Consolidation Of Taxing Entities Subject Of Tuesday's Meeting

Motley County Tax office representatives met on Tuesday, January 14 to discuss the possibilities of consolidating all tax offices into one unit. Current, the Hospital District, School

District and the County are under one contract. With consolidation of tax entities the City of Matador and Roaring Springs also will be included. Under this proposal three major benefits

GTE Customers In Roaring Springs To 'Switchover' Sat.

General Telephone of the Southwest's customers in Roaring Springs, will soon benefit from electronic telephone service, according to Jerry West, Operations Manager in Memphis.

"A switchover from a mechanical switching system to an electronic switching system will bring the latest in telephone technology to our customers in Roaring Springs. Cutover to this new switching system will take place at 12:01 AM on Saturday, January 18, 1986. During the cutover, customers may experience a 15-minute interruption of service. The 12:01AM time was selected to minimize customer inconvenience as much as possible." It's the biggest service improvement change slated for Roaring Springs this year," said West, "and it's part of our commitment in providing the finest service possible."

Currently, Roaring Springs is being served by all relay switching equipment in the central office, according to West. "This will be replaced by an electronic system with 288 lines, and a potential for 6,000 lines," he mentioned, "which will provide our customers with faster more efficient service."


Customers will have a new number assigned to their current telephone line. After January 18,

customers will be using the new telephone number which was recently mailed to them from the Memphis Business Office. West noted, "If you have not received your number by January 16, please contact the Business Office for your new telephone number assignment."

"After January 18, customers will need to dial all seven digits of the telephone number when placing local calls or the call will not complete," West stated. For coin telephone customers, it will be necessary to deposit coins before making the call, and it is recommended to read the directions on the instrument carefully. For two-party line customers dialing long distance, it will be necessary to give their number to the operator since the calling number will not be automatically identified. All of the new dialing instructions will be in effect after the conversion on January 18," West commented.

The switchover will cost in excess of \$298,000, including building construction, equipment, and labor expenses. West concluded, "We in the Memphis Operations are proud to bring this service improvement to the fine citizens of Roaring Springs and hope that we continue to serve the ever-changing communication needs of this community."

Quiet Day In Commissioners Court

The Motley County Commissioners met Monday, January 13th for their regular monthly meeting in the Motley County Courthouse.

Those present were Judge Billy Joe Whitaker, Commissioners Frazier Watson, Joseph (Gid) Simpson, Bill Washington and John (Sonny) Russell.

First order of business was the opening of sealed bids for the used Senior Citizens van. Although only 2 bids were submitted, Glynard Daniel's bid was accepted at \$855.

Bills for the month were then read and approved for payment. Monthly bills this month totaled approximately \$8500.00 with \$1713.40 for Prec. I \$1229.40 Prec. II, \$1133.51 Prec. III and 308.00 Prec. IV and \$4000. for Motley County general fund, library and sheriff office. The Justice of Peace report revealed a collection of \$3676.00 in fines.

Marisue Potts and Pam Thacker, Board member of the Motley County Library, then

discussed the status of the library's location. Several alternatives were discussed including the old hospital building, the Tribune building and others although no conclusion was reached. The board members expressed their concern for a permanent place and are willing to work hard for that.

Following a lunch break the commissioners went into a closed session to discuss salaries of county employees.

In other business, Judge Whitaker announced his reelection as well as announcements from Bill Washington and Frazier Watson of their filing for election.

Dickens County Attorney To Run For District Judge

Dickens County Attorney David Cave submitted his resignation to the Commissioners Court Monday and announced he would be a candidate for District Judge in the coming Democratic Primary.

The move leaves the County Attorney's office vacant and the Commissioners Court immediately named Cave as Temporary Special Prosecutor and County Legal Advisor.

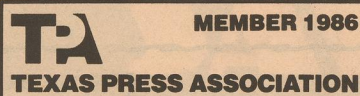
"As Temporary Special Prosecutor, Mr. Cave could represent the County in criminal matters and as County Legal Advisor, he could represent the County

in civil matters." County Judge Bill Young told The Texas Spur following the regular monthly meeting of the Court.

The Court accepted Cave's resignation. Judge Young said he did not know if anyone would file for the unexpired

term of County Attorney. Cave took office for his third elective term in January of 1985. Over two years remain on this term.

Every person desires to be free-to live his life in peace and joy. Just as there is, also, an opposing force to hold man captive.

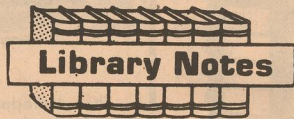

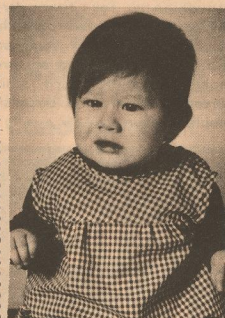

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Roaring Springs City Council Meets For Regular Session

Roaring Springs City Council met for their regular monthly meeting on Jan. 7, 1986 with Council members Charley Long, Gene Brannon, Vincente Saenz and Ronnie Thacker in attendance as well as Mayor Eugene Watson and City Manager Annie Alvarado.

NEW PHONE NUMBERS

First on the agenda was Joe Vandever, GTE supervisor, who pinpointed Jan. 18 as the date the new telephone system will be fully operational. Telephone calls after midnight of Jan. 17 to old Roaring Springs numbers will find a recording directing them to Directory Assistance for new phone numbers (listed in the 1986 Directory). It will be necessary, after that date, to dial all seven numbers for local calls. Residents will now be able to use Touch-Tone phones with the new system. Councilman expressed great appreciation to Mr. Vandever for all the extensive preliminary work he has done to procure the new system. To mark this special occasion the City Council and local community leaders will be the guests of GTE for a dinner at the City Cafe Jan. 18 at 7 p.m. At that time a special phone will be installed at the cafe to allow Mayor Watson to make a long-distance call to a destination of his choice.

Trash Pit

Next on the agenda was Bill Jameson, Director of Public Utilities, who met with the Council in regards to the necessity of digging a new trash pit. Mr. Jameson explained that although a new trash pit had been dug 3 months prior to the tornado, the debris from cleaning up Matador had filled the pit much more rapidly than normal usage would have done. Usual pit life would be 4-5 years. According to Jameson, cost of a new pit would be approximately \$4000, and if the cost were split between the two towns and the County then it would be a manageable cost.

Jameson went on to note that the cost of pit maintenance (approximately \$150./month) has up to this point been borne by the city of Matador. There was a brief discussion although no conclusion was reached at this time.

DELINQUENT DEBTS

City manager Alvarado reported to the Council that she and the city's accountant continued to work on the problem of delinquent debts to the city. The accountant recommended starting 1986 at base zero rather than backtracking the last seven years determining back debts. Councilman reiterated the degree of high priority in establishing a business-like manner of operating the city office.

OTHER BUSINESS

Discussion of water and sewage system problems ensued. The current chlorinator is not working properly causing a film on water surfaces. It was noted that this particular system is rather expensive to operate, costing approximately \$12/week (\$3000/year). At one time, a gas-chlorinated system was used which the cost was only approximately \$3/week. To replace the present chlorinator with a gas-chlorinator would cost around \$1800. Discussion ended with no decision being made at this time.

The desirability for the city of Roaring Springs to join the Texas Municipal League was reviewed by council members. It was explained that the Texas Municipal League would be advantageous in assisting with legal, municipal matters and community affairs of all kinds. It is a cooperative of self-governing towns and the yearly dues are \$300.

Upon completing the city Council agenda a lively discussion followed regarding specifics of Grant implementation, the city Managers responsibilities and additional salary requirements of

On the minus side, consolidation presents some interesting challenges, as well as benefits. Computerization is a highly recommended aspect of setting up an efficient tax-appraisal office. This will require an initial capital expenditure and the specialized skills of a computer operator. By the same token, the initial investment would, as time advanced, serve as a time-saving mechanism. Consolidation would demand that all tax record information be up to date and easily accessible. It would also include a need for physical space in which to work.

Under consolidation, all tax records would be formatted in uniform style. All taxes would be on one set of papers and payable at one office. Representatives from each local governmental entity have been advised by Attorney Tom Hamilton to visit other appraisal districts to find out the problems they have encountered and the best approaches in order to avoid any political ramifications.

Each taxing entity has an appointed representative to make up the board. Land appraised by the Appraisal District is based on various factors such as land classification as denoted by the Soil Conservation Service in "Motley County Soil Survey," by capitalization, whether land is in cultivation or pasture, etc. Any given farm could conceivably have within it's borders, multiple classifications, each of which is assessed at a different rate. The total tax is a composite of X amount of acres of a certain classification, plus the appraised value of the buildings. The appraisal District is required to measure all buildings, to be aware of additions to buildings (and assign a value for this), note change of ownership and the construction of new buildings. Land values, state wide tax base and actual land sales are also a factor in figuring the taxes.

The Appraisal District is also required by law to update employees under the Grant. Manager Alvarado agreed to furnish council members with a detailed report of Grant expenditures and specifications.

appraisals every five years. All in all the Appraisal District has specific requirements that must be met by law. The diverse nature of the appraisal office presents special considerations which to some degree will be simplified with Consolidation of all tax offices. True, there will be an initial investment required and knowledgeable personnel to establish a working unit, but the long term benefits must be an active consideration.


There will be a number change as a result of this conversion- new telephone numbers have been mailed to you and your prefix will remain "348".

NEW DIALING INSTRUCTIONS

Customers will need to dial all seven digits when calling local numbers. Currently, customers can dial five digits to complete local calls. After the conversion, all seven digits must be dialed for calls to complete.

Customers now have the option, and many have done so, to purchase telephone instruments from GTE or various other retail vendors. In connection with the switchover, some purchased/owned equipment may present problems. This non-leased equipment, including telephones and answering machines, may or may not be compatible with the new switching system. The Town was named for the Matador Ranch, the headquarters of which were established in 1879 at Ballard Springs. When Motley County was organized in 1891, there was no town in the county. A townsite, sponsored by H.H. Campbell was designated, and the necessary twenty business

houses were supplied by cowboys from the ranch headquarters who set up one-day businesses in order for a patent to be granted. The Post Office was established on this date, January 21, 1886--a century ago.

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MAN GETS LIFE IN TECH MURDER RETRIAL

(A recent story in Lubbock's Avalanche-Journal)

DALLAS (AP)-A man convicted of killing a Texas Tech student in the Trinity River bottoms 10 years ago was sentenced to death Thursday.

An appeals court reversed the first murder conviction of Ronald Curtis Chambers. In a re-trial, Chambers was convicted Tuesday and received the death penalty from a state district court jury Thursday.

In July 1975, a jury in Dallas sentenced Chambers to death after convicting him of beating Michael McMahan to death in the Trinity River bottom during a robbery.

The decision was reversed last year when the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals ruled that a psychiatrist who testified in the first punishment phase had failed to inform Chambers of his right to consult a lawyer before an interview.

The Supreme Court declined to review the reversal earlier this year.

The murdered Michael McMahan was the nephew of local resident, Nelson McMahan.

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
