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Matador Factory Busy Building

Fine Terracers

A Matador factory, King's Welding Service, is making the finest farm terracer ever constructed, and they are being sold from Wellington to Snyder and from the Caprock to Olney.

Probably one of the greatest implements ever constructed to aid in soil conservation is the Terra-Mender. The terracers are made in two sizes, 8-ft. and 10-ft. They can be operated from any tractor that has hydraulic lift.

To date no farmer or rancher who has ever tried a Terra-Mender, has failed to become a customer. They are sold on a positive guarantee. The machines are made to construct and repair terraces (fill low places and level rough terraces) but they will build roads, clean turn-rows and one customer used his Terra-Mender to dig a cesspool.

J. W. King of Aspermont perfected the Terra-Mender and builds them here in the former Aldrich Welding Shop which he bought about five months ago. The firm has one employee, Marvin Johnson, who lives in Roaring Springs because he could not find a house in Matador.

King did not start making the Terra-Mender from a drawing. He was a custom terracer for five years before the machine was put on the market. "It was built by experience," he said, "being perfected by actual use."

The firm can make from three to five terracers per week but expects to employ additional help to increase the production. The machines are being sold almost as fast as they are made.

A series of monthly letters from August from Minister Coker, former Roaring High School teacher, of his experiences since going to Guatemala as a missionary for the Church of Christ. Mr. Coker left the state in June, and the first letter was getting set and getting acquainted.

In his first letter, Mr. Coker wrote, "Elise and I are now in our own home in Guatemala. It is located in the northeast section of the city. Home address is: 14 Av. Zone 10. We like our home very much. We have four bedrooms and two baths, besides a kitchen and a living room for company."

The Lord's work is progressing steadily. The Zone 9 Spanish congregation is in the process of building a new house for worship and teaching. Also, the Spanish congregation is looking for a place to build. The three Spanish congregations of the area are all making progress. I am alternating my Sunday preaching among the English and Spanish congregations. During the week I make some trips to the smaller towns of the departments of Guatemala.

People Are Congenial
The people of this country are very congenial and pleasant. Many of them are eager to learn the Gospel of Christ. The field here is truly ripe unto harvest. The climate here is almost unbelievable. It is cool and breezy every day. We sleep under one blanket at night. There is no need for air-conditioning in the houses. Also, there is no need for heaters, since the temperature hardly ever takes more than a 10-degree drop. There are flowers and fresh vegetables the year round. The fresh vegetables and fruits are very cheap but other products are outrageously high.

September Busy Month
In his second letter about his activities, dated October 7, Mr. Coker wrote, "... talk about busy months! During September I made departmental teaching trips to San Pedro Moca, San Pedro Cutzan, San Pedro La Laguna, Chicacoa, Flores, Santa Elena, San Andres, and San Benito.

These trips are to encourage the brethren that are in these small towns and follow up leads that we receive through our Bible Correspondence Course. This is a free course that is given to interested people who apply for it through the coupon on our handbills and newspaper advertisements. Several souls have been led to Christ through contacts made by this course.

Five Counties To be Mapped

Motley County is included in a group of five West Texas counties scheduled for topographic mapping, according to a release from the Texas Water Commission.

Commissioner O. F. Dent says the state commission has a two-year cooperative contract with the U. S. Geological Survey for topographic mapping of over 6,800,000 acres in the state. The work is divided into 21 projects. The contract includes Motley, Cottle, King, Knox and Foard Counties in a project.

Topographic maps show man-made developments, such as highways, cities, reservoirs, etc. as well as the land-surface elevation. The land-surface elevations are shown by contour lines which connect points having the same elevation.

Topographic maps are necessary for both surface-water and underground-water studies. They also are used extensively by cities, utilities, soil conservation districts, and many other groups.

The mapping process includes obtaining aerial photographs, field surveys to obtain data on land elevations, and compilation of the map.

These finished maps will be at a scale of one (1) inch equals 2,000 feet.

Proper Report of Wages Important

It is extremely important that wages be reported by employees in order that an employee draw social security benefits. It is pointed out by John G. Hutton, district manager at the Lubbock Social Security office.

"All employers who are required to file quarterly returns of wages on form 941 should be sure to show the employee's name and social security number on the return exactly as it is shown on the employee's social security card," Hutton stressed.

"Failure to follow these instructions may result in the wages not being credited to the em-

ployee's social security account. "Since the amount of retirement, disability and survivors benefits payable is based on the amount of wages posted to a worker's account, it is very important that his wages be properly reported. Do not trust his memory. Ask the employee to show you his card."

A representative of the Lubbock Social Security office will be at First State Bank in Matador on Nov. 12, between 9:30 and 11:30 a.m. to aid in making reports.

Terracing Methods Have Changed Since Introduced in Motley County

Terraces, one of the first measures to be used in soil and water conservation land treatment, have been in use in Motley County in one form or another since introduced in the late 1930's.

Methods have undergone considerable change in recent years. The early terraces were narrow, with steep side slopes, and spaced fairly close in a lot of cases, making it nearly impossible to work them with modern farm machinery.

The modern day terraces have a wider base, added height, fuller side slopes and wider vertical spacing to make them adapted to modern day machinery. Their function to handle runoff and spread water has not been changed, according to the Soil Conservation, but their present design enables farmers to perform their necessary management and tillage operations without impediment.

Another modern day variation is parallel terraces whereby a given row spacing is worked out between them. The parallel system should be incorporated into a sound conservation plan because of the added expense of installing them. Their only limitation is that uniform slopes are needed to have a sound design.

Some of the first terraces were installed without adequate design or installation. This causes considerable trouble in their function and upkeep. Constant effort has been made by Soil Conservation Service Conservationists to improve the design of terraces. The local SCS Assisting

We had early morning and late evening swims every day. That life is beautiful.

Teaches Greek in Spanish
"I began a Greek class for some of our promising Guatemalan preachers here in the Capital. I have 7 members in class, and most of them are doing quite well. We meet for one hour in the mornings, Tuesday through Thursday... Teaching Greek in Spanish is quite a challenge for me, but I am enjoying it very much.

"Several of you have asked concerning gifts to us for our expected baby. Please do not send any packages of any description. We will have to pay import duties on them that are often more than 100% of the original cost... Others have asked about contributing to the Guatemalan work. If you desire to do this, simply send me the check and I will make sure that it is used in whatever area you designate. Elise and I are not in need; we are supported sufficiently by the College Church in Abilene."
