### IN CROSBYTON HOSPITAL

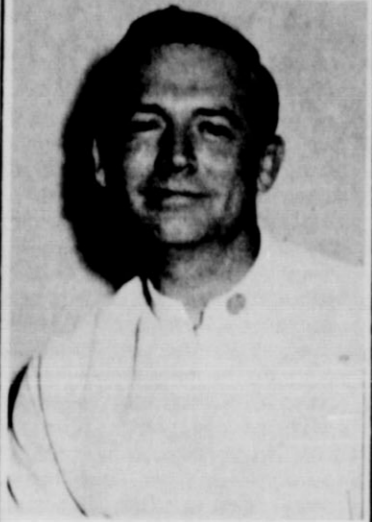

The former Ina Grace Curl was born December 8, 1890 at Jappa, Tenn., and came with her parents in early childhood, to Hood County, Texas.

She came to Matador in the early 1920's and taught school for several years. She was married to Sterling Price, at Chillicothe, Texas, December 10, 1923, and had made her home here for 47 years.

Mrs. Price was a member of the Methodist Church and was active in the Woman's Society of Christian Service and other church groups as long as her health permitted. She passed away on August 30, 1970 having attained the age of 79 years, 8 months and 22 days.

Survivors include her husband, Sterling Price; a son, Frank Price, Vice-President and Cashier of the First State Bank, Matador; two daughters, Mrs. Charles McDowell of Concord, and Mrs. William R. Coffey of Deer Park; a brother, H. C. Curl of Tolar; nine grandchildren and five great-grandchildren.

## Senator Hightower Says No Easy Way

"THE PIONEERS knew it was not going to be easy, and it is not easy now," Senator Jack Hightower of Vernon, said Tuesday as principal speaker at the regular luncheon meeting of the Matador Lions Club. He referred to the Motley hospital problem.

"We can't quit," he said, "it is a responsibility to find help. We don't know the source but revitalization must come to the rural areas... we must find ways to strengthen and build the small towns."

Senator Hightower outlined the problems of the Legislature and said taxes and redistricting would be the most controversial subjects facing the body. He said the tax demands were greater and that the tax income was less.

"Everyone seeks to devise a bill that will bring in revenue and not hurt anyone, but so far we have not found it," he said.

The problem of redistricting because of the loss of population in the past ten years will affect all levels, the Senator declared. He said he would need more counties to have more people and that the same problem affects the House of Representatives and the Congressional districts.

Senator Hightower, who received a standing ovation at the conclusion of his address, was introduced by Lion Bob Stanley.

**CITY TO CLOSE FOR LABOR DAY**

Matador will observe Labor Day, Monday, September 7, according to a survey made Tuesday by the Tribune, and most places of business will be closed.

The First State Bank, food stores, Bob Stanley Pharmacy, county, and government offices, including the post office will close for the holiday.

Essential service businesses such as filling stations and cafes will probably remain open.

Customers of the various firms which will observe the holiday, are asked to transact business in advance in order to avoid possible inconvenience.

Also observing the holiday will be Matador schools, according to an announcement by Supt. Charles Johnson.

**One Inch Rain For 8 Months**

Almost everyone has noticed that little rain has fallen here in 1970, but Bob Stanley, who keeps records of the weather, has discovered that we have had but one inch or more rain in eight months. That was recorded (1.34 inch) on May 24. So far this year he has recorded a total of only 7.83 inches.

Last year in the same period of time 13.23 inches of rainfall had been recorded. Last year (1969) the rainfall from October 27 until Jan. 1, 1970, was 3.67 inches.

Eric Swenson tells Old Settlers

## Work Backed Spirit Of Early Pioneers

A WILLINGNESS TO LABOR was the principal factor in the conquest of a hostile land when the first pioneers came to this area. The statement was made Thursday afternoon by Eric Swenson, who made the memorial address at the 47th annual Motley-Dickens Counties Old Settlers Reunion held in Roaring Springs.

"The pioneers were aware that they could survive through labor alone," the Spur attorney told his listeners, "and they accepted the challenge. Of course courage was as important as labor and they demonstrated a great courage... courage to build and courage to rebuild when they were faced with the need... they possessed a moral courage and a moral conviction..."

"They possessed honesty and integrity... they were honest because of an inner conviction... they had the strength to fight the good fight and they loved the land, although it was hostile... they possessed love for their fellow man and a love of God... even when forsaken by everything they retained their faith in God... they dedicated their lives and their works to building a new way of life."

The Pioneer Pavilion was filled almost to capacity as Rev. Victor Crabtree of Dickens paid tribute

to the 65 deceased residents of Motley and 90 deceased of Dickens Counties in the past 12 months.

Most typical junior cowboy and cowgirl were Rob Francis 6 and Laura Grundy, 10, both of Matador.

Other awards went to Mrs. Dale Dixon of Matador as the most typical oldtime cowgirl and Bud Leatherwood of Crosbyton as the most typical oldtime cowboy.

W. E. Burleson of Matador won the ribbon for the best float.

Largest attendance at the Old Settlers dance was reported at the Saturday night entertainment, when the floor space was crowded to capacity.

**Rodeo Has Largest Crowd In History**

Largest gate ever recorded at an Old Settlers Rodeo attended the Saturday night performance at Roaring Springs.

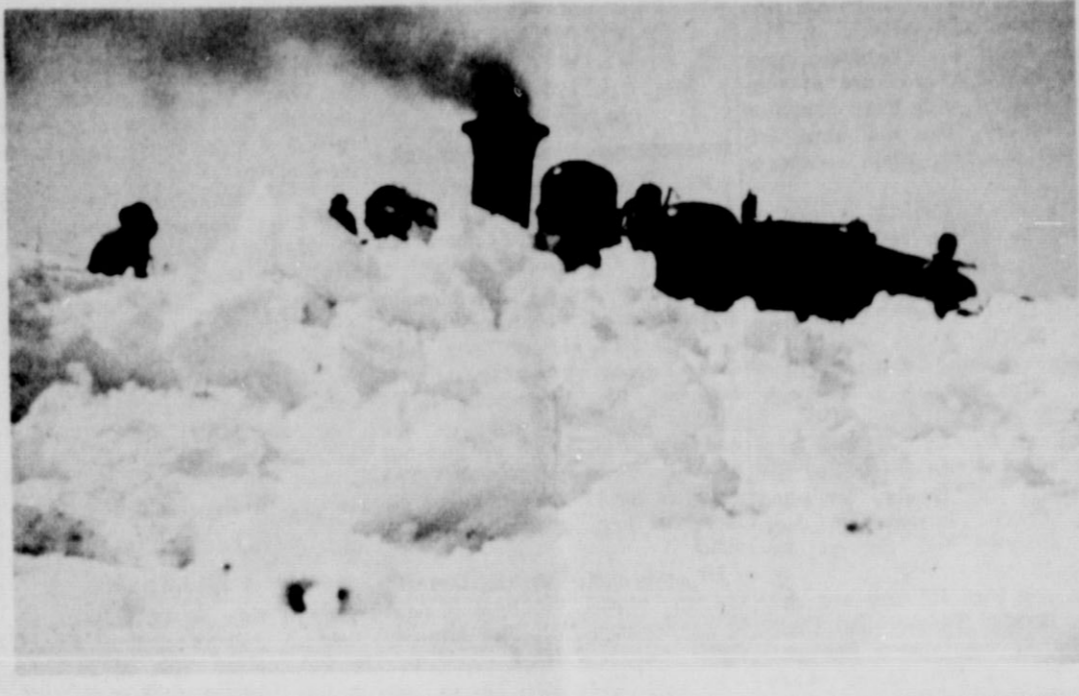

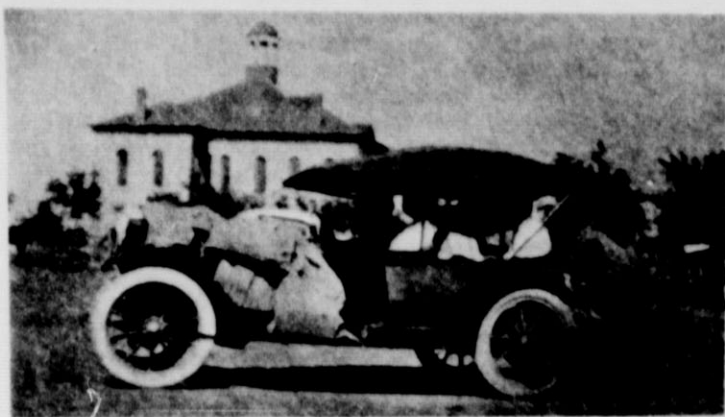

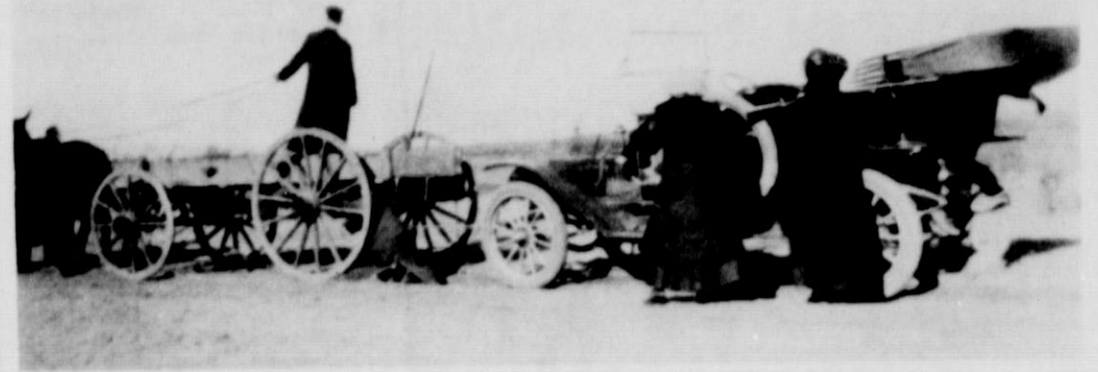

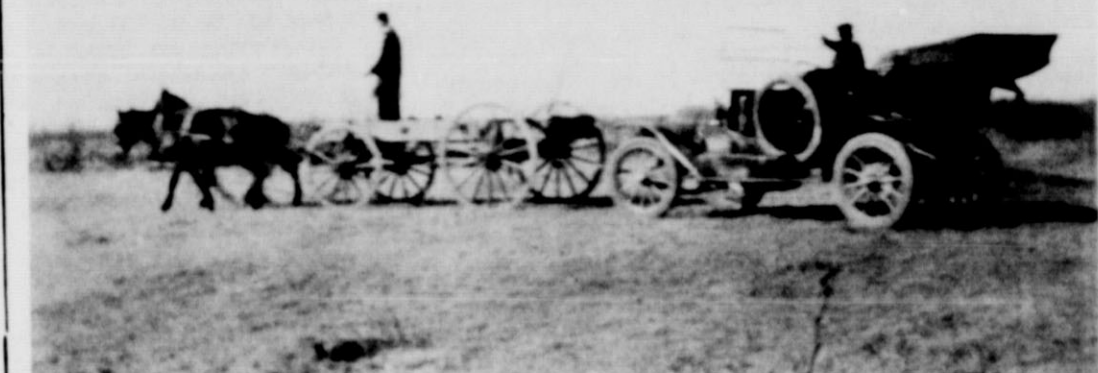

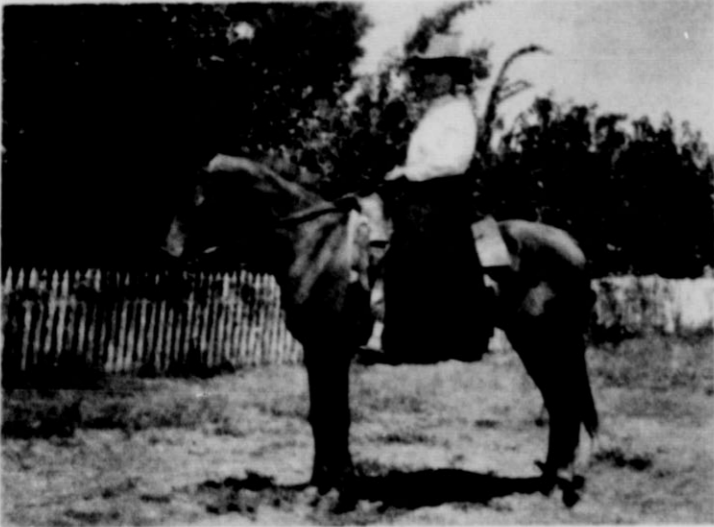
