Walk across America will raise money for diabetes

Come rain or shine, Jeremy Keeble is on the road walking across America for a yearlong trek to raise money for the American Diabetes Association.

Jeremy, 33, is part of the foundations' Walking America. "I have chosen to make a difference in the lives of millions of Americans living with diabetes by walking in the America's Walk for Diabetes fund-raising

The event kicked off October 7 at Cape Girardeau, MO. From there Jeremy started his walk to the California/Mexico border (via the Ozark Highland Trail, Ouachita Trail, Carlsbad Caverns, Guadalupe Mountains, Gila Wilderness, Blue Mountains and possibly a side

trip to the Grand Canyon). From there he will start hiking the Pacific Crest Trail, a National Scenic Trail that zigzaggs its way from Mexico to Canada through California, Oregon and Washington. "I will be hiking approximately 5,000 miles," Jeremy said.

Three members of Jeremy's family have been diag-nosed with diabetes. "I am not only walking for members of my family, but because I realize that one day I could possibly be dianosed with diabetes as well," he said.

Jeremy was in Matador Monday, making a detour on his hike after meeting new friend, Vic Read. While traveling to Lubbock last Thursday to visit

family, Vic offered Jeremy a ride near Floydada. The two enjoyed talking and wound up spending most of the weekend together, which included attending a Tech game. Vic said he might even join Jeremy on a hike in Carlsbad Caverns.

Most nights Jeremy sets up camp near the road in a grove of trees. "In this area, sometimes there isn't a grove of trees and you can see for miles, so I don't know if a farmer or rancher would want me setting up camp on their property."

Jeremy hopes to raise \$100,000 by the time he has com-


help improve the lives of the more than 20 million Americans who suffer from diabetes and the 41 million people with pre-diabetes, in the hope that future generations can live in a world without this disease. Together, we can all make a difference!"

"This has been a humbling experience," he said.

Blessing for Care Center, annual meeting draws large crowd

If there was a theme for the blessing of the soon-to-be-completed Hackberry Creek Care Center it could be summarized with the words "Loving and caring Home." Pastors Mike Crowley, Winfield Davenport and Johnny Morris spoke encouraging words, blessing the building, the staff, and the mission of providing care for those who need assistance in their everyday activities. Janie Campbell read the Edgar Guest poem, "Home."

The idea of a blessing came from board member Darleen Fletcher who had only heard about the concept. "In some parts of the world, there is a custom of gathering in places of homes, residences or work to ask God's blessing on those dwellings and upon all who live, work, and visit there. It seems particularly appropriate for a Care Center," Mrs. Fletcher

The ceremony concluded with the words, "May all come and go here find peace, comfort, joy, hope, love and salvation, for Christ has come to dwell in this house and in the these hearts."

If there was a theme for the annual meeting it might have

been, "Thank you donors for supplying so many extras." Matador City Council met Thursday, December 14 with council members Terry Simpson, Lara Davey, Bert Darsey, Chuck Ream and Pat Seigler in attendance. Also present were Mayor Pat Smith, City Secretary Debra Scott, Water Superintendent Steve Barton and Matador resident, Stan Hanesworth.

Mayor Smith called the meeting to order and asked Pat Seigler to give the invocation.

Mr. Hanesworth addressed the council in Open Forum. He wants to keep abreast of the progress of the sub-standard housing board, and any plans or

goals that have been set. Mayor Smith spoke in open forum advising elected officials that they had until December 31 to be certified in Open Meetings

and Public Information Laws. Minutes from the November

9 meeting were approved. Matador resident Craig Turner spoke with Council about the leasing of the upstairs apartment to the Chamber of Commerce. Council voted to address this at the next meeting after speaking with the Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Turner also said there are now funds available for Emergency Management grants and he is pursuing all avenues to obtain funds for emergency programs.

Council passed a resolution to hold a joint election with the MCISD for the May elections. Council approved all bills.

The bid from Jim Roland with Water Tank Management, Inc. was approved for the repair to the Water Tower.


Judge Smith presented for the court's approval a resolution in support of County offices. Motley County Commissioners' Court opposes any and all attempts to abolish any county
