Community Chest Drive Scheduled

MATADOR COMMUNITY CHEST annual fund drive is scheduled to open immediately with the Eternas Study Club members conducting the campaign. Mrs. Bill Seale, president of the Eternas Club said the drive would start just as soon as arrangements can be completed. The 1962 quota has not been announced but it is usually in the neighborhood of \$3,000.

Area of the Matador Community Chest includes all the territory inside the boundary of the Matador Independent School District.

Bob Stanley, president of the Community Chest, said he was

glad to have the members of the Eternas Club conduct the fund campaign and felt that sufficient contributions would be collected in a short time to meet the needs of the chest during the next 12 months. County Judge Elbert Reeves handles the disbursements of the chest as authorized by five directors.

Chest directors are Billy Wason, J. R. Whitworth, Bill Seale, J. E. Edwards and Douglas Meador.

In addition to Boy Scout and Girl Scout programs, the Community Chest provides funds for the Salvation Army and other similar organizations. Largest portion of the funds collected will be retained in a fund to care for local welfare needs.

No funds are paid out or allowed to any organization until the case has been carefully screened to determine the justification of the request for funds. Mrs. Lois Smart is secretary. All local officers serve without pay.

Official Injured

Clyde Gilbert, Motley County Commissioner of Precinct No. 1, was seriously injured shortly after noon Tuesday. Two wheels of a maintainer passed over his body in an accident at Jameson Machinery Co. station at the west edge of Matador.

Commissioner Gilbert suffered a fractured pelvis bone, examination revealed after he had been brought to Stanley Hospital by a Eudy-Seale ambulance. Floyd Henderson was pulling the tractor-maintainer by truck in an effort to get it started. When the machine started rolling down an incline, Commissioner Gilbert made an effort to reach the cab to gain control when he fell under the heavy wheels. In addition to the fractured bone, he also received painful abrasions and other injuries.

RITES HELD FOR MOTLEY PIONEER

Funeral services for Mrs. Elizabeth Hall Dirickson, 91, were held at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday in the Church of Christ. A former Matador minister, Leonard Dennis of Edmonson, officiated.

Mrs. Dirickson, who made her home here for many years, died in San Antonio Monday morning. She had been hospitalized since last fall when she fell and broke her hip.

She was born in Grayson County, Texas April 9, 1870 and died March 5, 1962 at the age of 91 years 10 months and 26 days.

She was married to the late W. R. Dirickson, in 1892 in Oklahoma, and they came here in 1914 from Mountain View, Okla., making the trip in a covered wagon and driving a herd of cattle.

Following her husband's death in February, 1938, Mrs. Dirickson continued to make Matador her home until three years ago when she went to San Antonio to live with her daughter. She is survived by four sons, Melvin and L. H. Dirickson, both of Matador, Orvell Dirickson, Corpus Christi, and Bill Dirickson, Redwood City, Calif., one daughter, Mrs. Vesta Patton, San Antonio; six grandchildren, five great-grandchildren; and one sister, Mrs. W. J. Delk, Sentinel, Okla.

Burial was in Matador East Mound Cemetery under direction of Eudy-Seale Funeral Home.

A pioneer, who lived into the space age, Mrs. Margaret Fisher was 101 Wednesday.

The oldest resident of Motley County had the "flu" and was not able to celebrate on her birthday.

But Mrs. Fisher has many happy memories on which to reflect. Last year, she remarked: "I've achieved my goal, I lived to 100." Yesterday she added another milestone.

Mrs. Fisher lives here with her daughter, Mrs. W. R. Patrick. She has resided in Matador since 1927.

She was born Margaret Whitlock, March 7, 1861 in Russellville, Ala., and came to Texas in 1906 with her family. They settled at Paris in Lamar County.

Another daughter, Mrs. Annie Patterson resides in Lubbock.

Mrs. Fisher has been active up until about a month ago. She enjoys walking about and talking, and having someone read to her.

FUNDS SOUGHT FOR LIVESTOCK SHOW

A drive is currently being conducted to renew memberships in the Motley County Livestock Association, in support of the Junior Livestock Show, scheduled for April 14. Individual membership cards are \$5 and firm cards for businesses are \$10. The drive is being conducted by 4-H boys and girls, FFA boys and others interested in the promotion of better livestock for the area.

Lions clubs of Roaring Springs, Flomot and Matador are also supporting the campaign. Members of the association will select a new director from Matador, Roaring Springs and Flomot. Directors whose terms expire are Billy Hand, C. M. Barton Jr. and Gordie Washington. Holdover directors are C. L. Marshall, Roaring Springs; Doc Taylor, Matador; and Malcolm Turner, Flomot.

The association was able to increase prize money by 50% last year, and a new class of beef heifers has been added to the 1962 show.

Arrangements have been made to sell the top two animals of each class in the 1962 show, thus encouraging the contestants to feed out top animals for the county show, without being faced with financial loss.

Regarding the Livestock Association memberships, County Agent Bill Palmeyer said: "If the people of Motley County want a livestock show, purchase of memberships, and donations, together with purchase of animals at the sale, will prove to the boys and girls of the county that the people are supporting them."

Talent was rampant during the hour of entertainment Tuesday night in the high school auditorium when school students competed for honors in the annual Amateur Hour.

Logically, they couldn't all place first, so after short deliberation, the judges named as winner, the Spark-a-letz trio, Vada Nichols, Judy Hobbs and Cherril Barton.

Crop Tops Estimates

Motley County's 1961 cotton crop exceeded even the most optimistic estimates when the harvest began last fall. Most guesses were in the neighborhood of 14 to 16,000 bales.

Total bales ginned as of last week was 19,332, according to a survey made Monday by County Agent Bill Palmeyer.

Approximately half of the county's crop was processed through Flomot's two gins for a total of 9,533 bales. Matador ginned 4,924 bales and Roaring Springs 4,875 bales.

Two Matador Men Are Indicted On Silverton Charge

SILVERTON—Two Matador men were named in indictments returned by 110th Judicial District grand jurors in connection with a fatal hit-run traffic mishap here Wednesday, February 28.

Killed was 76-year-old William A. Stephens, a retired farmer, who was walking across a state highway on his way to church services here when struck by a car.

His 72-year-old wife was injured slightly.

Named in a two-count indictment of failure to stop and render aid and murder with a motor vehicle, while intoxicated, was Dallas Eugene Hurt, 34, Dist. Atty. John Stapleton said.

His 19-year-old nephew, Roger William Throneberry, was named in an indictment alleging he was an accessory to failure to stop and render aid and the murder charges.

MPCA Stockholders Meet At Childress

Farmers and ranchers were urged last week to be proud of their profession and of the contributions they are making to the nation's economy at the 28th annual stockholders' meeting of the Memphis Production Credit Association, held Friday in the Childress City Auditorium.

W. H. Calkins, vice president of the Federal Intermediate Credit Bank of Houston told the 400 stockholders and guests of the agricultural credit organization that less than 10% of the nation's population is able to produce more than enough food and fiber to feed and clothe the nation's entire populace.

"We're the only nation in the world that can do this with such a small segment of population," Calkins said, pointing out that more than 50% of Russia's population is engaged in agriculture, yet the country suffers an annual production shortage.

Calkins was principal speaker at the meeting, and also on the program was Dr. Leon Hill of Amarillo, guest speaker.

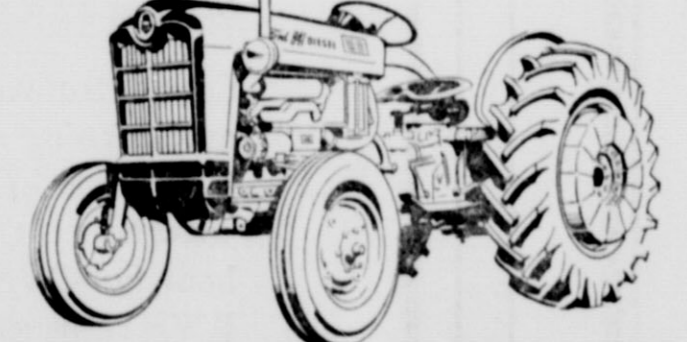

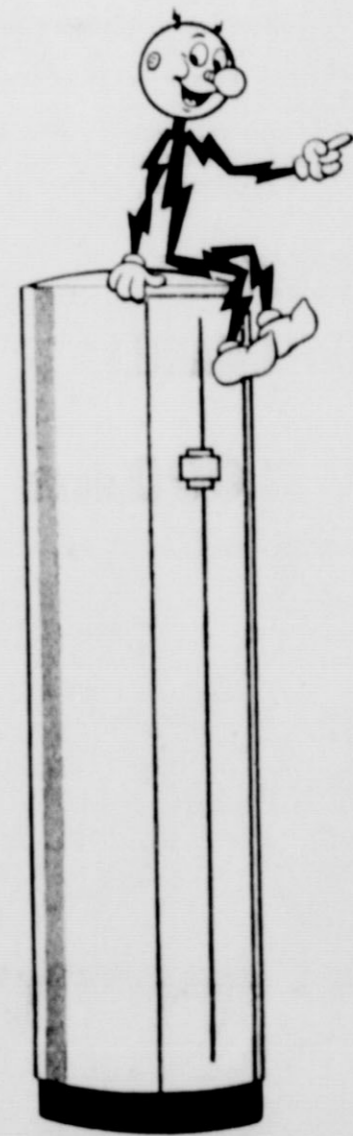

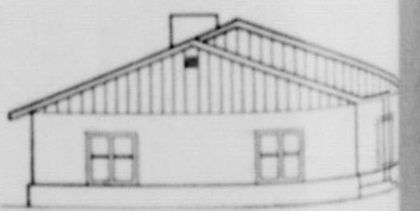

The Great Plains Conservation Program committee, Motley County, met in the Soil Conservation Service office at 10 a. m. Wednesday, February 21.

Lipscomb, rancher, member of Upper Peace Soil Conservation District Board of Supervisors, Bill Paimeyer, Motley County Agent, and Eddie Simms, work unit conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Matador were in attendance at the meeting.

The committee reviewed progress of the GPCP in Motley County, considering problems confronting the program and ways to encourage participation.

At this time the next meeting is scheduled for April 11.
