Enthusiasm High at 4-H Awards Meet

ENTHUSIASM sparked here Monday night at the annual Matley County 4-H Achievement Program and banquet held in the American Legion building. A crowd estimated at 260 attended and witnessed the presentation of 107 awards to 78 different 4-H members, of whom 31 received their first county award.

Presentation was by County Agent Bill Palmeyer, who expressed other presentations of awards made by local sponsors, representatives and 4-H leaders.

Soaking Rains Fall Over West Texas

GENTLE RAINS moved into West Texas Monday night, and brought a relief to the drought in many areas. State reports declared the rains extended over most of Texas.

The moisture brought the cotton harvest to an abrupt shutdown. While the fall here as registered by Bob Stanley was 1.42 inches, it was much heavier in other sections. Afton reported 3.50 inches, with a report of 3.25 inches at Dumont, Dickens had 2.50 inches and McAdoo had 3 inches.

Weather forecasters say the coldest spell of the season is moving toward Texas and may set off more showers. It is expected to drop the mercury sharply in this area.

The rains here Monday night and Tuesday was the largest amount of moisture recorded by Bob Stanley since August 31. It brought the year's total to 14.64 as compared with 20.04 on the same date last year.

By way of contrast Matador received 77-inch in October as compared with 1.44 in 1962. This Sept was 1.38 compared with 4.58 in 1962.

Burglars Hit 2 Flomot Firms

Previous to the Salem Dry Goods strike by burglars here last week, two Flomot places of business had been victims of thieves (The Tribune did not receive information on the burglaries until after publication).

First place hit was Lou Waters Cafe which was entered Saturday night, November 9th. Entry was made by prying open a back window. The loss included a billfold, broken piggy bank, container of tax money and some personal effects. Estimated loss was \$12. The investigation was made by Deputy Lewis Blevins.

Harrison George's Food Store was hit the next night (Sunday). Here the thieves gained entrance through a back door and left by the front door. They took a large amount of merchandise, including 50 to 60 cartons of cigarettes.

The thieves tore open files and scattered papers over the store, apparently seeking money. In the dry goods department they took ladies hose, underwear, and expensive garments. Total loss was estimated at between \$600 and \$700. The burglary was investigated by Sheriff Jinks Wilson and Deputy Blevins.

Injuries and illnesses plague several Matador starters against the undefeated Wheeler Mustangs. Some business places have announced early closing so that a full contingent of Matador supporters can attend the crucial game.

Representative Bill Healy is Lions Speaker

THE COST is more than \$2 million dollars to build a mile of 6-lane highway in Texas, State Representative Bill Healy (82nd Dist.) of Paducah, told the Matador Lions Club members Tuesday.

He was the principal speaker at the regular luncheon meeting of the civic club, held in the Methodist Church basement. He was introduced by County Judge Elbert Reeves, program sponsor.

Rep. Healy is chairman of the powerful appropriations committee, declared one of the most important posts in Austin. He explained how 85% of the \$3 billion, 600 million (each two years) tax dollars are spent.

Rep. Healy showed that education gets 31 cents of each tax dollar, with highways coming in for 27 cents out of the dollar. Welfare (old age, afflicted children, etc.) receive 16 cents out of the tax dollar. Higher education (colleges, universities) get 9 cents and state hospitals get 4 cents out of the dollar.

Texas education for over 2,000,000 boys and girls is costing \$494 million per year. The 140,000 students in 20 state colleges cost \$159 millions per year. Texas, with three medical colleges spends \$7000 per year on each medical student.

Rep. Healy explained the re-districting may affect Motley County and that it may, in the future, be a part of a 12 county district instead of eight.

District Champs 8 Times Fabulous Matadors Mark Glory Decade

The Remarkable "Ten" of a Fabulous "Eleven" On Thanksgiving Day, 1954, the Matador "Matadors" pulled one of the most stunning upsets of the football season and defeated highly favored Stinnett 14 to 13 in a bi-district game at Floydada. They then easily defeated Bovina 46 to 7 to bring to Matador the Regional championship.

Since that successful season, the Matadors have completed nine additional campaigns, except for the current season playoffs, and, in those ten years, have compiled one of the most remarkable records in Texas schoolboy football.

During this ten year period, the Fabulous Matadors have won eight district championships, six bi-district championships, and have been regional champions five times, with bi-district and regional competition still to be played this year.

Their record for the ten years stands at 89 wins, 18 losses and 3 ties. Against teams in higher classifications (A and AA), the Matadors held a respectable 20 wins, 13 losses, two ties edge; but against teams in its own "B" classification, they have the phenomenal record of 69 wins, five losses, and one tie. The only teams in Class B which hold wins over the Matadors are Wheeler (20 to 6 in 1956), Turkey (21 to 0 in 1958), Knox City (19 to 18 in 1959), Rochester (16 to 6 in 1961), and Throckmorton (34 to 28 in 1961).

In the ten years, the Matadors have scored 3616 points while yielding 1184. Against Class B opponents in 75 games, they have amassed 2964 points (39.5 per game) against 675 (9.0 per game) for the opposition. They have been shut out in the scoring column only three times; by Crowell (1954), Turkey (1958) and Paducah (1959).

Because of the strong schedule they continue to play year after year, the Matadors do not have a "perfect" season; however, in 1960 and 1962, they had only a tie to mar their record, with eleven wins each year. In the ten year period, they have never had a losing season record.

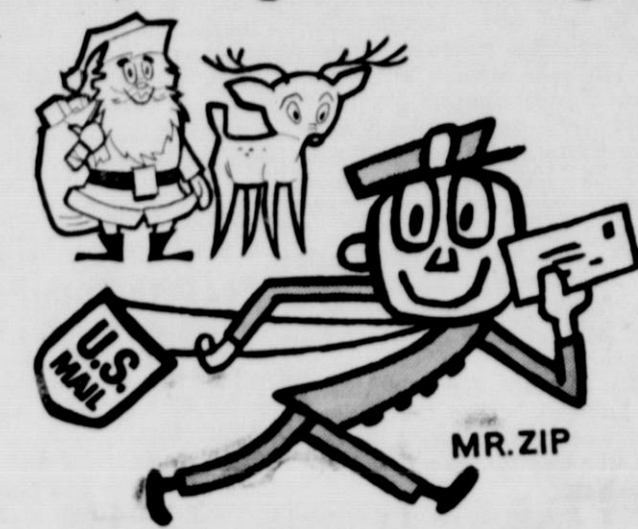

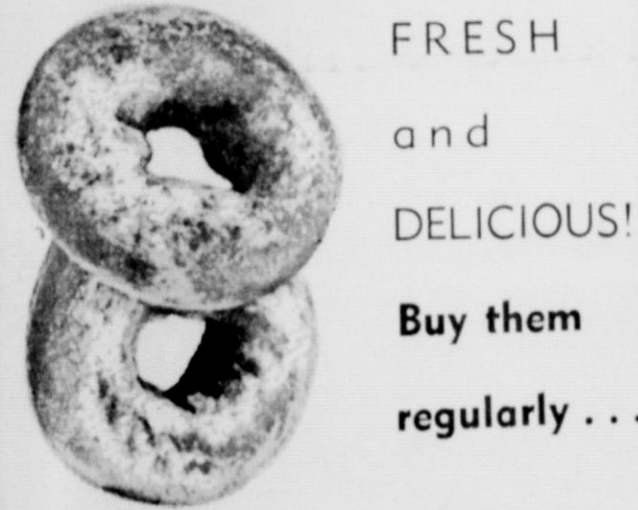

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

The following information was presented at the Spur Experiment Station Field Day on Oct. 25th.

For each pound of woody plant (Mesquite, Shinnery, etc.) produced, enough moisture is used to produce 4 pounds of grass. Which had you rather have?

In the cleared and brush plots, the value of the cleared plots to the owner was \$1 per acre per year. How many years would it take you to recover your cost of clearing brush, and how many years will you have left over as profit before another treatment is needed?

Over a 5 year period of 1958-62, yield of cotton line was 205 lbs./ac. on land that was bench leveled or terraced, while yield of land with rows down the slope produced 131 lbs./ac. Cost was \$19.54 to bench level the land, which was constructed to eliminate the point rows resulting from terracing. The increased yield of 74 lbs./ac. was worth \$22.20 per year with an average

price of cotton at 30 cents, or \$111.00 increase over the 5 year period.

Cotton burs applied at the rate of 4 to 8 tons per acre have given economical net returns in yields.

Skip row feed has produced the same amount of feed of higher quality as solid plantings in dry years.

Spreader terraces to collect run-off from hillsides to spread on flat areas has increased carrying capacity of pastures three times by utilization of this water.

If you have noticed wax or gum oozing from the trunk of your peach trees they are probably infested with peach tree borers and now is the time to control these pests. Use Paradi-chlorobenzene crystals (moth balls) applied in November, with all weeds and grass removed from around the tree trunk for about a foot and the crystals placed in a circular band around the tree about two inches from the trunk. A mound of dirt six inches high should then be packed against the tree without allowing the crystals to touch the tree as they will harm it. Leave the mound until spring, then level back to the original ground line. Two to three year old trees require about 1/2 ounce of crystals per tree, and four to five year old trees require 3/4 ounce per tree. Mature trees require 1 ounce per tree. When the crystals are placed around

trees, the soil should be dry and the soil temperature above 55 degrees Fahrenheit.

Grease (Elbow) To Shine Teeth

Texas State Department of Health

Austin — It's elbow grease that cleans teeth — not toothpaste. Apply elbow grease to the toothbrush and you have the best possible home weapon for oral hygiene.

Lavish claims for various toothpastes and powders can be and are misleading. The key to dental health lies in the conscientiously applied dental program — regular, thorough toothbrushing and annual check-ups — rather than a cure-all toothpaste or powder.

Dentifrice — powder, paste or liquid used in cleaning teeth — miracles seem to follow much the same pattern. Each has its buildup only to fall into oblivion after a time.

Take the once-heralded ammoniated dentifrices — developed on the theory that their high urea content would help prevent dental decay. They failed to live up to their billing, according to dentists who carried out controlled studies.

Similarly, promises for the widely touted chlorophyll denti-

frices have not been fulfilled. Nor do the so-called anti-bleach toothpastes qualify for the claim that they reduce dental caries according to dental research. A late entry into the "toothpaste field" is the "cure" dentifrice. Evidence of its effectiveness is limited.

Must Be Brushed
In the final analysis, no dentifrice provides a panacea for the continuing problem of tooth decay. A product may be developed one day by researchers which will have a built-in biological therapeutic action. Even then, the teeth must be brushed frequently and well to clean them.


Timing is the essence in battling tooth decay. Dentists emphasize that teeth should be brushed after each meal, each snack.

The secret of proper brushing, they point out, is thorough cleaning teeth as often as you get them dirty. Watch you're doing in the mirror, rely completely on "feel."

And when you're through brushing, store the toothbrush in a light airy place so that bristles are allowed to dry and regain their original stiffness.

Whatever powder or paste you use, remember, nothing substitutes for brushing your teeth with elbow grease. And if you are unable to brush your teeth after eating, rinse your mouth with water.

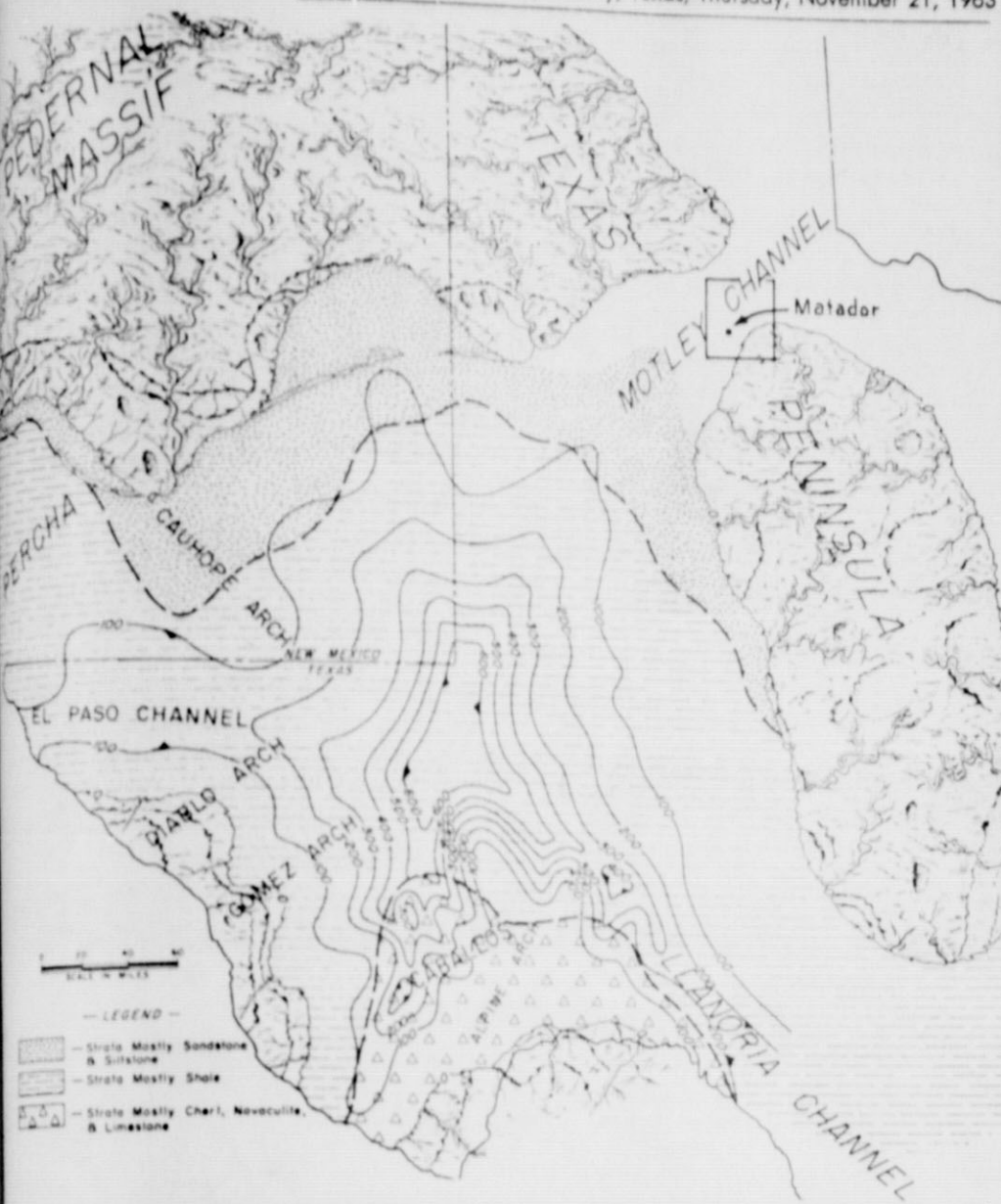

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Progress Report

Upper Pease Soil Conservation District
The cotton harvest is completed on several farms and the wheat has been sown. Now is a good time to plan and to apply practices needed to control wind and water erosion.

Stuart Dixon has completed about three miles of terraces on his farm.

Tom Edwards is planning to do some terracing soon. He is planning to lay out and build a parallel terrace system with the assistance of the Soil Conservation Technicians.

C. R. Brandon has developed a conservation plan which includes seeding about 65 acres of land to native grasses, drilling a well and building a water storage facility. He will receive cost-share assistance through the Great Plains Conservation Program.

Land that is now in the Conservation Reserve is also eligible for cost-share assistance through the Great Plains Conservation Program for establishing to native grasses. This can be done while the C. R. program is in effect and be established to native grass so it will be ready to graze when it comes out of the Soil Bank.
