Tenant 50 Years, Law Office Moves

AFTER 50 years in one building, Matador attorney Farris Fish has moved his office. He is now located in the IOOF building two doors north of the First State Bank.

The modern new office is a convenient ground floor location. It is the latest design of paneling, indirect lighting, deep, soft carpeting, matching drapes on the windows, forced air heating and refrigerated air cooling.

Attorney Fish moved almost a truck load of books from his library to the new location last week. For fifty years he had maintained an office in the second story building at the corner of Main and Dundee streets. At first the building was the property of the Farmers & Merchants Bank. Later it was the property of the First National Bank before that institution was moved to Plainview. For a number of years the building belonged to the late L. J. Barkley.

Farris Fish was born on the Fish Ranch about 20 miles northwest of Matador. He attended school here with the class of 1913, and then attended the Austin Academy prep school where he graduated. He then entered the University of Texas Law School where he was graduated in 1918. World War I was then in progress and he volunteered in what is now the Air Corps. He and other recruits were getting on the train in Austin one morning, for training in San Antonio.

Postmark Isn't Only Similarity; Two Towns Have a Lot in Common

(The following feature appeared in a recent issue of the *Morrisons Cove Herald of Martinsburg, Penn.*, and a copy was sent to Miss Lula Swim, Roaring Springs Postmaster, who furnished the information concerning her community.)

Roaring Springs, Pa., meet Roaring Springs, Texas. You've got a lot in common although you're more than 1,500 miles apart.

The eastern borough, generally thought of as a "little" town in its locale, is several times the size of its southwestern sister. The population of Roaring Springs, Pa. is approximately 3,000, the population of Roaring Springs, Texas is about 400.

Although unlike in size the towns were named for similar reasons. Miss Lula Swim, postmaster of Roaring Springs, Tex. explains that the name of that town was derived from roaring falls which originated from ever-flowing underground springs. The eastern town was named for the mighty spring, whose roar could be heard for several miles before it was "tamed."

The Pennsylvania town sometimes is called, and always incorrectly, Roaring Springs. Its correct name is singular—Roaring Spring. The opposite is true of the Texan community where the plural of spring is correct—Roaring Springs.

"In the early days," Miss Swim writes, "the Indians used to grind their corn on rocks at the springs. These same springs today flow into a swimming pool, a popular recreation center each summer."

"In a nearby campground stands the monument to Quannah Parker and his family."

Roaring Spring, Pa. has its Indian past, too. In a history of that community written in 1962, mention was made of Indian burial mounds found in the borough. Arrowheads have been found in the spring park.

The Texan community was organized in 1913 with the formal celebration held on June 19 of that year—about 26 years after its "twin" was incorporated.

Roaring Springs, Texas is located in the northwest part of the state at the southern edge of the Texas "panhandle." It is in Motley County, where "the small town of Matador," eight miles north, is the county seat. Roaring Spring, Pa. is about the same distance from the county seat of Blair County—Hollidaysburg.

Railroad service to Roaring Spring, Pa. has been greatly reduced in past decades and the same is true of its twin.

"Our railroad, which is known as the Quannah, Acme and Pacific Line, hauls only freight, now," Miss Swim says. "We have a man that maintains the depot." Eighty miles from the nearest metropolitan center, Lubbock, Roaring Springs seems self-sufficient according to Miss Swim's description of the town.

"We have a large hardware furniture and farm equipment store, one garage, one barber shop, one beauty salon, one tailor shop and laundry combination, a combination variety and dry goods store. We have two feed stores, three service stations, one welding shop, a golf course and a small air field.

"We have seven churches and they are: one Assembly of God, one Methodist Church, three Baptist Churches and two Churches of Christ. There is a city secretary and insurance agency complex." (Continued on back page)

He will be in Roaring Springs on Friday afternoon, Dec. 19, it was announced yesterday. In event of unfavorable weather, Santa will be located in a sheltered area.

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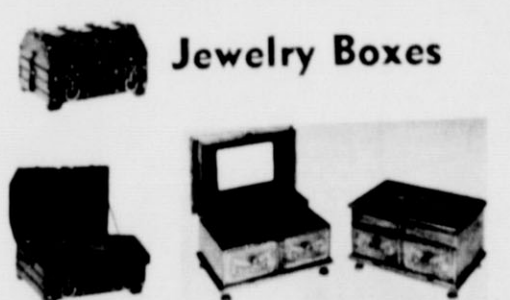
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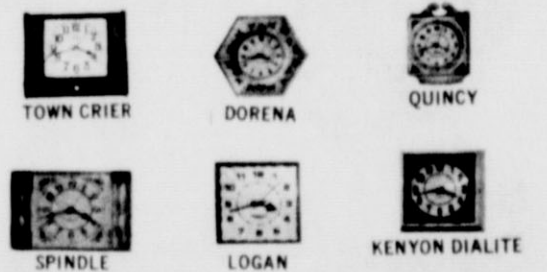

Tax Man Sam says:

"Does that Internal Revenue employee know what he's talking about?" is a common question that taxpayers ask of their accountant, attorney, or friend. The best insight into how much the tax man would know would come from a look at the (1) kind of education required, (2) type of training received after they are employed in Internal Revenue, and (3) experience required.

(1) Ordinarily Internal Revenue Agents, Revenue Officers and all of the professional and technical employees in Internal Revenue Service are required to have a college degree or the equivalent of a degree in experience at a professional level. (2) When Internal Revenue recruits the young accounting graduates upon finishing college they are required to go to school for 13 weeks before they audit any cases. Then the young man or woman received additional on-the-job training for another 13 weeks. Most Internal Revenue Agents are required to take additional advanced tax training of three to six weeks every few years. Constant on the job study is necessary since each case report prepared by an Agent must be supported by law, regulation, court decisions, or other applicable rulings. Internal Revenue has one of the better training programs for their professional and technical employees out of all the public and private training programs for comparable large organizations. (3) Finally,

in looking at the experience of the Internal Revenue employee, each employee works only cases for which he is fully qualified. The new college graduate would not be assigned to audit a billion dollar conglomerate. This type of case would be worked by a highly competent, senior, fully experienced tax man that knows how to get additional professional and technical support from the specialists such as engineers and the Counsel.

Of course the man working your case could make a mistake and could be wrong but it is safe to say he sure should know what he is talking about.

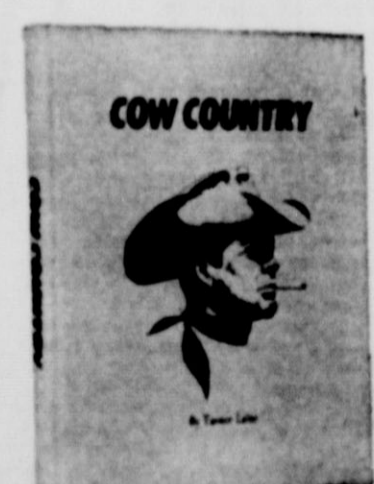
