essentialelements, the state-mandated curriculum, and assess higher-order thinking skills and problem-solving

The TAAS objectives are uniform across grades for a subject area; how within these objectives differ by since the targets are linked directly to the essential elements. At all grades, items esting each objective are inthe array of instructional targets repretion to another.

The following gives a brief descrip of the standards used on the TAAS

In 1994, the ooard adopted a $70 \%$ equivalent stanudies TAAS science and social f 70 or a Scas Learning Index score sponds to the minimum expectations/ passing level, which remains constant across administrations. - Mastered all Objectives. "Mastered all objectives" appears on a re-

on all the objectives on a subject area. This standard represents a higher level of achievement than the minimum expectations/passing standard and can be useful in surveying which students
have a broad understanding of a parhave a broad understanding of a par-
ticular subject area as it is assessed on the test. In TAAS writing, students must also obtain either a 3 or 4 on the written composition to master all objectives. Performance relative to the

studies. This standard is not applied to benchmark tests.
- Academic Recognition. "Aca demic Recognition" is used to identify a highlevel of achievement on a TAAS
test and is awarded to students who test and is awarded to students who
correctly answer $95 \%$ or more of the items on a particular subject area test. To achieve Academic Recognition o the TAAS writing test, a student must correctly answer $95 \%$ or more of the on the written composition. In addition, ExitLevel students are eligible t reccive Academic Recognition only i they are testing for the first time in al subject area. For students achieving "Academic Recognition" will be printed on the students' reports and labels. Performance relative to science, and social studies. This standard is not applied to benchmark tests. "All Tests Taken" refers to the
performance of students on two, three or five different TAAS subject area tests, depending on how many are administered to students at that grade. However, meeting minimum expecta-
