Early Pioneer Rites Today

Final rites will be held at 2:30 p.m. today for Mrs. W. M. Graham, 83, Motley County pioneer who died about 7:00 p.m. Tuesday in Stanley Hospital. She had been in ill health for several years, and hospitalized since last October. Death was attributed to a heart attack.

Services will be held at the First Methodist Church with the pastor, Rev. Roy Patterson officiating, assisted by Rev. W. B. Vaughn, retired minister of the church. Burial will be in East Mound Cemetery, with Seigler Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

Mrs. Graham was born Carrie Lucretia Pike, at Argyle in Denton County, Texas, February 21, 1881. Her parents were early day pioneers of Runnels County, having settled near Ballinger in 1886. Her father, O. M. Pike was a captain in the Confederate Army of the Civil War.

She was married January 18, 1903 at Winters, Texas to W. M. Graham of Motley County, and came here as a bride to make her home on a ranch on Hornica Creek, 16 miles north of Matador, which Mr. Graham had acquired.

Mrs. Graham moved to Matador in September, 1915 to send her children to school, and had

Boyd R. Willett Named Manager Of Large Firm

A native son of Matador, Boyd R. Willett, has been named vice-president and general manager of Kalium Chemicals, Ltd. in the province of Saskatchewan, Canada. The \$40 million plant will produce potash through solution. Kalium is owned jointly by Pittsburgh Plate Glass Chemical Division and Armour and Company.

Boyd Willett is the son of Mrs. Harry Willett of Matador and the late pioneer merchant Harry Willett. He is a graduate of Matador High School. Boyd Willett was a former employee of the PPG Corpus Christi plant before being transferred to Canada.

There are very large deep potash deposits in the area between Regina and Moose Jaw, Canada, too deep for mining by conventional means which are not practical for depths beyond 3500 feet. These deposits are more than 5000 feet below the earth's surface.

With the solution mining technique water will be pumped through pipes into an underground strata to dissolve potash. The resulting solution is then piped to the potash refining plant, at ground level, now being built.

The process is like that used by Pittsburgh Plate Glass to mine salt from an enormous underground dome in Duval County. Principal use of potash is for fertilizer.

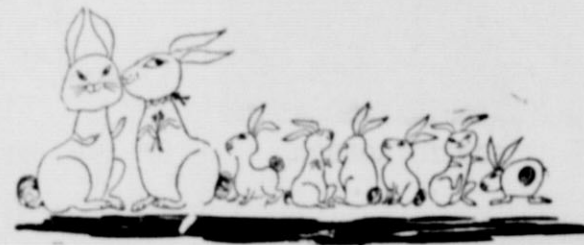

South Texas Newspaper Editor Started Career Here on Tribune

The following article is from a recent issue of the Houston Post and regards former resident Burrell Tipton, son of Mrs. A. A. Tipton and sister of Mrs. Douglas Meador. He started in the printing trade on the Matador Tribune while attending high school here. He was a graduate of the Class of 1936. For eight years previous to his entry in the Marine Corps he performed the Tribune's mechanical work. He returned after four years in the service during World War II and was employed for two years before going to Sweetwater.

Pictures of his plant which appeared in the Houston Post, are not available. The feature is one of a series on weekly newspapers which the Post is publishing.

DAYTON — Burrell Tipton came to Dayton 10 years ago with \$1,200 in government bonds and an ambition to become a newspaper publisher.

The Dayton News, a weekly publication, side lining in commercial printing, is the product of that combination of big desires and scant assets.

TIPTON, a master printer who had worked for several newspapers, recalled:

"I was dissatisfied and had always been looking for a place of my own."

Dayton showed promise of potential growth and looked like a good place for someone who wanted to work," he said of this mid-Liberty County city, surrounded by rice fields.

And work, he did, through heartbreaking setbacks and heartwarming successes until he achieved the present plant, dedicated to typographical excellence and informative writing.

When the Dayton News came into being, there had been no newspaper published in the city for more than 20 years.

TIPTON QUIT his job as a printer in Liberty to begin his publishing venture.

"It was either sink or swim," he said.

The last newspaper to be published in Dayton before the News was known as the Dayton Daytonite.

It was published from 1912 to 1930 by Walter S. Neel, the first mayor of Dayton. Neel moved the publication to Hull-Daisetta in 1930.

Tipton opened the Dayton News with little more than rented office space. He and his wife, Mrs. Jessie Mae Tipton, gathered the news and sold advertising space, then went to Kountze to set the type and print the paper, using the equipment of the Kountze News.

CHANGES ARE MADE IN FEED GRAIN PROGRAM

A recent change in the payment rate on qualified diverted acres from feed grains could result in Motley County farmers re-evaluating portions of the program for 1964. These changes affect the diverted acres that are planted to certain oilseed crops. These oilseed crops are sesame, guar and castor beans.

Under the new changes, a producer who diverts 40% or more of his base acreage (up to 50%) from feed grain production is eligible to receive 1/2 of his normal payment rate. This replaces the 1/2 minimum payment rate called for under the old rules.

For example, let's assume a normal payment rate of \$11 per acre for diverted acreage. If the producer should elect to plant castor beans, guar or sesame on this acreage (and this acreage is 40% or more of his feed grain base), he could collect 1/2 the normal payment rate, or \$5.50 per acre. The same producer was only eligible for \$2.50 per acre — which was 1/2 of the minimum payment rate — under the old rules.

The other provisions, to date, have not been changed. A producer could still get up to 1/2 his eligible payment at the time he signs up in the County ASCS office. Those producers already signed up to participate in the 1964 Feed Grains Program and who had planned to plant sesame, guar or castor beans on at least 40% of their diverted acres, may be able to collect additional diverted acreage payments.

Additional details regarding this change can be obtained from the local ASCS office or the County Agent.

The trend of late is to encourage boys and girls to follow fields of study other than agriculture and home economics when they go to college, but many may be overlooking a good career in these fields. The first rule is "to study something you like," for this is a key to happiness in your work. Salary is also an important factor, but in any field, there is a top salary for the best workers.

For those interested in agriculture, don't forget that we must always have food, clothing and shelter. Agriculture has become more scientific, and many of the jobs are in the city. Some of these agri-business jobs are concerned with industrial processing, marketing, transportation and financing agricultural products.

It is to be remembered also that the farmer or rancher buys about everything except their land and labor. Seed, fertilizer, chemicals, insecticides, fuel, equipment, medicine and all types of services are included in fields of employment relative to agriculture.

Research, management, salesmanship and finance offer many fields of employment to the graduate, and in many cases

qualified applicants are not available to fill all the positions. Agriculture is largely responsible for the United States holding its position in the world today, so if this field is of your preference, why not look into the many courses of study open to high school graduates.

Sixty-nine Motley County 4-H girls have indicated they would like to work with Foods & Nutrition, but unless enough local leaders and parents are secured to work with this group, the program can't be started. This is a program that must be supervised, and for the purpose of training people to work with this program, a meeting will be held in the courthouse in Matador on Tuesday, March 31st, starting at 9:30 a.m. Miss Frances Reasonover, Extension Foods & Nutrition Specialist will provide the training. The program consists of more than cooking, and will cover all

phases of nutrition to include Favorite Foods Show in county, if this is the desire of the leaders. Letters have been mailed to leaders and parents of girls who have indicated interest in this program, but one is welcome that will work with the program.

Motley County ginners reported that 17,035 bales were needed for the 1963 crop. The indicated yield is 273 lbs. per acre, or above an average of 250 lbs. per acre. Final figures will not be available until adjustments are made for ginnings in counties other than that of production. Losses were heavy, and in the of the county moisture was short.

Now is the time for each farmer to review his 1963 crop making notes to repeat the practices that paid off in 1963 and eliminate or improve the practices that were not profitable.

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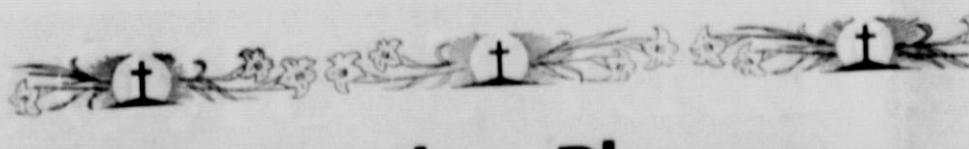
