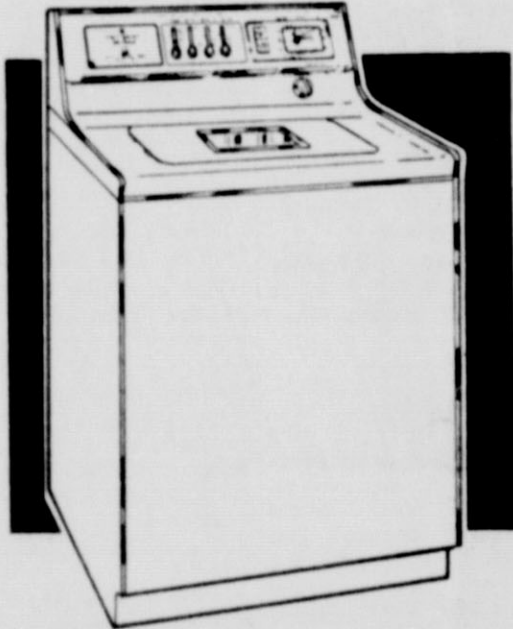

#### Miss Lola Norton Dies at Brownwood

Mr. and Mrs. Alfred Dye were called to Brownwood, last Monday night at the death of her sister, Miss Lola Norton, 71, at 4:05 p.m. at the Brownwood Golden Age Nursing Home, following a long illness.

Services were held Tuesday, Nov. 26 at 2:30 p.m. at the Sixth Street Church of Christ, Brownwood. Robert Backley officiated and burial was in Pleasant Valley Cemetery with Morris Funeral Home in charge.

Miss Norton was born Nov. 16, 1897 in Missouri Valley, Iowa. She was a retired school teacher of 43 years. After her retirement at Boles Orphan Home in Quinlan, Tex., she went to Columbia Christian School in Portland, Oregon. While there, she was overruled by a lumber truck at a red light intersection, in the fall of 1962. She was never well again and was flown to Texas in Feb. 1963, by her nephew, Norton Dye of Sparks, Nev. 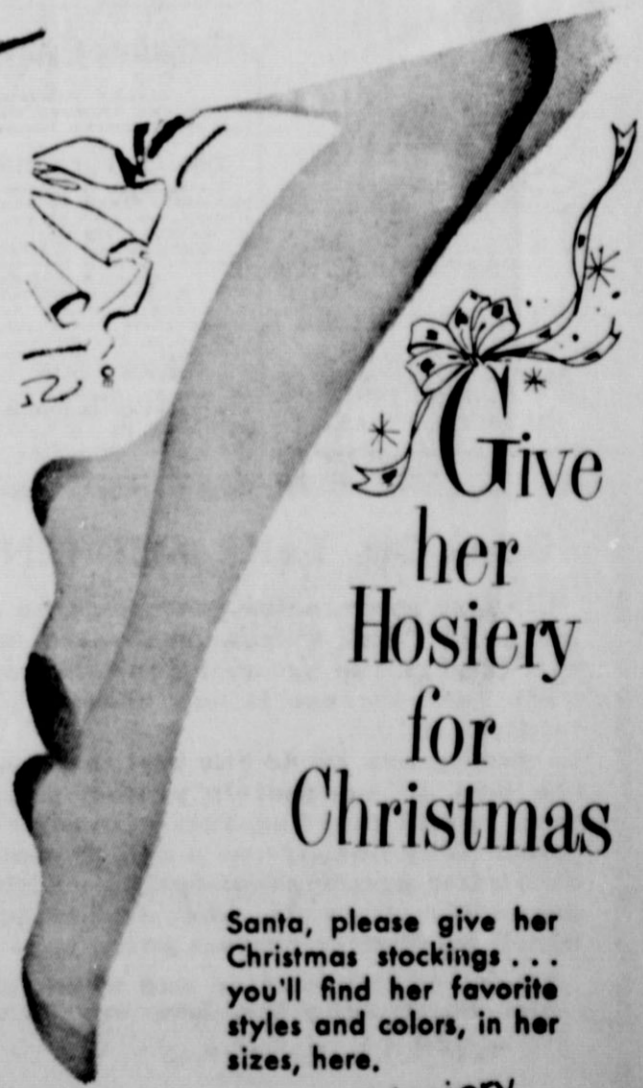
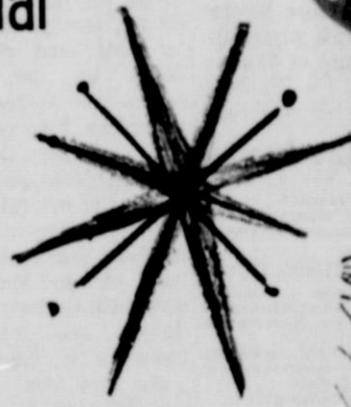
