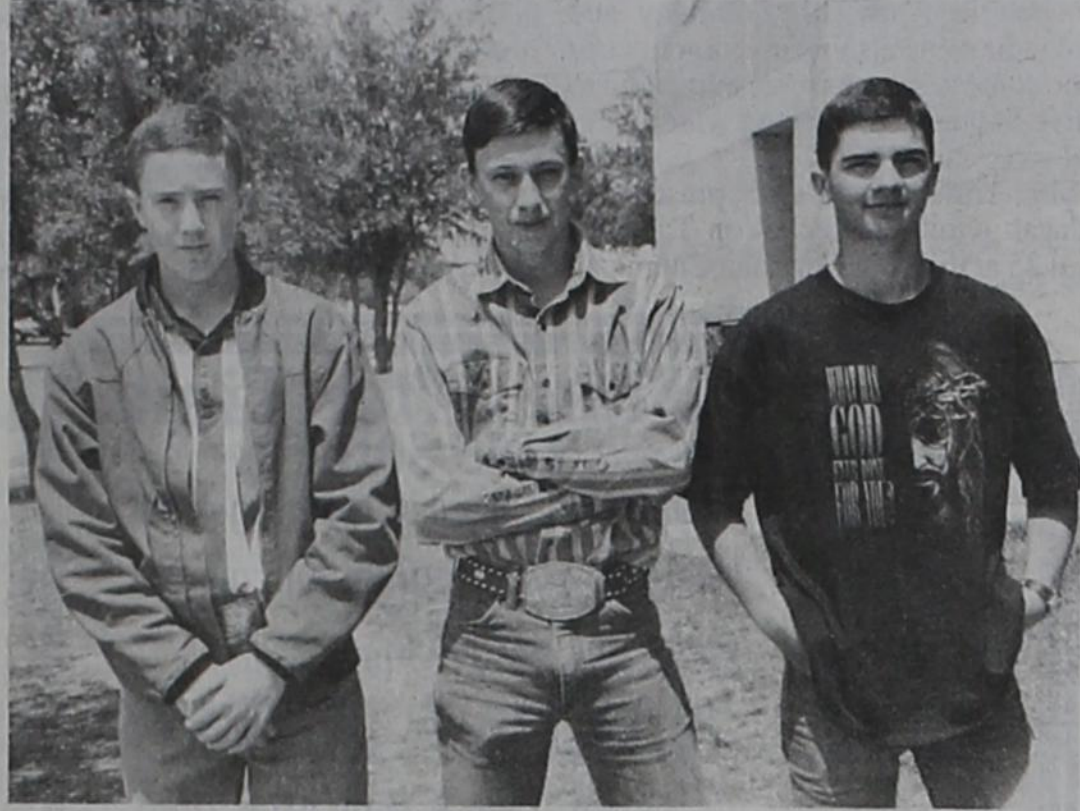

Citizens Present Petition To Council Members

The City Council of Matador met for regular session on April 20 at 8 a.m. at City Hall. The Council approved the minutes, and bills except for one bill still in question from the State Water Testing Lab. They reviewed the 1994-95 Appraisal District Budget. Mayor Lancaster explained it is \$3000 less than last year. Councilman Don Warren said he had checked the worst streets and it looks like the will need about \$14,000 of seal coat work done on city streets. Council decided to get the specifications prepared for letting bids next month. Council discussed replacing one board member on the Water District Board. This was tabled until next meeting when they have new council members. The Museum would like to donate 17 lots to the City. These are all together and could possibly become a full block, possibly for future industrial use. This was approved. Other lots considered to accept were from Lottie Stotts. These are 5 lots in and

around the City Park. Council accepted these lots also. Ava Clyde Crump presented a 9 page petition requesting the City re-hire the night watchman. Lonnie Doran was dismissed as of the first of April, Council elected to cut the finances for the salary of the night watchman. According to the minutes of the March meeting, when Doran was hired it was stated he was to be a fire watchman, not a night watchman. Crump stated she had been told that this was an effort in vain, because it was cut and dried and the Council would only put the petition in the trash. The petition had 262 names. Crump also explained that citizens are concerned that the Sheriff and one Deputy can not watch the City and the entire county, including Roaring Springs and Flomot. Mayor Lancaster stated that he would assure Mrs. Crump that he for one would not throw the petition in the trash, but will read it and consider the suggestions. Copies were made for each Council member. Councilman L.B. Campbell asked if Mrs. Crump, as spokesman, thought the Citizens were in favor of the County Commissioners helping with the financing of the watchman or another deputy? Crump stated that she thinks the entire county should help with more law enforcement. Mayor Lancaster stated that he had met with the Commissioners and was told they were going to consider helping the City with these finances at their budget meeting for planning next year's budget. Councilman Travis Jameson stated he feels if the County will work with them, the Council will work with them. After Mrs. Crump left the Council meeting, there was no further discussion of the petition. Council discussed water and sewer matters with Steve Barton. Terry Carson was in school this week. Meeting adjourned.

The coming tenth, eleventh, and twelfth graders will be set up for registration at a later date. The students will be notified.

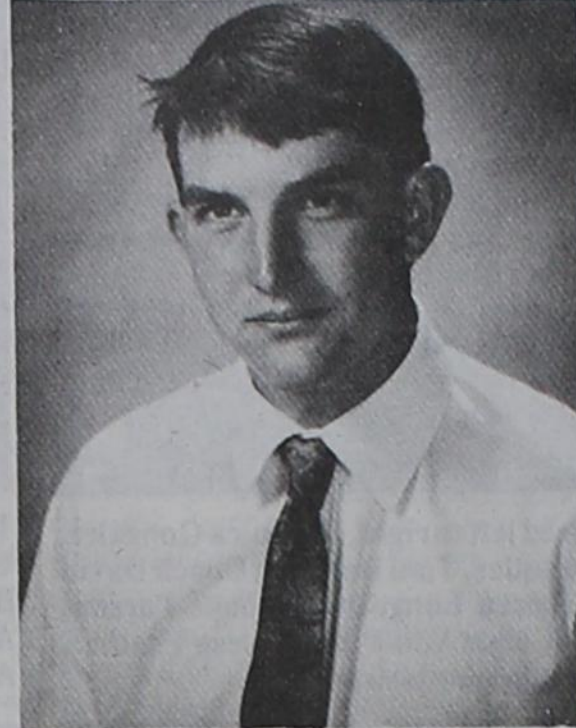
Lindsey's Lines

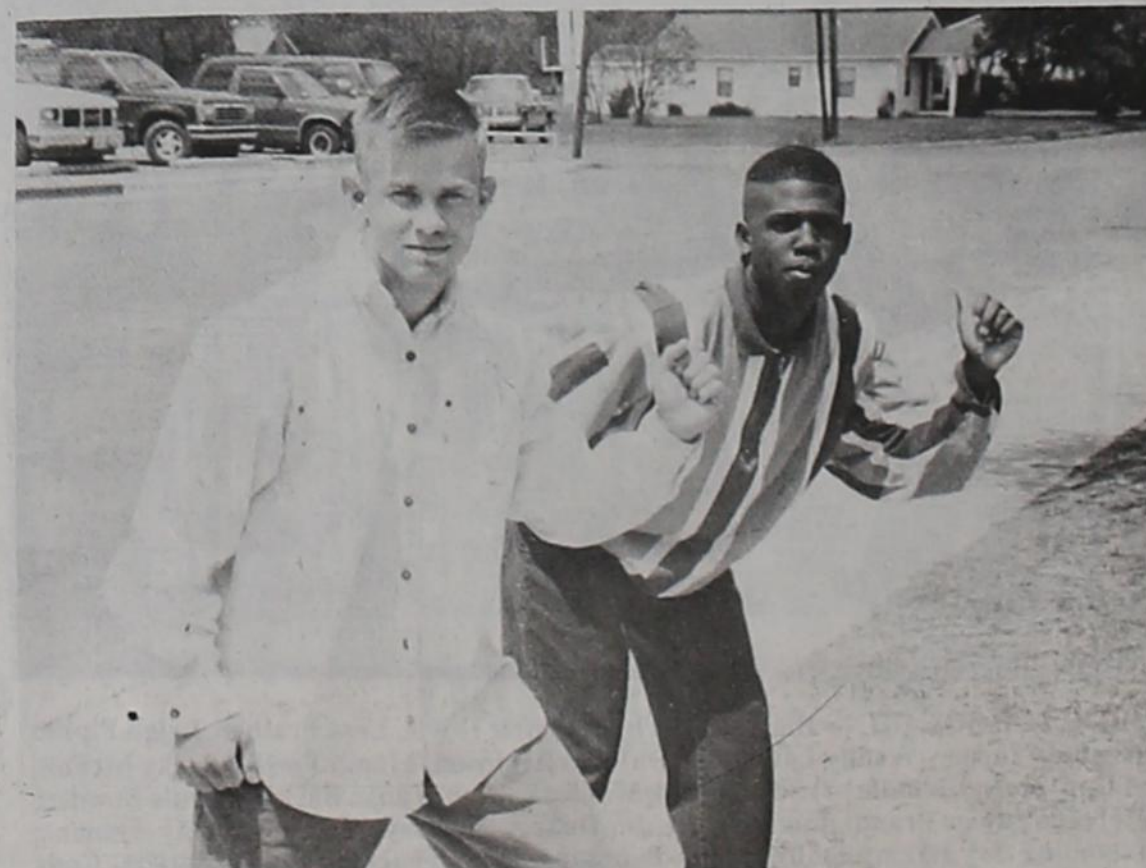

Marathon Is Experience of Lifetime for John Thacker

NOTE: This article was taken from the Abilene paper. John Thacker is the son of Buzz and LaVoe Thacker of Roaring Springs.

Most runners spend as much as a year training for a marathon - especially the mother of all marathons, the prestigious Boston Marathon.

But for John Thacker of Abilene, Monday's Boston Marathon was the culmination of a 60-day short course in training.

Thacker, chairman and CEO of Western marketing, didn't learn until February that he would run in Boston.

"Citgo is a corporate sponsor of the Boston Marathon, and we do a lot of business with Citgo," he said. "I got my invitation on Valentine's Day."

The Boston Marathon was only his second marathon. He ran in the Dallas White Rock Marathon in 1988.

He completed the 26.2 mile race at Boston in 4 hours, 19 minutes.

"I was happy with my time," Thacker said, "since I only trained for 60 days."

With 10,000 runners in the race, Thacker said it took him more than five minutes to reach the starting line, and it took him another 11 minutes to run the first mile. He was forced to walk with the first mile because of the crowd of runners.

Despite those problems, Thacker called the Boston Marathon an experience of a lifetime.

"There were over 1 1/2 million spectators and more than 10,000 registered runners," he said. "There were spectators from beginning to end. It's an amazing event."

Thacker said officials plan to allow 25,000 runners in next year's 100th anniversary running of the race.

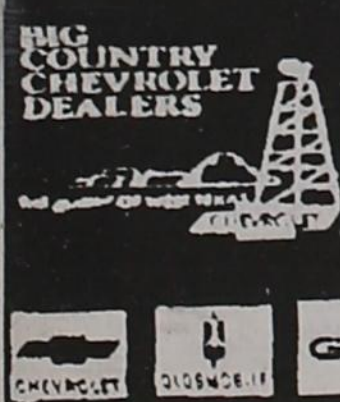

Social Security Tips

PEOPLE WITH KIDNEY DISEASE MAY BE COVERED BY MEDICARE
If you need dialysis treatments for permanent kidney failure or a kidney transplant, you may be eligible for Medicare - no matter what your age. People who have begun a regular course of dialysis or have had a kidney transplant are eligible for Medicare if:

- they are receiving Social Security or Railroad Retirement benefits (or they have worked long enough to be eligible for those benefits); or
- they worked for the federal government and paid medicare taxes; or
- they are the spouse or dependent child of someone who meets any of the above requirements.

Medicare has two parts: Hospital Insurance, called part A, and Medical Insurance, or Part B. Part A helps pay for in-patient hospital costs associated with kidney transplant surgery. Part B covers regular dialysis as an outpatient and helps pay for other services, including surgeons' fees for transplant surgery, laboratory tests, home dialysis equipment, and the supplies and other services associated with such treatment.

Individuals enrolled in Medicare because of permanent kidney failure have the same coverage as anyone else who is

on Medicare. That means Medicare will help pay for other hospital and medical services you may need even if they are unrelated to your kidney disease.

There is no monthly premium for Part A coverage, but there are "copayment" charges (the amount of the bill the patient has to pay) for long hospital stays. There is a \$46.10 monthly premium as well as a \$100 annual deductible and copayment charges for the services covered under Part B. If your income is low enough, your State might be able to help pay your Part B premiums and some of your other out-of-pocket Medicare expenses. Check with your local welfare or social services office about the Qualified Medicare Beneficiary (QMB) program.

People who have begun a regular course of kidney dialysis or who are contemplating kidney transplant surgery should apply for Medicare by contacting the Plainview Social Security office. To save time, you can set up an appointment for an interview by calling Social Security's toll-free number: 1-800-772-1213.

For more information, ask for a copy of the pamphlet, Medicare Coverage of Kidney Dialysis and Kidney Transplant Services. People can also obtain the booklet by writing to the Consumer Information Center, Department 519-Y, Pueblo, CO 81009.

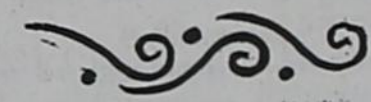

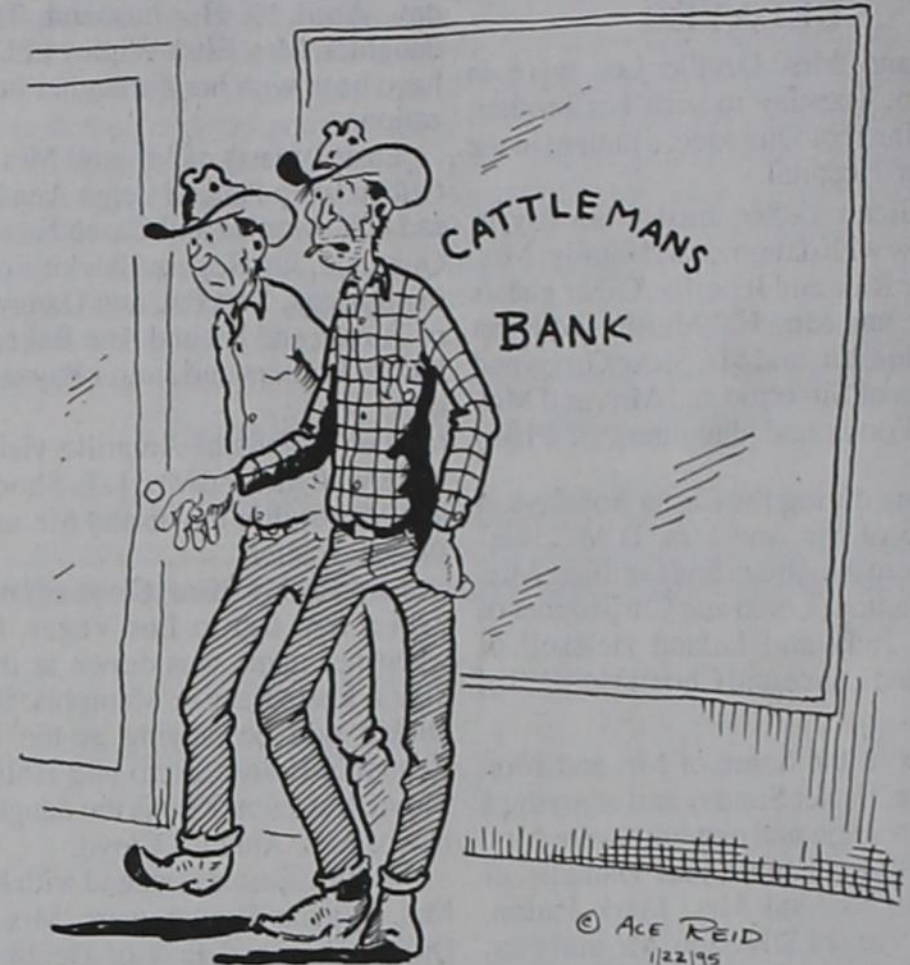
