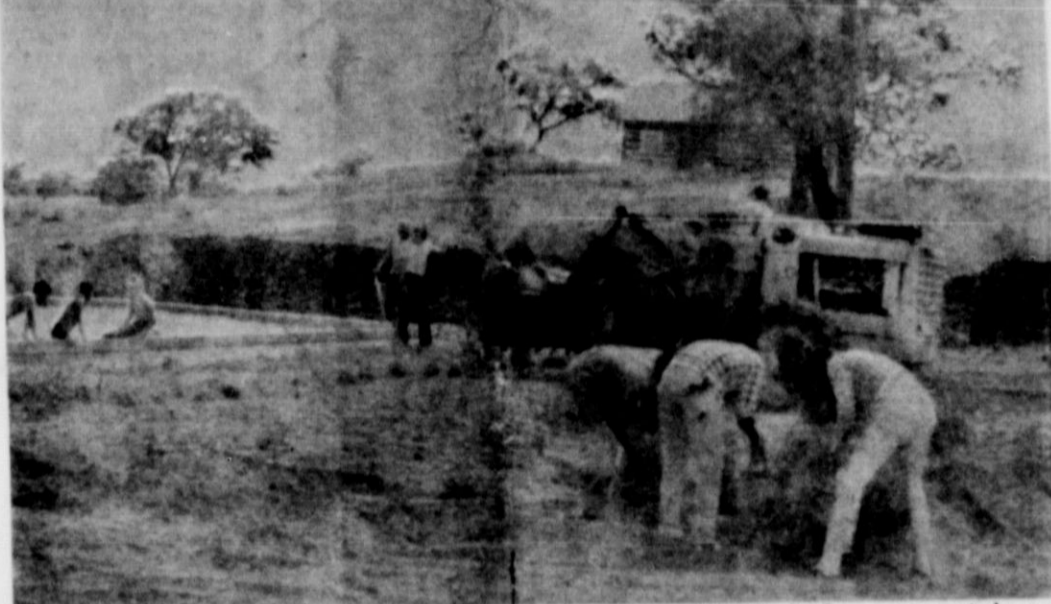

Consider the Cost of Taxes....

Every property-owner weighs the cost of taxes assessed each year against his possessions. He usually grumbles at tax-paying time but on the other hand it is doubtful if he would like to surrender what his taxes buy in order to be relieved of their costs.

It would mean giving up schools, fine roads, fire protection, police protection, water systems in cities and hundreds of other benefits.

Perhaps the greatest thing he would need to consider would be the value of his property. It would be cheapened. Its value would be decreased if he desired to sell. We know that it is impossible to have a government without taxes, either national, state, county or city.

In the instance of the proposed Motley County Hospital District there is perhaps, no issue except that of taxes. It has been the issue since the county was organized and the same attitude is

true in other counties. Improved roads, streets and schools have had the same problems in securing approval.

In the present situation a set amount of money is required to operate the county government. If the county should be left without the services of hospitals and doctors, it is probable that homes would be sold and business economy would deteriorate to a point it would be necessary to raise present rates to offset the loss. Certainly a stagnant economy could not support county government on the present rate.

These are possibilities. We, who advocate a County Hospital District, also concede that it may not solve our eventual problem but we submit to everyone that it is the most logical procedure.

We want doctor and hospital protection for ourselves and families in the future. We do not want any change from the present situation. We have no purpose but to protect it in the future.

I am opposed to a hospital district or a bond issue wherein we may purchase old facilities. I will support a bond issue for a new hospital, for which plans are drawn by a hospital architect, and let the state approve our plans, then we may be in line for a Federal grant to equal the amount we vote.

It is possible that the Federal Government will not impose any more restrictions than are already set by law by the state.

There are no laws governing nursing facilities, but many insurance companies are requiring that hospitals have registered, graduate nurses on duty at all times, before they will pay more than nursing home benefits.
