## Barbara B. Jameson Purchases Tribune

Announcement was made this week by Patsy Tippin, publisher of the Matador Tribune for the past ten months, that she has sold the business to Barbara B. Jameson, a lifetime Motley County resident.

The transaction became effective February 1, 1985, making this the first issue by the new owner. However, Mrs. Tippin will continue to work with the new owner throughout February.

In addition, Pipkin Ins. has purchased the Matador Tribune building. On March 1st, Barbara

will move the newspaper office to the building formerly known as The Dugout on Highway 70 E.

Pipkin Insurance will move into the former newspaper building in March.

Editor Jameson has big plans as the new owner which initially included changing the name of the publication to the Motley County Tribune.

This paper is a successor to newspapers dating back to 1891 when Clarence Nugent established the first publication in Motley County.

The publication changed hands, and also name and masthead many times since that time. The first newspaper was called Motley County News. With succeeding publishers it became the Matador Maverick, Motley County Journal, Texas Maverick, Matador Messenger, The Matador Gusher, and again, the Motley County News.

The late Douglas Meador renamed the publication Matador Tribune when he acquired the business in 1933. For many years, his ownership statement included the motto, "There is glory enough for any man to live and die a Texan." Also for many years the masthead has born this motto, "Voice of the Foothill Country" which Jameson has re-adapted.

Meador died September 27, 1974, after publishing the Tribune for 42 years. After his death, his wife continued as publisher for three years. She sold the business in 1977 to Roy Friedman, who then sold to Leon Watson and then to Patsy Tippin.

As the new publisher/editor, Barbara encourages your continued support of the newspaper. In addition, your suggestions and constructive criticism as how our local paper can better serve you will be appreciated.

Patsy sold the Tribune so she and her three children could join their husband and father, Roy, who accepted a position January 1, 1986, in Andrews, Texas.

## Barbara's Brief

This paper is being started with love. I have no experience in being an editor (for which I ask your patience, please) but I do love Motley County and what it has been and what it can become. I was raised in Motley County on the Bird Ranch and in Matador and I plan to stay 'til the end! I have put down roots.

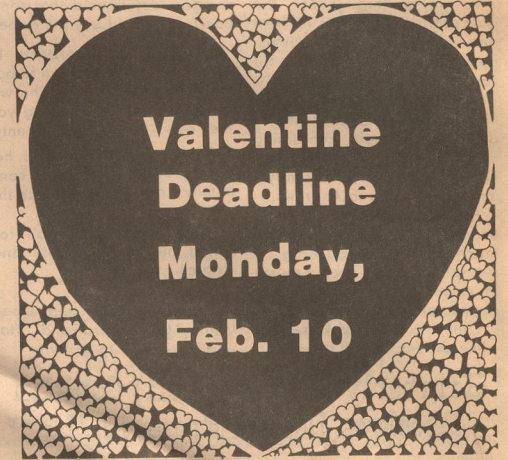

## MATADOR GARDEN CLUB PROGRAM OUTLINES TEXAS TROPICAL TRAIL

Matador Garden Club met January 20 at the home of Mrs. Ted Elliott, president, with Mrs. J.D. Craven as leader of the continuing Texas Trails programs.

In a business session, discussion centered on planting a tree at the Pioneer Memorial Park as an Arbor Day project. For roll call, each member brought an old school picture or memento to show and reminisce.

The program, "Ride the Texas Tropical Trail," was given by Mrs. W.N. Pipkin.

The Tropical Trail offers diversified interests from prickly-pear cactus, to ranchland, agriculture, coastal marshes, palm-fringed tropics and seaside playgrounds, not to mention several wildlife refuges.

The program, "Ride the Texas Tropical Trail," was given by Mrs. W.N. Pipkin. Charted through the state's southernmost wedge, this trail's starting point is the city of Corpus Christi in Nueces County, major metropolitan area on the route, the Texas' largest coastal city.

"Corpus Christi bills itself 'The Sparkling City by the Sea,'" Mrs. Pipkin related. "Its historical roots go back to 1519 when Spanish maritime explorer Alonzo Alvarez de Pineda discovered Corpus Christi Bay.

Today, the city is a deep-water port, industrial center, agricultural hub, and one of Texas' most popular seaside playgrounds. In addition, the city also offers access to Padre Island National Seashore, one of the Trail's premier attractions.

(Access to this northern end of Padre Island is via John F. Kennedy Causeway. The Tropical Trail again approaches Padre Island at its other end, 110 miles south.)

"On the trail route south of Corpus Christi, en route to Kingsville in Kleberg County, Chapman Ranch is interesting from a historical perspective, Mrs. Pipkin narrated. "As one of the world's first entirely mechanized ranches, some 200 tractors were in use by 1920. Between Chapman Ranch and

Bishop the Trail spans both crop and pasturelands. Frequent cotton gins are reminders that cotton, if no longer absolute king, is still a major cash crop."

The Trail's 73-mile span between Kingsville and Raymondville in Willacy County, is through a sparsely populated area devoted almost entirely to lands of the King Ranch and other huge cattle spreads. "As the route approaches Raymondville, a transformation begins, from native brushland to intensive, subtropical agriculture," Mrs. Pipkin's description continued.

At Raymondville, "Gateway to the Lower Rio Grande Valley," the scenery becomes eminently tropical with citrus groves and tall palms lining the highway. "Known as 'the Valley' for short, four Texas counties comprise the region that's about 50 miles deep and some hundred miles wide. Geographically, it is the most individually distinctive area of Texas," Mrs. Pipkin quoted from a State Department of Highways brochure.

In her talk, Mrs. Pipkin described the Santa Ana National Wildlife Refuge located between Weslaco and Hidalgo, where naturalists and birders from throughout the nation journey to view birds and animals seldom seen anywhere else in the United States. Among more than 300 bird species are found here, while the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge in the winter home of the most famous birds in the world, majestic whooping cranes.

"The flock of less than 100 whoopers in northern Canadian marshes in spring and summer, then migrates 2600 miles to this single spot for a leisurely winter season in the Texas subtropics," Mrs. Pipkin explained.

A report from the "Lone Star Gardner" by the leader concluded the program.

Mrs. Elliott served refreshments of cranberry bread, nut loaf, cookies and brownies with hot punch and coffee to Mrs. Paul Gray, Mrs. Artie Wason, Mrs. Craven and Mrs. Pipkin.

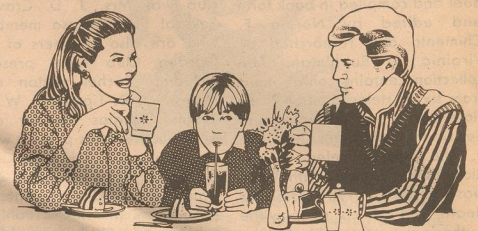

# County Agent's Corner

## Warm Weather May Cause Problem

Reports have come into the Extension Office that some sand shinnery oak has been budding and causing oak poisoning of cattle. You should check your shinnery infested pastures to see if you might have a problem.

Also some ungrazed wheat in the area is growing past the stage it should be at, at this time of year. Some has been seen in the jointing stage. This wheat may be freeze damaged if and when we have some hard freezing temperatures.

Other untimely occurrences that have been noticed are:

blooming fruit trees, growth of spring bulb plants, flowering of landscape plants, trees budding, warm season grass growing, animals shedding hair and people getting spring fever way too early. All of these will be adversely affected when we do return to winter.

Some good points have also been noticed, harmful insects that come out may be frozen, cool season weeds and weedy grasses can be treated in lawns effectively, cattle have wintered better so far and your old coat may last another year.

Rattlesnakes have been seen out, so watch your step.

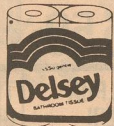

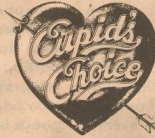

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
