to 90 percent of a horse population. This reduces the danger of passing the infection on by direct contact or contamination of feed and water.

Animals showing these symptoms should not be exercised, and a veterinarian should be called immediately. With proper treatment the animal usually recovers in five to ten days.

There are some jobs that need to be done to the ornamental plants around the home in the late summer. Annuals begin to look dry, and should be watered thoroughly during the dry period. Faded annual flowers should be cut to prevent seed production since plants allowed to grow seed will soon stop producing flowers. Cutting them back will help rejuvenate them and encourage new growth which will flower and produce a new display of color. Mildew can be prevented by covering the plants with a fungicide, which should be applied at first sign of the disease.

Some shrubs need pruning this time of year, and to delay too long does not help in controlling the form and size of young plants. Light pruning of evergreens and broadleaf evergreens can be done during the summer to shape and control their size. The ultimate size of each tree should be known so that the owner can begin pruning soon enough to prevent plants from getting too large for the space in which they are planted.

### COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

attended a beef cattle short course at A&M the last week of August and picked up some ideas that should be of help to cattle producers in the county. Below are summaries of findings, and if you are interested in a particular item, stop by my office, and I will go into detail about the item of interest. 1. A forage analysis lab is to be operated, and feed content of grass and forage crops can be determined. 2. For improved Bermuda grasses to do the best,

they should be mowed 2 inches high if a hay crop is removed. 3. Some deferred grazing systems have been worked out and tested that are improving ranges. In many cases little additional fencing is needed.

4. Crossing breeds results in hybrid vigor and heavier calves. 5. Fertility testing of bulls increases the percentage of calf crop. This service is available. 6. A big cow doesn't always produce a large calf. Do you know what characteristics are due to heredity? 7. Lactic acid caused by high concentrate feeding may depress appetite. This can be corrected by ration planning.

8. Fly control is one step in pinkeye control. 9. The best method of treating animals that bloats is to sell. 10. Grain sor-

ghum is not responsible for Urinary Calculi, and the addition of Ammonium chloride to the ration is very effective in preventing the formation of calculi.

11. A simple test has been developed to determine the presence of nitrates in plants. This can be done locally to determine if the plants should be grazed or not. Plants in the doubtful class as determined by the local test should be submitted to a lab for a complete test. When I can obtain the material for the test, the initial test can be done in the county. If interested, please let me know.

12. Choice of protein supplements can reduce the feed bill during the winter. I have information on combinations that can be used. In addition to these items, other new developments were presented, along with feedlot problems. This information is available for the asking.

For farmers interested in cotton defoliation, the new pamphlet L-145 "Cotton Defoliation Guide" is available for the asking.

A new kind of horse influenza that is causing great concern in the eastern states may soon spread to Texas. Horse owners should pay special attention to their animals during the next few weeks for signs of respiratory infection. An affected animal will cough, run a fever up to 105 degrees, have a slight nasal discharge and show a loss of appetite. An animal with the disease should be isolated as soon as it is detected because local outbreaks may affect 80

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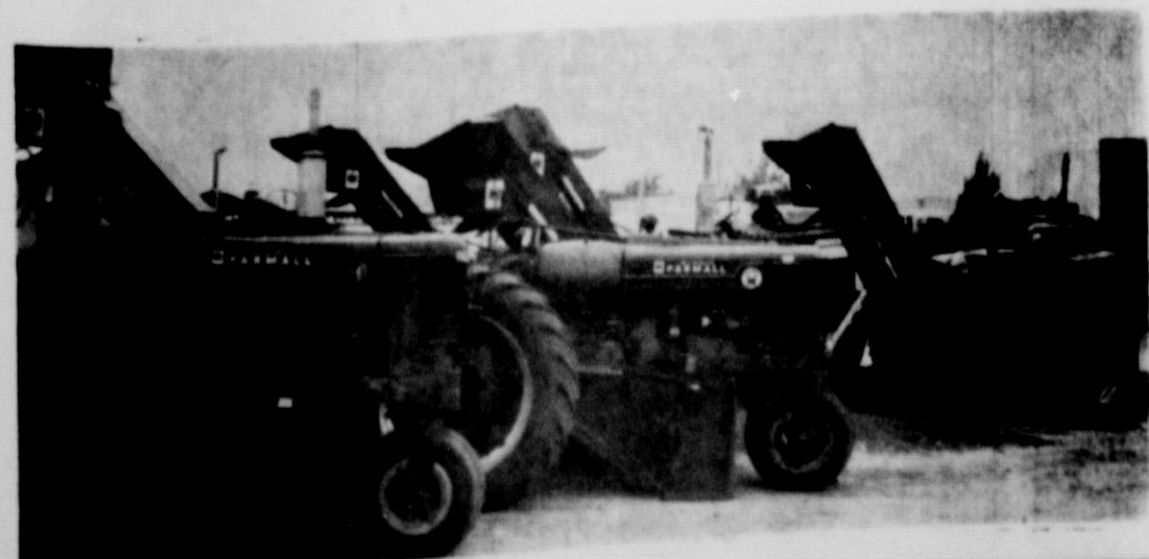
