Hot and steamy Houston Texas was the site for the 68th Annual Texas FFA Convention held July 8th -12th. More than 6,000 members and guests were on hand when State President Corey Rosenbusch of Glen Rose tapped the gavel to begin the meeting of the largest student organization in the nation. The convention is to showcase how the FFA is having a positive influence in the lives of 60,000 members in Texas and more than 451,000 mem-

bers from across the United States. Activities during the week included motivational speakers and workshops, debate and voting on a constitutional amendment to change the way Texas FFA Officers are elected, awarding of hundreds of degrees, awards, and scholarships, selection of a State winning talent team, and the election of a new slate of State Officers.

Motley County ISD will begin classes August 26, 1996. All students will meet in the gym at 8:20 a.m.

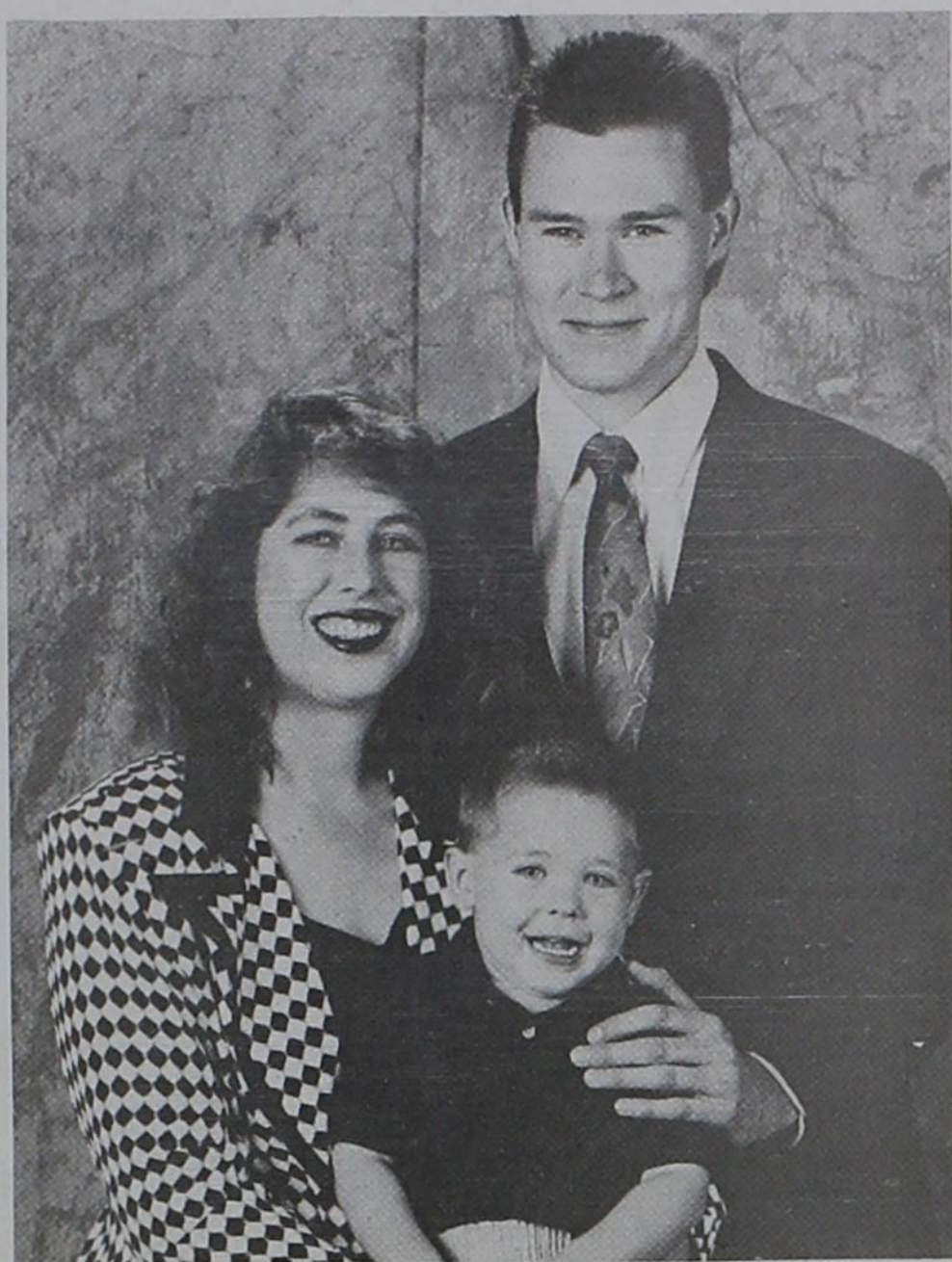
High School classes will register packets on the first day of school. For classes on Tuesday, August 20, Parents, please fill out these packets and return to school as soon as possible.

Teachers will return to school August 10 at 9:00 a.m. for first day of In-service.

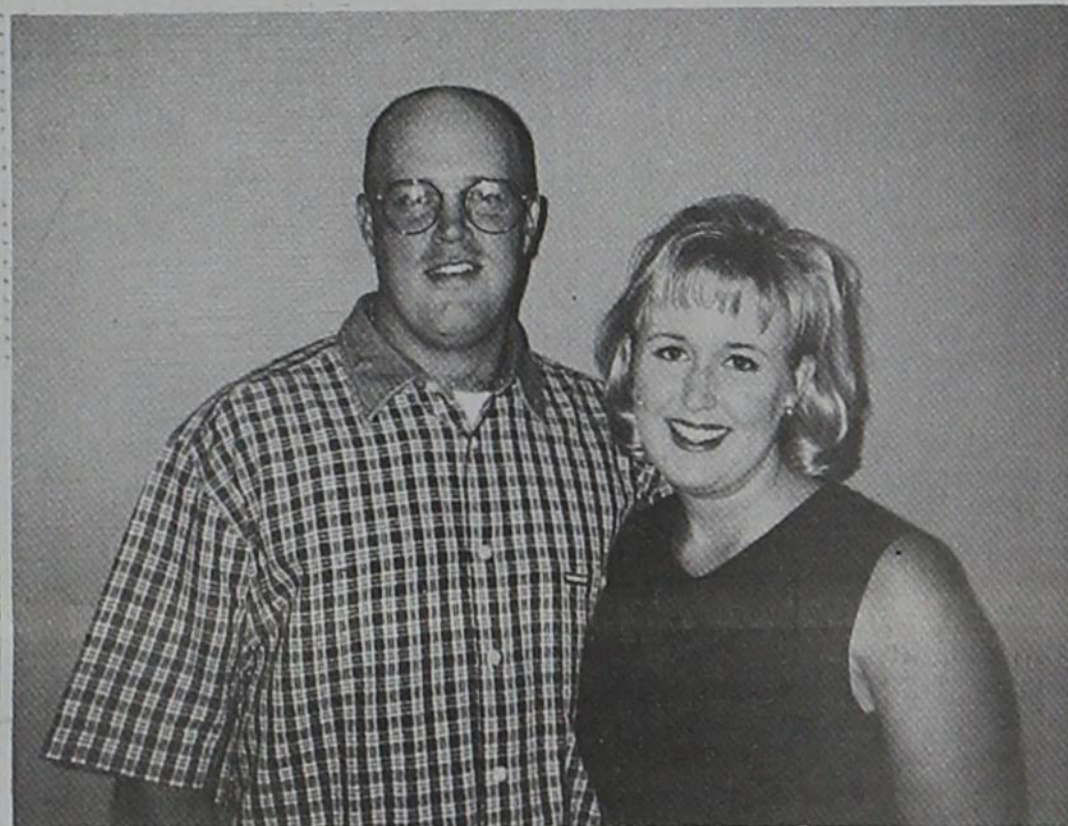

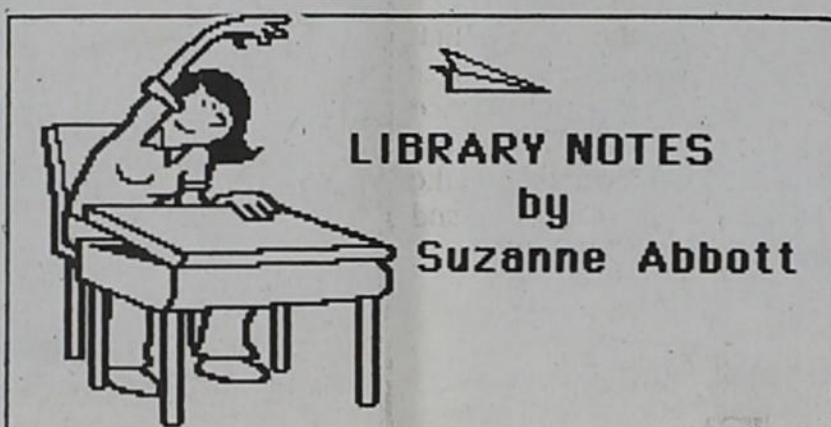

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### Home Economically Speaking

#### TEETH ARE MEANT TO LAST A LIFETIME

In 1960, only about 35 percent of people over age 65 retained any of their own teeth. By 1990, that figure had doubled to 60 percent. Thirty years ago, before daily brushing, flossing, regular checkups, and fluoridated water and toothpaste were used in combination, the average 65-year-old only had about seven of 32 natural teeth; today's 65-year-old has about 18.

Fluoride -- The single most important advance in 20th century dentistry is the use of fluoride in water, toothpaste, and topical medications. Fluoride strengthens teeth and retards decay. It was first added to selected public water supplies in 1945 and to toothpaste in the mid-1950s. When ingested in youth while teeth are forming, fluoride becomes incorporated into the tooth structure, making teeth strong.

Today 94 percent of toothpastes and about 50 percent of the water supply are fluoridated. To find out if fluoride is added to your water, ask your local dentist, health department representative, or water company personnel. You should know that if you drink bottled or well water, it is not likely to contain enough fluoride to prevent tooth decay.

#### Frequent Dental Problems

\* Gum disease, known as gingivitis in its mild form and periodontitis in its more severe form, is the most frequent type of dental problem among older Americans. About 64 percent of people over age 65 some of these symptoms:

- \* Gums that bleed when brushed.
- \* Gums that have pulled away from teeth
- \* Gums that are red, swollen, and tender.
- \* Puss between the teeth and gums when the gums are pressed on.
- \* Loose or separating teeth.
- \* Changes in how the teeth come together when you bite, or in the fit of partial dentures.
- \* Bad breath or bad taste in the mouth.

These symptoms occur when the

byproducts of bacteria erode healthy gum tissue, creating pockets that collect even more bacteria. The pockets separate the teeth from the gums and expose their roots. A pocket greater than 4mm deep indicates progression from gingivitis to early periodontitis. If treated promptly, gum disease can be reversed, and teeth can be saved. In addition:

\* Root decay affects about 60 percent of those in their 50s and 70 percent of those in their 60s.

\* Older people are susceptible to traditional tooth decay in the crown, particularly around old fillings, which may be abundant since fluoride was not incorporated into their teeth during childhood.

\* Some medications or therapies may cause a diminished saliva in the mouth (dry mouth), which can lead to more brittle teeth that can crack. Radiation therapy to the head or neck, sedatives, barbiturates, antihistamines, decongestants, and certain blood pressure medications may cause dry mouth. About half of patients over 65 take such drugs.

#### Regular Dental Checkups Are Important

Regular dental checkups (once or twice a year) are essential. Besides preventing and arresting oral disease and decay, dentists can also identify early signs of systemic illness, such as diabetes, anemia, leukemia, oral cancer, and adverse drug reactions.

You can help your dentist monitor your general health by keeping him or her informed of surgeries, hospital stays, and medications. Also, be sure to alert your dentists if you have heart disease or a heart murmur, which could put you at risk for an inflammation of the lining of the heart as a result of dental treatment.

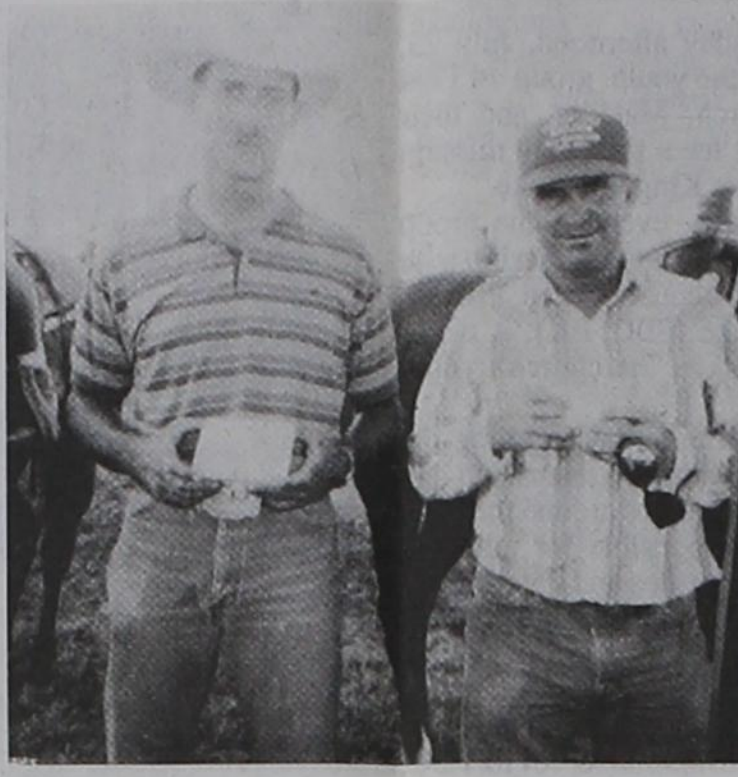

Floyd Hardin, Childress, and Sam Fortenberry, Lockney donated their

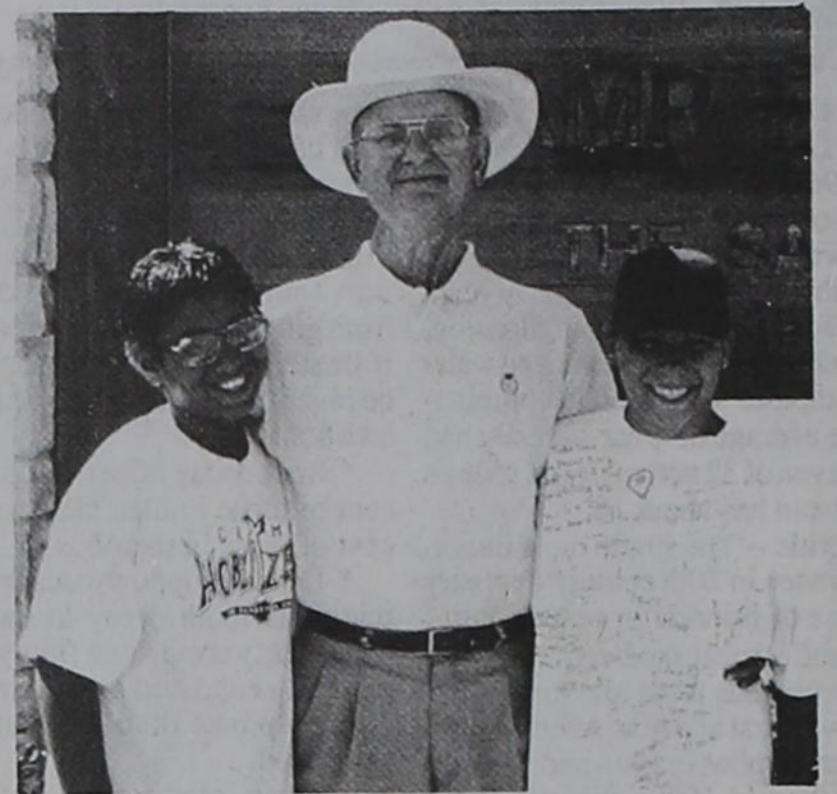

## Social Security Tips

### CHANGING CAREERS THE EFFECT ON YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY

Most American workers change jobs an estimated four to six times during their working life, and observers note that the rate seems to be increasing. There are many reasons for changing jobs - a promotion, a change in career focus, even a layoff. Regardless of the reason, you may wonder if it will affect your Social Security if you change jobs. Most likely it won't.

No matter how many times you change jobs, you never lose the Social Security protection you're already earned. And you continue earning that valuable protection for your and your family as long as you work in a job that's covered by Social Security. Although there's no difference in how you earn Social Security protection, a

job change could mean a difference in how you pay your Social Security and Medicare taxes.

If you're paid a salary, your employer deducts 7.65 percent from your gross pay, matches the deduction dollar for dollar and sends both amounts, along with a report of your earnings, to the government. If, however, you are self-employed, as are 8.1 million of the 143 million current workers, you pay your Social Security and Medicare taxes directly to the government.

It's not uncommon for a person to switch from a salaried job to self-employment and when that happens he or she may wonder how that affects his or her Social Security. For example, a woman recently called our office to ask how she would pay Social Security now that she had changed her career.

Mary McDonald had worked for large company for 15 years when her job was eliminated because business dropped off. Fortunately, Mary's experience and knowledge enabled her to form her own consulting business. But she no longer has the convenience of having Social Security taxes withheld from her paycheck; and she doesn't have an employer to share the tax expense.

Mary pays the entire 15.3 percent of her salary. Each year, she files her taxes and reports her annual net earnings on IRS Schedule SE (for self-employment). Mary pays her Social Security and Medicare taxes as part of her quarterly tax filing. In 1996, she will pay 12.4 percent in Social Security and 2.9 percent in Medicare taxes on net earnings up to \$62,700. If she earns above \$62,700, she'll pay the 2.9 percent Medicare tax on the rest of her earnings.

Self-employed persons get two income tax deductions that reduce their tax liability. The deductions are intended to make sure self-employed people are treated in much the same way as employers and employees for Social Security and income tax purposes. First, an individual's net profit from self-employment is reduced by 7.65 percent when determining net self-employment income. Second, self-employed persons can deduct half of their self-employment tax on the face of the IRS Form 1040. It can't be an itemized deduction and must not be listed on the Schedule C.

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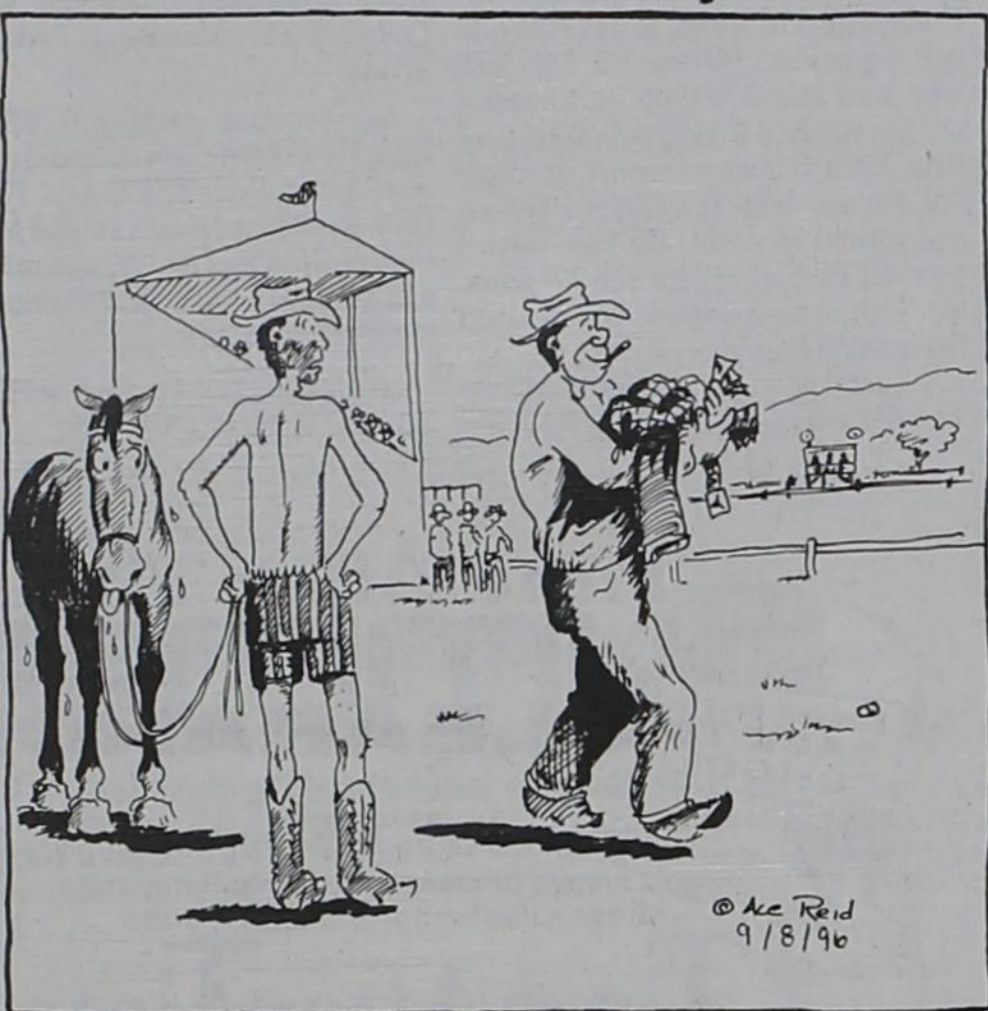
