Year Ends on Note Of Weird Weather

UNEXPECTED SNOWSTORM Sunday afternoon left weather forecasters explaining, Texas Panhandle motorists distressed and farmers grateful for almost half an inch of moisture. The blanket which was spread from the exline to the Big Spring area resulted in many highway accidents. One near fatality occurred west of Matador on US Highway 70 at the height of the blinding storm.

Only reported casualty of the storm was Lewis McCuistian of Floydada who was struck by a car while crossing US Highway 70 five miles west of Matador about 4:30 Sunday afternoon.

McCuistian was struck by a car driven by Sharon Lynn Pair of Little Rock, Ark. Traffic was moving at a snail pace on the highway and visibility was near zero. McCuistian had been on the south side of the road to render aid to three Matador residents who had skidded into a borrow ditch. He apparently stepped in the path of the car without seeing it. The man was taken to People's Hospital in Floydada and the accident was investigated by Deputies Bobby Williams and Lewis Blevins.

McCuistian suffered a fractured and dislocated shoulder, body bruises. He had been rendering aid to Miss Roberta Jameson of Matador, accompanied by three sisters, Mrs. Redmon Pate of Lake Arthur, N. M., Mrs. Jim Ratcliff and Miss Ona Jameson, both of Matador.

Miss Jameson (Roberta) driver of the car, said she did not witness the accident because of the poor visibility, but heard the woman driver of the other car scream after she had struck McCuistian.

Numerous other accidents kept local officers busy most of the night. Previously Sunday, weathermen had predicted that the area would have four or five days of fair weather with no precipitation in sight.

Early Sunday afternoon an Amarillo radio station began warning motorists of the dangerous roads and hazards resulting from the snow storm. The snow moved southeastward at about ten miles per hour.

The "wet" snow began melting immediately while the mercury stood near the freezing point. In less than an hour the ground was covered and accumulations appeared on cars. By five

Tom S. Ferguson Claimed by Death

Thomas Smith Ferguson, 68, retired farmer died of a heart attack about 8:00 a.m. Tuesday, Dec. 24, at his home near Roaring Springs.

Funeral services were held at 2:00 p.m. Thursday at the First Baptist Church, Roaring Springs. Rev. H. W. Hill, pastor was in charge of the service, with Rev. Bob Moore, former pastor, now pastor of the Skyline Baptist Church in Lubbock, preaching the memorial message.

Burial was in the Roaring Springs Cemetery under direction of Seigler Funeral Home. Mr. Ferguson was born March 17, 1895 at Avalon in Ellis County, Texas and died December 24, 1963 at the age of 68 years, 9 months and 7 days. He was a member of the Roaring Springs First Baptist Church and a veteran of World War I.

He had made his home in Roaring Springs since 1918 and lived on a farm with his sister, Miss Bess Ferguson and a brother, John Ferguson. Survivors in addition to these are four other brothers: Frank of Roaring Springs, Bob of Wichita Falls, Onas of Midland, and Angus Ferguson of Wichita, Kansas.

Pallbearers were J. M. Thacker, Dean McInroe, Corby Lee Marshall, Buck Marshall, S. J. Braselton and Caldwell Smith.

Four Matadors Named on Area Team

Four players (three seniors and a junior) on the Matador Matadors 1963 grid team have been named on the All-South Plains Class B teams, with another on the runner-up unit. One of the players, Richard Campbell, the junior, was also named on the All-South Plains Dream Team selected by The Avalanche-Journal (Lubbock) sports staff.

Following report of the selections is by Bill Hart, Avalanche-Journal Sports Editor.

The Matador Matadors, who haven't lost to a school its size in years, placed four players on the All-South Plains Class B teams and had another on the runner-up unit.

This is the most one school has put on one team this year. The Matadors were voted the top B team in the area and with the talent they had it is easy to see why they were top ranked.

The Matadors landed end David Rattan, tackle Robert Brandon, center Jack McCallie and fullback Richard Campbell on the first unit and guard Johnny Thomas on the second team.

Coach Charlie Johnson led the team to the Region 2 crown despite losing the entire backfield last year by graduation.

Campbell, at 206 pounds, was the workhorse of the Matador attack, especially in the playoffs as he carried the ball 83 plays in two games. For the entire season he lugged the ball a fantastic 286 times for 1,397 yards and in two of the games, he played less than half of the time. He scored 86 points in nine games during the regular season.

He threw only one pass and it went for 41 yards and a touchdown and he also served as punter for the team. On defense, Campbell averaged over 10 tackles a game, intercepted four passes and recovered three fumbles.

Rattan was an excellent blocker and did a good job of defense as a linebacker. In the bi-district game with Wheeler, the opponent had minus yardage around the end where he and McCallie played. He played guard and quarterback last year and this season, he played some at halfback where he carried the ball 13 times for 110 yards. He's been a regular at one spot or another for four years.

Brandon played offensive and defensive tackle for Matador, but he was more outstanding on defense, although he was a good blocker and most of the yardage Matador made was over him. Very little yardage was made over him by the opponents.

McCallie, at 165, was offensive center and defensive end for the Matadors. He, too, was a fine blocker and no one ran consistently around end when he was in there. His biggest play of the season came in the final minute of the regional finals when a Knox City back broke, but McCallie made a diving, one-handed tackle to stop him and preserve the win. He did a fine job blocking for the Matadors too.

Tree Doctors

COLLEGE STATION — Questionable tree doctors, who not only have taken citizens for tremendous amounts of money but may harm trees, are being reported from across the state, says Wendell Horne, plant pathologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Unfortunately these so-called tree doctors also give reputable silviculturists a bad name, says the specialist. These operators usually claim that they have secret formulas that will cure ailing trees. When asked about his cure-all, he usually explains that it is so new that research has not heard about it as yet.

Horne recommends that an unbiased authority, such as the local county agricultural agent, be consulted to diagnose the tree's ailment before bargaining with people that make such claims. It is also advisable for the home-owner to inquire about the operator's qualifications to work on trees. Most of the questionable operators usually have no formal training in tree care or plant pathology. The reputable ones are always glad to give their background and qualifications and are willing to back-up

their claims with scientific data, points out the specialist.

Home-owners are reminded by Horne that there are no miracle cures for tree ailments, and when new treatments are found, research and educational organizations immediately make the information available to the public without charge.

o'clock visibility had dropped to near zero.

Bob Stanley melted 47-inch of moisture from the fall. Several estimated that more than five inches of snow fell here, despite three and one-half measurements. Because of rapid melting it was impossible to gauge the actual depth.

After a lull in the storm following darkness, more snow fell about midnight to cling to wires, fences, posts and trees. There was no drifting in this area but strong winds were experienced in a few counties to the southwest as the front moved forward.

Odis Killingsworth who keeps US Weather Bureau gauges here said he measured 32-inch of moisture from the snowfall.
