Firemen "Vote" Gets Approval

The "vote" cards sent out last week by Matador Volunteer Fire Department have received the approval of water users in Matador.

The council has the authority to raise the water rate 25c per month (less than 1c per day per water customer) but asked the department to get a sounding of the majority of the more than 400 users.

Late Tuesday a total of 251 cards had been returned with all approving the raise with the exception of four. The rate, when approved, will apply to all users, and will give the Volunteer Firemen approximately \$100 per month with which to buy needed equipment and replace present equipment.

Two Matador cage stars, Charles Meador and Frances Martin, were named to the All-Tournament team following the Silverton Invitational Tournament, which closed Saturday night.

Eighteen other boys and girls from the eight other schools entered in the tournament were also selected by the game officials for All-Tournament honors.

Meador was leading scorer for the Matadors in each game and scored a total of 59 points in the tournament. In the first game with Silverton, he won game honors by out scoring his nearest competitor 22-13.

Miss Martin, a junior guard, who lettered in both her freshman and sophomore years, played excellent defense in the tournament. She was the only Matador guard who did not commit a single foul in at least one game, this being in Friday's game with Claude.

The tournament at a glance looked like this for the Matador teams. For the girls, Shelley Stevens canned 40, Ruby Storey 27 and Carol King 23. Frances Martin, Olivia Campbell, Sharlene Berryman and Elaine Thompson, contributed to the victories defensively.

The boys' team hit a commendable 52% at the free throw line during the tourney. Individually, Charles Meador scored 59, Dickie Garrison 35 and Luis Moore 31. On defense Luis Moore grabbed 42 of Matador's 92 rebounds, Dickie Garrison had 16 and Ronnie Cox 14.

Teams Place Second In Cage Tournament

The Matador High School cage teams won a pair of second place trophies Saturday night, in the Silverton Invitational Tournament.

The Estelene club, led by Jane Helm, ousted the Matador six, 47-26, to snatch the first place trophy from the Matador girls, who had previously slipped past Silverton and cut down Claude, to earn the right to appear in the finals.

In boys action, Quitaque's Ramsey with 21 points led his Panthers to a 68-50 championship-over district rival, Matador.

During the second half, led by Charles Meador, runner-up for scoring honors, with 19 points, the Matadors scored 23 to the Panthers 26 in a determined attempt to erase the Panthers' commanding lead.

Defeat Silverton Owls

In the first night's action, the girls, led by high scorer, Ruby Storey with 14 points, trailed from 1 to 3 points at the end of each quarter play, the Matadors snaggged a 34-28 victory to advance to the semi-finals.

The boys too, romped to a 54-43 victory over the Silverton boys, in a game that saw every

boy play. Luis Moore emerged defensive star and amassed an impressive record by clearing the boards for 17 rebounds, and tucking away 5 steals. Offensively, Luis bombed in 16 points, 10 of them at the free throw line, to rank right behind the game's big gunner, Charles Meador with 22 points.

Shelley Stevens canned 15 points to power the Matador sextet as they cut down Claude's crew, 30-26, in Friday night's semi-final action.

Mesquite Eradication Problems Concern Of Experts In Meeting

GRAVE CONCERN of the mesquite eradication problem in the Southwest was focused on a demonstration near the Cottle-Hardeman Counties line last week, where an estimated 5000 persons from eight states attended.

Sec. of Agriculture Orville Freeman attended. He spoke to a group of state political leaders, agricultural experts, newspapermen, and deeply interested farmers and ranchers. "Obviously, I do not have the answer," he declared. "We must look further."

Freeman had come to the demonstration on the invitation of the newly-formed Southwestern Mesquite and Brush Eradication Association, and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

About a dozen companies demonstrated known methods of controlling mesquite, including a giant machine for clearing the land, and aerial application of chemicals from both plane and helicopter. One of the machines represented an investment of \$85,000.

It was declared that 52% of the state's grasslands and 40% of the available water is taken by the constantly spreading mesquite.

Bob Stanley, member of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, attended on special invitation, since the WTCC was a co-sponsor in arranging the demonstration.

COUNTY AGENT PALLMEYER SAYS:

December, January and February is the ideal time for planting bare root trees and shrubs. Planting at this time assures good root growth and development before the top growth commences.

Dig the tree pit large enough to receive the roots without bending or breaking; do not cut the roots to fit the hole. Separate the good top soil from the poorer subsoil as the hole is dug. Unless the top soil is extremely poor, it can be mixed with peat moss or well rotted compost and used as backfill, using two parts of soil to one part of the added material in preparing the backfill.

It is desirable to prune back the top growth to compensate for the roots lost in digging and transplanting. Do this by removing about 1/3 of each branch, making the cut to an outside bud. By no means should all of the lower limbs be removed, reducing the main stem to a whip. If a high limbed tree is desired, low limbs can be removed later after the plant is well established, not removing more than two lower limbs a year.

Place a mound of the enriched top soil in the bottom of the hole to support the roots of the plant so that when placed in the hole the plant will be at the same level with the soil surface as it was in the nursery. As you fill the hole, work the soil around the roots so that there are no air pockets.

After the hole is 2/3 full, fill with water and allow it to drain away. Then fill the hole with the enriched soil until level with surrounding soil. Using additional soil, build a dam around the outer edge of the hole to aid in watering the first season. This should be removed or spread out after the plant is well established.

Another tip that will help if the soil is dry, dig the hole a day before planting, and fill with water. This prevents the soil from acting as a blotter and drawing the moisture away from the newly planted plant. Never mix fertilizer with the soil used in the backfill. Wait until the plant is well established before applying fertilizer.

Trees over 4 ft. high should be staked the first year to keep them straight. This can be done by driving a wooden stake or iron pipe into the ground about 6 to 8 inches from the trunk in the direction of the prevailing wind (SW). The tree can be tied to the stake with a soft rope or a wire which has been run through an old piece of hose to protect the bark.

I attended a conference in Dallas on Nov. 22-23, and one matter that concerns all people

in the county is what is to be done about safe use of insecticides and agricultural chemicals. It appears that we have two choices. Legislation or education. Many is the time that you have heard "Read the Label" and many times articles have appeared in this column relative to the use of agricultural chemicals. If this fails to do the job, the legislation will have to be the answer.

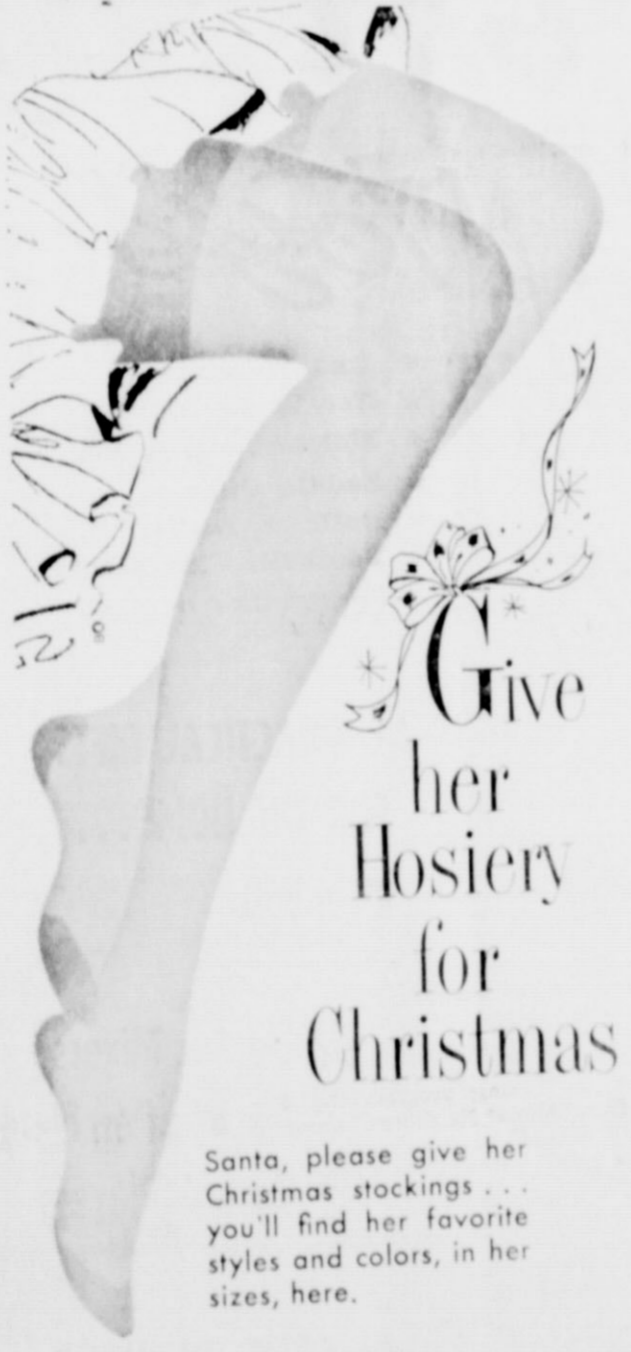

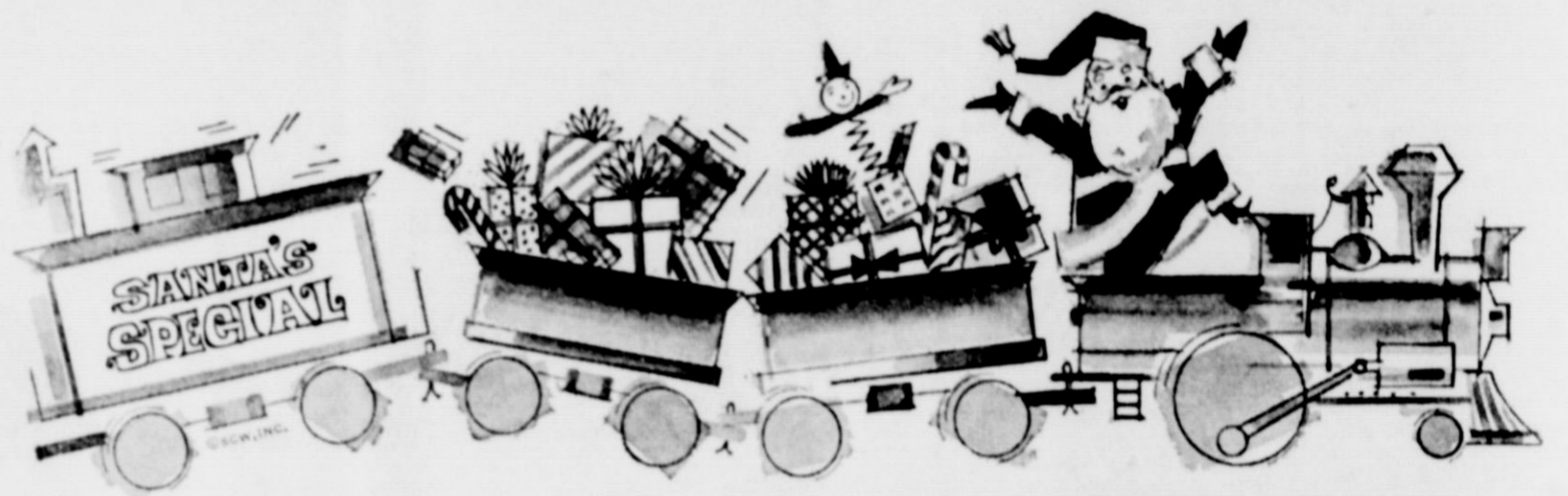

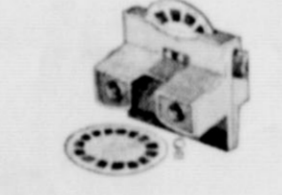

TO COTTON FARMERS OF DICKENS AND MOTLEY COUNTIES AND Trade Territory:

I am working with a reputable organization of Bonded Realtors in East and Central Texas. We are ready to contract for purchase or lease of upland cotton to be moved to your farm. The contracts are being prepared by Callaway Huffaker, attorney, Tahoka, Texas, who is buying 200,000 lbs. himself.

HERE ARE THE STEPS:

1. If you want to lease acreage it will cost you .05c per lb. (Example—say the farmer in East Texas has a Projected Yield of 200 lbs. per acre, 200x.05c or \$10 per acre per year for either three or four years which ever they go for.)
2. If you want to buy the acreage outright on the same farm, it would be 200x\$25 or \$50 per acre—and this would be the total cost.
3. It will be necessary for you to sign a Power of Attorney Authorization, giving me the Power of Attorney to act and sign for you.
4. A copy of the contract of purchase or lease will be mailed to your bank with a draft on you for 10% of the purchase or lease price and will be put in the sellers' bank as Escrow Monies.
5. The seller will have to sign a contract of specific performance to bind him to deliver the pounds.
6. It will be necessary for the seller to sign the ASC Form 375 and get it approved by his local ASC Committee and his Committee will send it to the ASC Committee in the County that is to receive the cotton and they will have to approve it before any money changes hand, but when you contract, both you and the seller will be bound; so don't sign up unless you are 21 and can stay hitched.
7. The organization that I am associated with will charge a 5% service charge to the buyers for acting as Power of Attorney and the services rendered in securing the cotton. Example: If you leased 100 acres of cotton for \$10 per acre for four years, it would cost you \$4,000 for the cotton and \$200 for our services.
8. We are pretty sure the big purchases or leases can be secured for 29% down payment and the balance on four years at 6% on or before, but we can't guarantee this.
9. I have all the necessary forms and my bird dogs in East and Central Texas say they have the cotton.
10. Keep in mind that all this has to be done in less than 30 days or by December 31, 1965. Don't shop with our time or yours; talk to your Banker, your ASC Office and if you want in, we would like to have you. But, we don't have time to jockey and back out.
11. I have the necessary forms whereby you make me your Power of Attorney to sign for you and in connection with this, I will need:
 - A. The projected yield on your farm (lbs. per acre). We have sellers with projected yields from 143 lbs. per acre to 500 lbs. per acre; but we may not be able to fit all buyers' acres with the sellers. However this doesn't make much difference since you are buying pounds—or lint.
 - B. It will be necessary for you to authorize me to draw a draft on your account at your local bank and attach a copy of the signed contract to same for the Escrow Money which will be 10% of the purchase or lease.

If you are not willing to do this or can't get it OK'ed at the bank, don't sign up, because I can't commute from East Texas to West Texas on each contract. The time and expense involved would be prohibitive.

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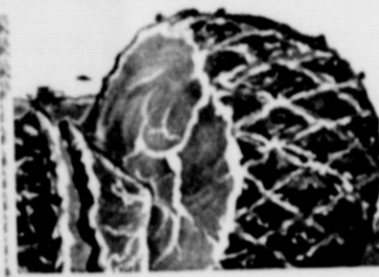
