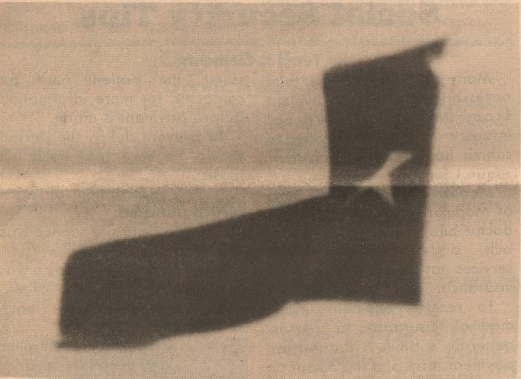
Dena is sponsored by the Motley County Farm Bureau and Jade is sponsored by the Matador Lions Club.

Routine Business at Commissioners Court

Commissioners' Court was held on June 9 by County Judge, Billy Joe Whitaker, County Commissioners Bill D. Washington, Joseph Simpson, Fraiser Watson, John M. Russell and County Clerk, Lucretia Campbell.

The minutes were read and approved. Earlyne Jameson, Library Board member, gave the Library Report. The Library Board has voted to start a building fund which has been set up at the Summit Savings Assn. Various lots for possible building sites, possibility were discussed.

The bills were read and approved. For general county expenses were \$2550.41; Precinct 1 had \$8365.75 in expenses with a large expenditure going for a tractor purchase; Precinct 2 had \$541.75 in expenses; Precinct 3 had \$2456.90 and Precinct 4 had \$686.65 in expenses.

It was noted that interest on an investment account will help balance the county budget.

The Texas Veterans Commission sent the Motley County

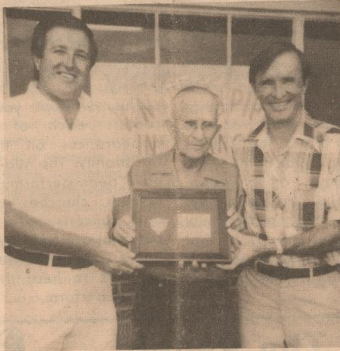
Treasurer's office the 1985 statistics on Veterans benefits. Motley County Veteran's compensation and pension came to \$285,035; readjustment and Vocational Rehab garnered \$4769; Insurance and Indemnities brought \$12,268 with a total income \$303,072.

Total fines this month came to \$4558.

Kay Howard of Gary Trailer and Associates (who is an architect and engineering firm) met with the Commissioners to determine their desire to apply for a grant to make the courthouse assessable to the handicapped, as prescribed by Texas law. Howard explained the point system for grant application to the commissioners. The Commissioners made a resolution to apply for grant funds without including a provision for matching funds from the county.

Erwin Merriot of Kaiser Chemicals met with Commissioners' Court to discuss a new product to preserve roads.

Plane Crash Ends Lives Of Businessman and Wife

On Tuesday, June 3, 1986 a single engine plane plummeted out of rainy skies east of Sperry, Okla., killing Bob and Mary Crump and their pilot, all of Topeka, Kan. Bob was the son of Naoma Mitchell Grasmick, formerly of Matador. His maternal grandparents, Ruby and Grover C. Mitchell, were owners and publishers of the

Motley County News in Matador in the 1920's and 30's. Bob was distributes petroleum products to convenience stores and owns a chain of Quality Mart stores in Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa and Missouri.

The couple had flown to Tulsa to see their youngest son graduate from High School.

Surviving them are four sons, Jon, Randy, Kevin and Bobby, and two grandchildren.

The crash occurred approximately 15 minutes after take-off and speculations pointed to weather conditions as the cause of accident. The impact drove the plane's engine and cabin 8 to 10 feet into the rain-soaked ground.

The family has requested memorials be made to the American Cancer Society, the nephew of Mrs. Howard Traeweek.

Crump was past president of Penco Oil Co. in Tulsa. He was the current owner and president of Quality Oil Co. in Topeka, Kansas and well-known for his expertise in petroleum marketing. Quality Oil

The food and clothes and some special things maybe they didn't need but she just couldn't leave them behind. That must have been a big job but she had to get it done.

They got to San Angelo and ran a wood yard for a while. Did pretty good until Grandad heard about some land in New Mexico that he could homestead. So they loaded up the wagons and headed out. Their homestead land was close to Fort Sumner but it didn't turn out as they had hoped. The older boys got jobs on a big ranch to try and help make things easier but

Social Security Tips

Many people wait longer than necessary to receive payment from Medicare medical insurance because they failed to submit itemized bills with their request for payment form.

Medical insurance is the part of Medicare that helps pay for doctor bills, out-patient hospital bills, and other items and services not covered by hospital insurance.

To receive payment under medical insurance, a person generally submits a request for payment form and the doctor or supplier provides an itemized bill to send with the form. The bill does not have to be paid before it can be submitted.

The trouble is that often the bill does not provide a detailed description of the services provided and, therefore, a decision cannot be made as to whether they are covered. As a

result, the patient must be contacted for more information before payment is made.

To prevent delay, the person should be sure that each bill shows:

- * A description of each service provided;
- * The date the service was provided;
- * The place the service was provided;
- * The charge for each service;
- * The doctor or supplier who provided each service, and;
- * The person's name and health insurance claim number, exactly as they appear on the Medicare card.

It is helpful if the diagnosis is also shown.

The Rev. and Mrs. Eddie Marcum attended the Northwest Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church meeting Monday night through Thursday at the Polk Street United Methodist Church in Amarillo. The conference is comprised of seven districts, Abilene, Amarillo, Big Spring, Lubbock, Pampa, Plainview and Seymour. Highlights of the annual conference were the announcements and the ordination of elders and deacons.

Dr. Myar Jones, president and dean of Gamma Theological Seminary in Atlanta, Ga. was the conference speaker. The opening session of the conference began at 7:30 p.m. Monday with Bishop Louis W. Schowengerdt of Albuquerque presiding.

Reports from various committees, the acceptance of appointments and the commission of laity were among Tuesday events. The Funding

Priorities Committee received the composite reports from each district and there was a desire not to start a major funding program or employ a Coordinator of Financing and Planning Priorities, but move ahead in church ministry. Three major concerns adopted in the reports: completing the pension fund campaign, upgrading two camp sites and revitalizing local churches and building new ones where needed.

A resolution opposing the disposal of nuclear waste in the Texas Panhandle was passed unanimously by members of the Northwest Texas Conference. Delegates also passed a resolution opposing the removal of the hymns, "Onward Christian Soldiers" and "The Battle Hymn of the Republic" from the Methodist hymnal which is undergoing revision. The Hymnal Revision Committee was cautioned in the rewording of hymns.

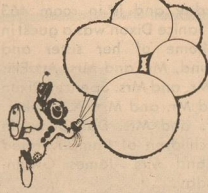
Cheese To Be Given Away

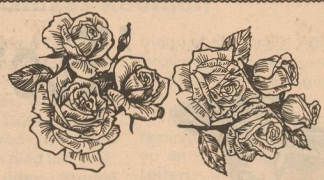
Flomat residents are to pick up their commodities at the Flomat Community Center on Wednesday,

Luncheon Concludes Activities For Matador Garden Club's Year



FLOWER ARRANGEMENTS on display by members of Matador Garden Club, May 3 featured western and environmental themes. Shown are just a few of the arrangements, with accessories depicting barbed wire, cactus and mesquite, canyons, cattle, cotton, dugout, oil field, rodeo, vegetables, wheat, wind and windmills. One strand of barbed wire on display had been dug up on the M.L. Patton land years ago, and believed to be a type used in the late 1800's. Gilded boots shown at right hand of picture, belonged to the late Gus Bird.

A flower arrangement show on May 3 at the Summit Savings Community room, and a covered dish luncheon on May 19 at the home of Mrs. W.N. Pipkin brought to a close the year's activities for Matador Garden Club.

Business at the luncheon included a report on the flower display, which was open to the public and was well attended. Mrs. Ted Elliott, president, opened the meeting and Mrs. Alvin Stearns was program leader. A display of exquisite handwork of lace, and embroidery, and a quilt was shown for roll call.

The program, "Texas Mountain Trail" was given by Mrs. Robert Dickson and concluded the year's theme of "Beauty Along Texas Highways," with emphasis on the ten regional trails designated by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

"The Mountain Trail route circles through the tallest region in the state," Mrs. Dickson told the club. "There are 90 peaks more than one mile high. The trail visits secluded canyons, unspoiled parks and weathered sites of living history and leads through wide-open spaces."

The trail begins in El Paso, or El Paso Del Norte, 'The Pass of the North,' with the Franklin Mountains, the beginning of the Rocky Mountains range that extends 3,000 miles to Alaska; past Ft. Bliss (which is larger than the state of Rhode Island), and to Guadalupe Mt. National Park, and on to Fort Davis.

The Indian Lodge in the Davis Mt. State Park - built by CCC boys during the depression, historic Fort Davis, Sul Ross

College at Alpine, "thorny, sun-baked desert and awesome, shadowy canyons and forested highlands of Big Bend National Park; Terlingua's chili cook-off which was begun in 1967, and the silver mining industry at Shafter were but a few of the sites on the trail which Mrs. Dickson described in vivid word pictures.

She concluded with observations on Fort Davis: "As impressive as the structures, ruins and museums are, another element is often most vivid for Fort Davis visitors. It is an elaborate sound re-creation of a military retreat parade, complete with the sounds of a mounted review and music from manuals of 1875. Echoing over the empty parade ground, the ceremony sets a mood that transports one to the previous century, evoking a personal experience in vivid history.

Closing the program was the yearbook quotation which Mrs. Stearns read: "I question not if thrushes sing, if roses load the air; Beyond my heart I need not reach, when all is summer there."

Luncheon table favors were miniature baskets containing small bottles of perfume, provided by Mrs. Edgar Lee and Mrs. Pipkin. Other favors were leaflets describing the flags of Texas, brought by Mrs. Lee, and "weather forecasters," made by Mrs. Dickson.

In addition to these ladies and Mmes. Elliott and Stearns, other members present were Mesdames Gus Bird, J.D. Craven, Robert Darsey, W.D. Lipscomb, Douglas Meador and W.B. Wason, and Rachel Patton.

Motley County Farmers Invited To Run For County Committee

Eligible Farmers in Motley County are invited to become nominees for the Farmers Home Administration county committee, FmHA County Supervisor Larry Clements announced today.

As a result of the 1985 farm bill, two of the three members of FmHA county committees must be elected. The third member is appointed by FmHA. The Motley County committee assists the FmHA county office in reviewing applications for FmHA farm loans and on other farm credit matters.

Generally, farmers who are residents of the county but not FmHA borrowers are eligible to become nominees for the FmHA county committee.

"Farmers in this county,

serving on the committee, can play an important role by assisting in the process of loan applications and reviews."

For this first election only, two members will be elected at the same time. One will serve a one year term of office and the other will serve two years.

In the future, all terms of service will be for three years each on a staggered basis.

Nominating petitions must be returned to the FmHA Dickens County office by June 16, 1986.

County Agent's Corner

The larvae of the first generation of the pecan nut casebearer can cause heavy damage to the pecan crop. Their damage is expected to be very heavy this year because populations are much larger than in most years.

In Motley County control measures should be applied from now to June 20. To determine the best time to treat an orchard, inspect at least 200 nutlet clusters. When eggs are found, they should be tagged on an inspected daily until they hatch. When 1 to 2 percent of the nutlet clusters are damaged by small casebearer larvae, insecticidal application should be made that day.

The pecan nut casebearer larvae should be killed before they enter the nutlets. Once inside, the larvae are protected. After destroying a nutlet, the larva progressively destroys the remaining nutlets in the cluster.

A second insecticidal application may be needed when eggs are found and nutlet damage continues 7 to 10 days after the first application.

Casebearer eggs are about

the size of a pin head. They are greenish white when first deposited and become reddish before hatching. The eggs hatch in 4 to 5 days and larvae migrate to the buds below the nutlets where they feed for 1 to 2 days before entering the nutlets. The eggs are deposited in the dark tip of the nutlets or just below the dark tip at the base of one of the bracts.

Homeowners might use Zolone, Malathion, or Sevin for control of pecan nut casebearers. In the commercial orchard Zolone, Sevin, Imidan, Guthion, Pydrin or Cymbush might be used. To decrease zinc rosette problems and produce higher quality nuts, zinc sulfate or NZN might be added to the spray solution. When using these insecticides or nutrients be sure to follow the directions given on the label.

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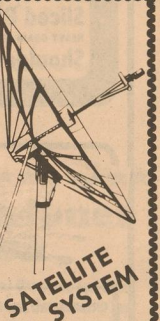
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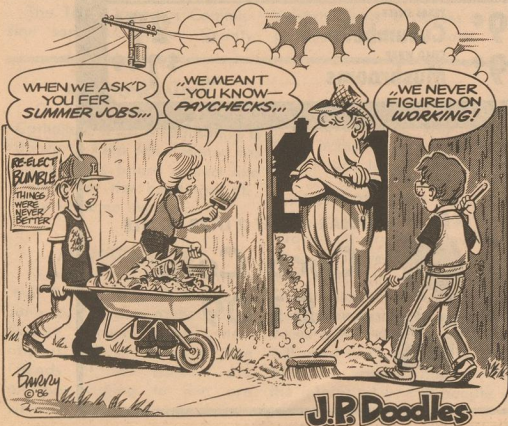
