regarding the use of ACR acreage, farmers must notify their respective ASCS offices of the intended use and who will be using that forage. If

the farmer must certify that he will not receive any payment for it. As with any decisions which might
potentially impact on farm program eligiblity, farmers are strongly urged to check with their local ASCS
