within the family, within schools, churches, the family doctor's office, and place of employment. Prevention must begin before nervous and mental disorders appear, or, where not possible, when the child or adult shows early symptoms.

Through seminars, in-service training programs and staff consultation, the Division of Mental Health has helped already existing community health, education and welfare personnel deal with personal psychological problems before they erupt in serious forms of juvenile and adult crime, marital break-up, or mental illness which might require hospitalization.

During its 11 years, the Division has actively helped local groups set up seven community guidance centers in Texas plus providing consultation and other assistance to child guidance clinics already established.

Clinical services have dealt largely with the needs of emotionally disturbed and mentally retarded children, and their parents. Additional services are needed for adults overwhelmed by difficult adjustments, mounting tensions, and the deep personal problems which too often lead to illness such as alcoholism.

Encouraging regional Mental Health Centers, demonstration projects and aiding local areas in acquiring mental health workers are all part of the giant effort required for the eventual establishment of statewide mental health assistance to every Texan regardless of location. (A weekly feature of the Health Education Division, Texas State Department of Health.)

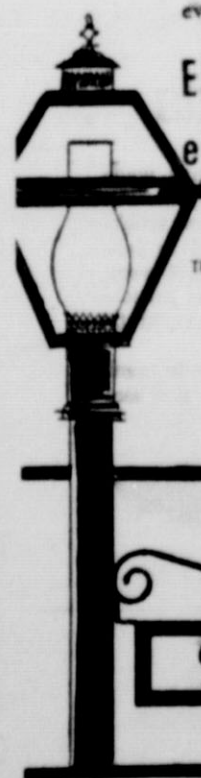

Matador, Dougherty, Crosbyton, Floydada and other communities. Value of the acts of neighborliness was cited as possibly saving much of the valuable grass in the western part of the county.

**Wheeler Fireman Loses Life.** Dudley Callan, 39, who operated the De Luxe Cleaning plant in Wheeler, and was a volunteer fireman on the Wheeler fire department, was engulfed by flames as he battled a mid-morning grassfire near Wheeler Saturday. He suffered burns over 100% of his body and died late Saturday afternoon.

One of the most severe sand storms in ten years swept the Panhandle Saturday. Winds up to 75mph were recorded. It is estimated the wind here may have reached 40mph when visibility was at times reduced to less than a quarter of a mile.

In the upper Panhandle on Highway 66 a strange accident in which 17 motor vehicles were declared involved occurred near Shamrock. Sand from a blowing field, driven by the 70mph wind, made it impossible to see. A bus stopped and other vehicles continued to pile up. Actual number involved is not known. Several people were hospitalized but none seriously.

In Montague County (North Texas) three great prairie fires charred more than 100,000 acres, destroyed scores of buildings and many head of livestock. The wind Saturday reached a velocity of 65 miles per hour at Lubbock, according to reports.
