Election Takes Surprising Turn

The recent election of City Council positions took a surprising turn on April 9, when City Councilman, Charlie Long, resigned his position leaving an open position on the council.

According to the Handbook for Mayors and City Council members in General Law Cities, "the position was to be filled by a City Council appointee." The remaining City Councilmen appointed Ronnie Thacker to fill Long's remaining one year term.

Long stated, "The commanding reason I resigned was to keep Thacker in the positions she currently holds on the SPAG Boards and Urban Economic Development Boards--neither of which Thacker could be on unless she was an elected official. I believe it is so critical for the next six months for her to continue in these positions on SPAG due to the groundwork she has already

laid that no one else could fulfill with the expertise that she has gained through experience. One position in particular is important as she is the only Board member from the rural area. There was no pressure whatsoever for me to resign; I felt like it was in the best interests of Roaring Springs to do so. It was the most rational decision the council could come to and was decided by the whole council."

Thacker stated that there were two conditions she made to the City Council before she would accept the appointment left vacant by Long.

First: that Charlie Long would continue to consult with the City Council due to his valuable expertise and experience. Second: that the City Council in the future to attempt to work in a mode of unanimous rapport, this is to say, have a public consensus of the plans the City

Council proposes for the city.

Councilman Gene Brannon stated that he felt, "part of the reason Thacker was not elected was due more to not having our City Council seats designated appropriately as Position I, Position II, etc. This ended up by splitting the vote. That problem was remedied by assigning the position specific places. There had not been enough interest in the city council positions before and it wasn't a problem." Brannon asserted that "Thacker was appointed by the Council because she is vital to the community due to her position on the SPAG Board of Governors. We had no one capable of filling her position because she has the time, the knowledge and the ability to fulfill that position."

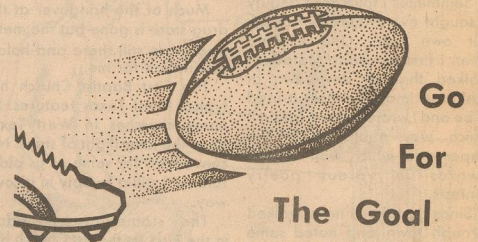
For Kent Hance Election Vote Republican

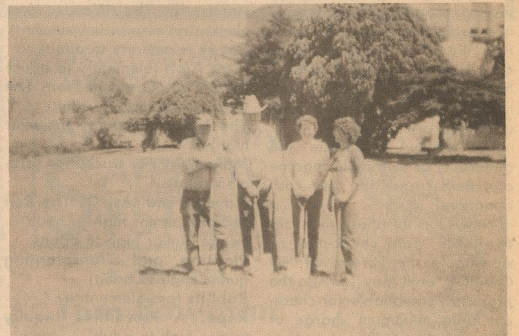

Boulter Urges Changes In Dairy Liquidation

WASHINGTON—Citing plummeting beef prices and general market confusion, Texas Congressman Beau Boulter (R-13) is requesting changes in the way the controversial dairy whole-herd buyout program is being administered. Boulter, who fought against dairy diversion during the farm bill debate last fall said, "this is bad ag policy to start with, but the USDA needs to administer it in a manner which won't ruin the beef industry."

Boulter is urging the Secretary of Agriculture to use several options which he has at his disposal to minimize the problems which this program is causing cattlemen. The main thing that the secretary can do is implement a more orderly

marketing period for the dairy cattle going to slaughter. Boulter said the current plan is "front-loaded" and that the marketings should be more evenly spaced throughout each of the three marketing periods.

Boulter emphasized that USDA is required by the Farm Bill to increase their purchases of red meat by 400 million pounds to offset the increased dairy cattle being slaughtered. Also, there is potential to export some of the dairy cows.

Congressman Boulter is meeting with representatives of the Texas Cattle Feeders Association in Washington this week, and will be working with the cattlemen to find a remedy for the situation.



Traffic Death Decline

AUSTIN—Traffic deaths in Texas declined by 5.9 percent in 1985 compared to 1984, according to DPS Director Colonel Jim Adams.

Adams said 3,682 persons died in traffic accidents across the state in 1985, compared to 3,913 deaths the year before. The 1985 death toll is the lowest since 1976, he said.

Another indicator of the level of traffic safety, the number of deaths per 100 million vehicle miles traveled, also has

continued to drop since 1981. Five years ago, the rate was 3.9 deaths per 100 million miles; in 1985, the rate was 2.6 deaths per 100 million miles, the lowest death ever recorded in Texas, Adams said.

"We are very pleased with this decline in deaths," Adams said. "The most significant thing is that despite Texas' rate of growth, the death toll in 1985 was more than 1,000 beneath Texas' all-time record traffic death count of 4,701 in 1981."

"I see two principal reasons for this saving of lives," Adams said. "When the safety belt law went into effect on September 1, 1985, we began noticing a monthly drop in fatalities."

"The four-month average decrease in front seat fatalities was 14 percent. Secondly, I think the continuing-and growing-emphasis on the dangers of drunken driving, coupled with strict enforcement of DWI laws by police agencies, has had a definite impact on the number of traffic deaths."

In 1985, the number of reported DWI-related traffic deaths in Texas dropped by 6 percent, with 989 fatalities compared to 1,049 deaths the year before, Adams said.

While overall the number of traffic deaths decreased, the number of motorcycle riders killed in accidents rose by one percent to 364, Adams said.

"Of those motorcyclists killed, 75 percent were not wearing protective headgear," the director continued.

Texas law provides that helmets be worn by motorcyclists younger than 18, but there is no requirement that older motorcyclists wear the lifesaving headgear.

"While we are delighted with the decline in traffic deaths, the reality is that 3,682 people died on Texas' streets and highways," Adams said. "We know we will never be completely free of traffic tragedy, but we will keep doing everything we can to insure that the death toll continues to drop."

Hire Farmers Higher Profits!

The Texas South Plains have been losing farmers at an alarming rate. The farm depression is caused by hail, drought, low cotton prices, high interest rates, expensive equipment, land prices, fuel, fertilizers, and insecticides, etc. None of the above mentioned problems can be controlled by the farmer. The farmer is not in control of his/her destiny. Rather, 1986 will squeeze the farmer even more than before and those who are at the breaking point will break-through bankruptcy, foreclosure or "voluntary" quitting.

The year 1987 is not predicted to be any better. What can be done to assist these farmers? Farmers who have lost their farms and life savings don't need pity or sympathy! They need jobs and right now. If you are thinking about hiring in your business - hire a displaced farmer. They are honest, hardworking people, who can get the job done, whatever the task.

DIVIDENDS FROM EXTENSION COTTON PEST MANAGEMENT PROGRAMS--Cotton pest management programs by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service have enjoyed numerous successes over the years. Major efforts, in cooperation with other agencies and cotton organizations, have included the High Plains diapause boll weevil control program, the uniform delayed planting program to reduce boll weevil damage in

the Rolling Plains, bollworm management strategies in the High Plains and Far West Texas, boll weevil management in the Rio Grande Valley, and an overall integrated pest management program in the Coastal Bend that has brought renewed interest in cotton production. These programs have meant billions of dollars to growers in reduced insecticide costs and increased yields.

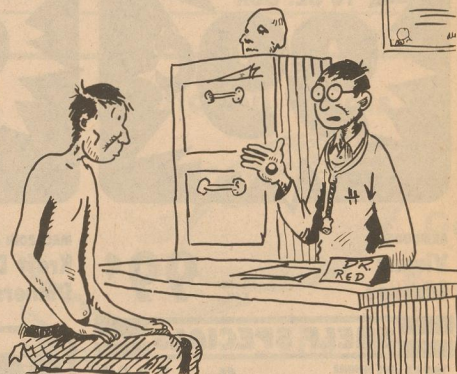


