Memorial Day will be observed May 28th Remembering those who sacrificed

Each year, on Memorial Day we stop to remember all Americans who have served our nation and made the ultimate sacrifice in defense of liberty. We owe each of those men and women a debt that can never be repaid.

Those fallen heroes saw a dark cloud threatening our country, and each answered the call of duty. Each gave up a life of promise and hope so that others would continue to live in freedom. Their courage and sacrifice should never be forgot-

The root values behind Memorial Day run deep in Texas.

tiersmen and pioneers willing to risk everything to throw off tyranny. Hundreds died in the struggle, and their names are honored still.

Texans have always stepped forward when duty calls. Today, the world knows that "Texas defends America." One in ten American military personnel call Texas home. We value service, and we appreciate those who sacrifice, so selflessly, for

Again this year, our nation is at war as Memorial Day approaches. Like many of our national conflicts, the war on terror is controversial, and has its domestic critics. These critics are exercising their right to dissent, and to free speech, that have been safeguarded by the sacrifices of generations of pa-

Our state was founded by fron- speech, noted history's preference for those who pursue a noble goal, in spite of critical opposition. He said that those who make a difference are not the negative voices from the sidelines, but instead are the ones who place themselves on the

> "The credit belongs to the man who ... at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who know neither victory nor defeat," Roosevelt said.

Most Texans I've met - regardless of their opinion on our involvement in the Middle East - do not count themselves among the critics. Instead, they properly support our military, those on the front lines, and honor the sacrifices they have

The recognition is seen in countless ways, as notable as the yellow ribbon magnet on the back bumper or trunk of so many cars and trucks on Texas roads. Many military enlistees report when they wear their uniform, or their camouflage, that Texans of all types walk up and say, "Thank you for your

Volunteers from all over Texas have organized efforts to support military personnel and their families, from sending packages overseas to helping out with extraordinary expenses.

But unlike World War II, when some necessities were rationed and virtually everyone went to work, few sacrifices by civilians have been necessary in the war on terror. The economy is booming, and goods are plentiful. The burden of providing our defense is falling narrowly - on those who volunteer to serve, and their families.

On Memorial Day, America carries out its duty to remember those who have lost their lives for the cause of freedom and the security of our country.

This year, I hope we will also make an effort to consider how we can honor those who are serving, as well as those who have served. We can do so by volunteering our time and resources to one of countless organizations, from the USO to veterans groups, to ad hoc efforts, supporting our troops.

We can all make sacrifices, even in small ways, and also remember those fallen heroes in our prayers.

Matador City Council meets in regular session

Matador City Council met Thursday, May 10 with council members Terry Simpson, Bert Darsey, Pat Seigler, and Chuck Ream in attendance. Also attending were Mayor Pat Smith, City Secretary Debra Scott, Water Superintendent Steve

Mayor Smith called the meeting to order and Pat Smith gave the invocation. No one participated in Open Forum.

Roaring Springs City Council meets Votes canvassed, ordinance approved

The Roaring Springs City Council met in regular session May 14 in the City Hall conference room. In addition to Mayor Corky Marshall, council members attending were Alex Crowder, Timmy Brooks and Kelly Keltz; water manager Robert Osborn; city secretary, Zella Palmer, and Les Woolsey.

Mayor Marshall called the meeting to order and Mr. Keltz gave the invocation.

Minutes of the April 9 regular council meeting were approved. The financial statement and bills were approved as presented.

Fire Chief, Les Woolsey gave a report on plans for the fire department. He stated he received a grant for \$2500.00

which was used to purchase gear. Plans include putting up an awning over the front of the fire building and have a sign installed across the front of the building.

Council voted unanimously to accept bids for city lot 27, block 5. A bid notice will be placed in the Motley County Tri-

Mayor Marshall called for the canvassing of the votes for the council election held May 12. There were 35 votes cast. Election results were: Timmy Brooks, 32 votes; Patricia Green, 25 votes; Alex Crowder, 24 votes; and James McCleskey, 21 votes. Council voted to accept votes as canvassed.






Couple to exchange wedding vows



Gov. Perry joins State Legislators and families in support of **Religious Viewpoint Discrimination Act**


Austin -- Gov. Rick Perry, joined by state legislators and Texas families, recently stood in support of House Bill 3678, the Religious Viewpoint Anti-Discrimination Act. The bill, authored by Rep. Charlie Howard, does not expand religious expression in schools, but reiterates a student's existing right to expression. The bill of-fers clarity for teachers and administrators who may be confused about what religious rhetoric is permitted.

Freedom of religion should not be mistaken for freedom from religion. It is one thing to prevent government from sponsoring or endorsing a particular religious view. It is quite another for government to sanitize all dialogue from religious view-points in a public setting," said Gov Perry. "The constitution prohibits the former, but was never meant to prohibit the lat-

The United States Supreme Court holds religious discussion in schools legal. However, some schools have found to be misapplying the law and restricting legal expression. In an effort to promote a neutral learning environment, some schools are unintentionally suppressing re-ligious expression. Isolated instances in Texas

public schools led to the creation of HB 3678. In one case, a school prohibited students from wishing troops serving overseas a "Merry Christmas." Another school reprimanded a first grader for invoking the name and image of Jesus when she was asked what she thinks of when she thinks of Easter.

"We don't need to shield our children from religious expression and allow them to only be exposed to the religion of secu-larism in our schools," said Gov. Perry. "Discussion does not lead to indoctrination. Rather, it leads to open-mindedness and personal and educational betterment."

WRITER VISITS ROARING SPRINGS

It is surprising who you might meet in downtown Roaring Springs! There are many people who come here for various reasons. For instance, on Monday, there was a very interesting man who came to write a story about Joey Thacker and his bringing a jewelry factory to Roaring Springs and the impact it has had on our town. I happened to stop in at the Traveler's Inn to see what Corky was doing there so near lunchtime and had the pleasure of

meeting Jerry Anderson. We spent three hours visiting with him. It seems he missed Joey as he didn't come to Thacker Jewelry on his usual day so we had an opportunity to learn about Mr. Anderson and his remarkable life. He started as a farm kid near Austin near a little town named Manor. From there he went to the University of Texas to play football and discovered his real love was the theater. After studying drama at UT and being in several Shakespearean plays in New York, he became a reporter and undercover agent and later wrote for the New York Times.

He married Gloria Brown of Ropesville who was a protege' of the late Charles Guy, Editor of the Lub bock Avalanche Journal. She went on to become a writer for the New York Times and the Wall Street Journal and now manages the syndication division of the Wall Street

She is survived by her daughter, Marlene Hamm and husband,







Lower numbers of some mosquitoes may mean fewer cases of West Nile

College Station -- Cool would hate for anyone to be one spring weather in the eastern

southern house mosquito, the primary vector of the disease, has not been able to reproduce

as readily as in previous years. "Its numbers are considerably lower this year than at this time last year," Olson said.
"Now we're going into bird-nesting time, which is the prime buildup time for the bird and mosquito populations."

Since fewer mosquitoes are feeding on nesting birds, Olson hopes that will translate into a lower infection rate of West Nile.

lower infection rate of West Nile in birds.

The virus cycles from mosquitoes to birds to more mosquitoes and perhaps humans, Olson said.

"So we're hoping for the best and planning for the worst," he added.

West Nile is a potentially serious illness in humans, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. Most people will show no symptoms at all, but up to 20 percent of the people who become infected have symptoms such as fever, headache and body aches, nausea, vomiting, and sometimes swollen lymph glands or a skin rash on the chest, stomach and back, the CDC said.

These symptoms can last for several days to a couple of weeks, said the CDC. About one in 150 people will develop even more severe symptoms.

To date, no virus has been isolated from birds to mosquitoes, but possible human cases in the Dallas-Fort Worth and Houston area raise the possibility that the virus is active.

That indicates to us and the people we protect that we can't let our guard down," Olson said. "Even though infection rates are smaller in number we

of those infections.

half of Texas may have slowed the buildup of West Nile virus in mosquitoes and birds.

Dr. Jim Olson said the means cover up, use repellents, get rid of mosquito breeding sites, and mosquito-proof their houses," he said. "No amount of spraying, no amount of work by the city and county health departments or mosquito control

"The mosquitoes primarily involved in the transmission are being flushed out and becoming fish food in the streams and rivers," he said.

"On the down side, the rains are hatching floodwater species."

While these are not vectors, they are a major annoyance, Olson said, and people living in coastal areas especially need to take precautions.

'In the next 10 days or so, the mosquitoes will be coming to town looking for blood meals," he said. "They're going to come hungry. And there's not much you can do about those except stay inside and watch TV for the next 10 days to two

The West Nile virus has been found in mosquitoes and birds in all 48 contiguous states. Texas, where West Nile has been found virtually in all of the state, ranked third in the nation in the number of human cases last year. Idaho ranked first and South Dakota, second.

"Most of the infections occur when mosquitoes are in houses," Olson said.

Given the choice, the southern house mosquito would rather feed on birds.

"It's when they are trapped inside, they're more apt to feed on humans," Olson said.
