





down payment and the balance on four years at 6% on or before, but we can't guarantee this. 9. I have all the necessary forms and my bird dogs in East and Central Texas say they have the cotton.

10. Keep in mind that all this has to be done in less than 30 days or by December 31, 1965. Don't shop with our time or yours; talk to your Banker, your ASC Office and if you want in, we would like to have you. But, we don't have time to jockey and back out.

11. I have the necessary forms whereby you make me your Power of Attorney to sign for you and in connection with this, I will need: A. The projected yield on your farm (lbs. per acre). 
