### Lower Interest Offered by FLB

At the recent stockholders meeting of The Federal Land Bank of Houston held in Houston, Sterling C. Evans, President of the bank, announced a reduction of 1/2 of 1% in the interest rate charged on new loans. In addition to lowering interest rate on new loans to 5% the bank voluntarily reduced the interest charges to Land Bank borrowers whose loans carry an interest rate in excess of 5%. This

Of special interest to borrowers who already have Land Bank loans was Mr. Evans' further announcement that the bank will now close additional loans. This is a new practice and enables a borrower with a 4% Land Bank loan of \$1,000 or more to get an additional loan at 5% on the new money and

leave his old 4% loan undisturbed.

The Federal Land Bank makes its loans through national farm loan associations. It has over 200 million dollars of loans in force and obtains funds to make loans through the sale of bonds to the investing public. This reduction in interest rates will mean substantial savings each year to thousands of farm and ranch owners in Texas.

### COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

#### Imported Fire Ants Cause Much Damage

College Station, March — The imported fire ant was brought to this country 20 years ago from South America and has now spread into Ala. where it was first introduced, Miss. La., Ark., Fla., Ga., S. C., and Texas.

Imported fire ants damage many kinds of young plants by gnawing holes in roots, tubers, stalks and buds. They often attack young unprotected animals, such as newborn calves and pigs and newly hatched quail and poultry. They interfere with harvesting since their sting is very painful. Their mounds damage machinery and prevent mowing operations and reduce the value of land in heavily infested areas.

Two species of fire ants occur generally in Texas while the imported fire ant has been found only in Hardin, Jasper, Jefferson, Newton, Orange, and Tyler counties. But it is spreading rapidly and is almost certain to appear in other counties.

In small lightly infested areas the ants may be controlled by mound treatment, but treating the entire surface is more practicable in heavily infested areas. Chlordane, dieldrin and heptachlor are the recommended insecticides.

The insecticides should be applied only when vegetation is dry and livestock should be kept off treated pastures for two weeks. They should be kept out of water used by humans or animals and should not be applied to food crops. More information on this damaging pest may be obtained by ordering L-384, "How to Control the Imported Fire Ant", from local county agents or from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.
