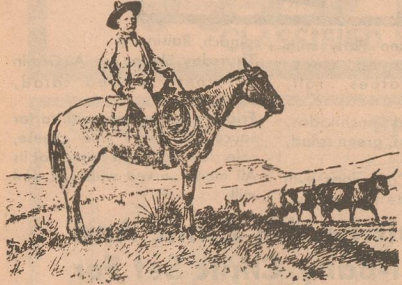

Class Of '65 Celebrates Reunion



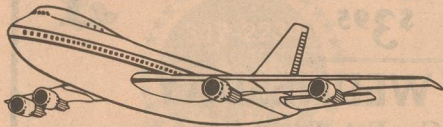

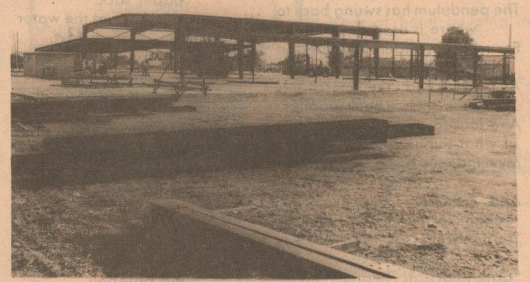
Tour of Alaska Made Recently By Mr. and Mrs. France Barton
A tour of Alaska with special farm visits was made recently by Mr. and Mrs. France Barton. The 11-day tour from August 2 to 13 was by air to Anchorage, via Lubbock, Dallas and Seattle. From Anchorage, tours were made by motorcoach to various localities and three cruises were enjoyed. The second morning in Alaska the tour group was taken through the Matanuska Valley, and a dinner with a farm family. They were informed that two thirds of Alaska's cultivated land lies in this area. They spent the

night at Valdez, and the next day were taken by motor yacht for a view of the Columbia Glacier, cruising along the six-mile-long 300-foot high face of the glacier. Continuing through Prince William Sound to Whittier, the docking point, the tour continued by train to Portage, where the motor coach returned them to Anchorage. The next day the tour left for Denali National Park (formerly Mt. McKinley National Park), said to be the world's greatest wilderness preserve. It is located between Anchorage and Fairbanks, and the biggest attraction of the park is claimed

to be Mt. McKinley. After sightseeing Fairbanks the motorcoach continued over the Alaska Highway to Tok for the night, and continued the next day over the "Top of the World" Highway at Dawson City. The next stop was Whitehorse, then Skagway, and the final stop, Juneau, where they visited Mendenhall Glacier during a cruise of Lynn Canal. A third cruise on the trip had been made out of Fairbanks, aboard a paddlewheel steamer on the Chena and Tanana rivers. The tour also included shows and other entertainments along the way.

Motley County Commissioner Found Guilty In Calf Theft

The trial of Billy Hand, Motley County Commissioner for Roaring Springs, was held this past week at the Motley County Courthouse.

After about a day and a half of trial and testimonies, the jurors went behind closed doors to tackle the task of the decision of guilty or not guilty.

Due to this reporter's temporary physical condition, a courtroom detailed report was not made.

However, Wednesday evening, August 28th, on a cooler than usual summer night, cars were lining the streets surrounding the county courthouse. Groups of men gathered around their pickups doing their own deliberation.

The jurors could be seen in their lighted room on the second floor from the dark street below. Hands being raised and lowered, men pacing and cigarettes being lit were all indications of the jurors struggle to come to a fair decision.

At approximately 11:30 p.m., that Wednesday night, the jurors stood up in their room and exited to the courtroom only to report that they had a 9-3 vote and then they returned to the same room for the same discussions.

It was said by one courtroom spectator that the jury had requested a dictionary but were denied it due to law. However, they were allowed to write the word or words on paper and request a definition through the bailiff which was done.

Then again at 11:45 p.m. the group of jurors returned to the solemn courtroom and a decision was made to recess until 10:00 a.m. the following morning, Thursday.

After the courtroom emptied and the lights were out, the defendant, Billy Hand, with his ever supporting wife at his side, and his lawyer exited the courthouse. They stood outside a few moments and had some private words and then went their separate ways, wondering what the morning would bring.

At approximately 3:30 p.m. Thursday afternoon, after another tormenting day for all parties concerned, a guilty decision was made by the chosen jurors.

Punishment was set as a two year probated sentence. According to Motley County Judge Billy Joe Whitaker, this means the defendant loses certain citizenship rights such as voting and running for public office.

The following is the report of the trial according to Sunday's Lubbock Avalanche Journal:

"Motley County Commissioner Billy Hand resigned from office after being found guilty here Thursday of stealing a calf - a felony - near Roaring Springs last April, the Motley County district attorney said.

Hand was assessed a two-year probated sentence following the trial which began Tuesday, said district attorney, Randy Hollums, who prosecuted the theft case.

Prior to sentencing, Hand told the court that he had submitted his resignation to county commissioners, said Hollums.

The jury deliberated for more than 10 hours before finding Hand guilty of stealing a calf from the Matador Land and Cattle Co. on April 25, said Hollums.

The former commissioner showed little emotion as the verdict was read, Hollums added.

Hand took the witness stand in his own defense, telling the jury that the calf he had taken was injured.

He admitted, however, that he did not have permission to take the animal, which later was shot and then butchered in Roaring Springs.

Testimony at the trial revealed that Hand had asked the individuals butchering the animal to give him the ears and brand from the calf, said Hollums.

Hand, 63, of Roaring Springs, had served as a commissioner for about three years."

As for filling Hand's position as commissioner, the county Judge will make the appointment on the recommendation of the other commissioners.

Fall Peanut Tour To Be Tuesday

The annual Fall Peanut Tour will be held Tuesday, September 10th at 9:00 a.m. It will start at the Joe Edd Helms farm 6 miles north of Flomot. Some stops on the tour this year will include a look at web blotch disease, some new peanut varieties, and leaf spot control. In addition to these, a Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) irrigation system will be shown and irrigation well efficiency testing by the SCS, Leon New the Extension Irrigation Specialist, and Pioneer

Natural Gas Company Technicians. After the tour, a luncheon sponsored by Elanso will take place in Quitaque. Other Extension Service Specialist scheduled to attend this year's tour include Chip Lee, Extension Plant Pathologist and Leland Tripp, Extension Agronomist for peanuts and other oil seed crops. If you farm peanuts or use irrigation, you should make plans to attend.

Matadors To Open Season Here Friday Against Paducah

Although Motley County lost their scrimmage game with Claude last week, the coaching staff found many reasons to be optimistic about the upcoming season. First of all, the offense moved the football very consistently against a veteran Mustang defense with a very balanced attack. The Matadors gained 155 yards rushing and 175 yards passing for a total of 330 yards. Richard Potts did an outstanding job in directing the Matadors' option ground attack, which averaged five yards per carry. He also made the most of his pass attempts, completing three out of six for 175 yards and one touchdown. The touchdown came on a 45 yard pass play from Potts to Brandy Bearden, who was tackled as he approached the goal line. The football bounced into the endzone where freshman Brent Marshall alertly fell on it for the Matador touchdown. An even more impressive statistic for the Motley County offense was the lack of a single turnover to the Claude defensive unit, especially since this was the first outing in the new veer option attack. The offensive line also turned in a solid performance against the veteran Claude defense. Freshman tackles David Stafford and Tim Kendall repeatedly opened large holes off tackle with the help of sophomore tight end Brandon Eddleman, Paul Block, Darryl Perryman and Les Woolsey did a good job in pounding the middle of the Mustangs 43 defense. Running backs Cody Christian, Brandt Bearden and Rodney Doran also had a good day ripping off several five and ten

yard bursts. However, the coaching staff feels the offense has much room for improvement. "The offensive line is getting better everyday, especially as our young lineman gain more experience and maturity. The offensive backs are also improving daily at running the option attack. But we must keep working to get better. Nobody stays the same. You either get better or worse. Obviously, we want to get better," commented Hollenback.

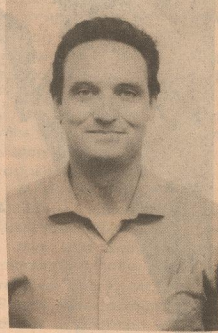
Defensively, the Matadors must become more consistent in stopping the big play. Senior tight end Mark Hall (6'6", 215 lbs.) lived up to his billing as one of the states top receivers hauling in several passes, including two for touchdowns. With the exception of Hall, Motley County did a fairly good job of containing the Claude offense. Mickey Zarate led the Matador defense with seven unassisted tackles. Richard Potts and Cody Christian came in a close second with five solo tackles a piece. The Motley County defense also forced two turnovers from the Mustang offense, with Paul Block

recovering a fumble and Cody Christian intercepting a pass attempt. However, the coaching staff stresses that the defense must do a much better job of tackling and playing pass defense.

The Matadors came out of their scrimmage against Claude with no injuries. This is very good news as the team begins preparations this week for the opening game of the season this Friday night against the Paducah Dragons.

Paducah will be lead offensively by junior quarterback Stan Burns (6'3", 180 lbs.) and junior tight end Billy Hutchinson (6'3", 185 lbs.) The offensive line is anchored by sophomore tackle Will Flemons (6'6", 232 lbs.). The Paducah offense features sprint out passing, fullback sweeps, and option football. Defensively, the Dragons will normally line up in a wide tackle six. Although they do boast of good speed and quickness in their skill positions, they too, have many players going both ways. Conditioning could be a very big factor Friday evening as Motley County opens the 1985 season at home.

With 3,600 miles showing on the speedometer of the pickups and two and a half days of steady driving (each way) they reached Manitoba and then Matador.

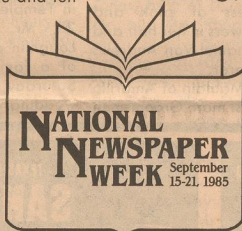
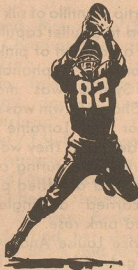

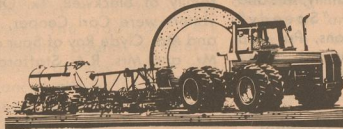

The new rates will be placed into effect on October 1, 1985 or as soon thereafter as permitted by law.

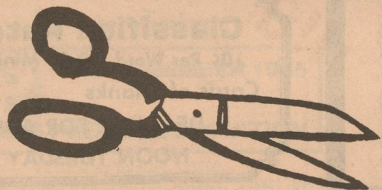
The classes and number of Cooperative customers affected are as follows:
