## FmHA Reports Reveal Credibility Gap

If any farmer has not received living expenses on their FmHA-loan, it their loan has not been processed within the 60 day limit and if the loan was approved but no money has been received within 15 days, the farmer encouraged to contact Do Richards of lo co at 76 214
FmHA's public information director for the budge contacted by telephone on Friday, May 2 for comment on mHA funding. O'Neil stated that the FmHA initially had $\$ 700$ million operating fund. This budget was intended to meet mHA's needs for the 50 states. He stated that they have been doling out the money to the states on a daily basis which is based on need. As of May 2, \$2 million was sent to Texas which brought the total money received to $\$ 195,851,000$. The original allocation was \$118.3 million. O'Neil reiterated tha FmHA in Washington is giving
the money out carefully
lepending on the FmHA office i Temple's request for money. FmHA in Temple at this point in time still has $\$ 11$ million which they have requested but no received. Bob Hopper, Farm Director for the state FmHA
office in Temple stated that $\$ 78$ million added allocation to th million added allocation to the exas office from the office in that the FmHA "can't actually approve a loan when there is no money available." At presen there are more loans ready to be approved than there is money available.
Agri-Aide adamantly believes that all over the state of Texas farmers have still not received the money for approved loans. They are in the process now of abulating totals for farmers who have not received their loa money at present
If Agri-Aide's initial poll is correct and farmers are not loans, there is a discrepancy with loans, there is a discrepancy with FmHA's position. If Texas ha eceived nearly $\$ 196$ million, ye widespread loan incompletio question is where did the money go? According to each entity contacted, Washington has sent more money to Texas than initially allocated ( $\$ 78$ million) Temple states that they are making the money available to local FmHA offices as soon as they get it, yet Agri-Aide asserts hat the farmers are not getting the money consistently.
While FmHA has received a great deal of heat in the last few months on their loan administration, it must be remembered that other loaning instiulions have contribuled ro he problem by shurling some of FmHA questionable loans on problem of more approvable problem of more approvable them due to Reagan budget cuts. This is not a simple problem and there are no simple answers.
